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## FOREWORD

Again that time has come, when standing at the gateway of a dying year we gaze across the threshold of the new, and try to grasp the golden threads that lead us on to prosperity and success. Then looking back we see each care and trouble; everything of joy or happiness, success or failure, and we are reminded here of honors gained and of shortcomings to be remedied. May we be steady in our aims and steady to surmount the difficulties that may arise.

Resting firmly as Gibraltar on that true and steadfast membership which has upheld us so steadily in each enterprise, let us strive ever to gain new strength for our organization, to make our club a larger and more closely associated body for those who really appreciate the wonders of God's great outdoors and ever guided by the light of high ideals, let us make the Wasatch Mountain Club the best of its kind whatsoever.

This little booklet has been edited under the direction of the publicity committee of the Wasatch Mountain Club, Clarence R. Parry, Chairman. Special thanks must be extended to Mary Pack, Luella Hunter, James M. Cummings, Lewis Stearns, L. P. Stoney, Dr. E. W. Lambert, and Einar Lignell, and also to the advertising committee, composed of R. J. Gordon, Harriet Mag-

diel and Maude Adams, for their efforts in getting out this, the first yearly edition of the Rambler.

It is our purpose in this pamphlet to give our members a record of our past, and a little expression of our hopes for the future. We wish this also to be an introduction to those who have not yet joined our ranks, that they might better understand us.

### Our Purposes

Perhaps there is no better way to introduce ourselves than to quote from our preamble. We are an organization of artists, scientists, authors, photographers, and explorers, but consist mainly of men and women in business and the professions who find rest and recreation out of doors.

"Our purpose shall be to encourage out-door recreation; to unite the energy, interests, and knowledge of students, explorers, and lovers of the mountains of Utah; to collect and disseminate information regarding the Rocky Mountains, in behalf of science, literature, and art; to explore and picture the scenic wonders of this and surrounding states, and to help in advertising the natural resources and scenic beauties of the State of Utah. To encourage preservation of forests, flowers, and natural scenery, as well as wild animal and bird life."

### What We Have Accomplished

In looking back on the past year we feel more than gratified with the wonderful beginning we have made. The club was organized May 20, 1920, with thirteen members. During the years of 1920-21, a great deal of exploration was undertaken, but very little organization, and it was not until the spring of 1922 that a more definite organization was accomplished. The club at that time had some sixty members; we are now proud to boast of 250 members in good standing.

In the year 1922 the club had 36 outings, accommodating a total of 2300 people, making an average of 64 people on each trip. Of this number, 68 per cent were club members. Most of these trips consumed from one to three days and have been made at an average cost per person, of 78 cents in 1922 as compared

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with 98 cents in 1921, a saving of 20 cents. The average cost per trip was \$75.00. Several trips of longer duration were taken, including one to Granddaddy Lakes, one to Bryce and Zion Canyons, one to Yellowstone Park and one to Cedar Breaks, Bryce Canyon, Zion Canyon, Kaibab Forest and Grand Canyon. Some of these trips required fifteen days, the longest one being made for about \$40.00.

Our membership has increased from 45 members on January 1, 1922, to 225 on January 1, 1923.

Although we are known mostly to the public through our trips, we are not exclusively a hiking club and all of our attention is not confined towards good times or outings. We are rapidly becoming a great asset to the community; taking an active part in its development; an interest in its parks, and the city's cleanliness and beauty, our tourist camping grounds and all other natural attractions to tourists.

We are in a great way responsible for the wonderful success of our new attraction, Timpanogas Cave. It was originally discovered by Wasatch Mountain club members, namely, Dr. L. D. Pfouts and Veryl Manwill, of Payson, Utah. The club has been instrumental in opening the cave to the public and we feel that we have done a great deal in advertising its beauty. On one occasion over 300 people were taken to the cave by our club and during the past year numerous smaller groups of visitors have been taken there on our excursions.

### Summer Trips

There are no neighboring canyons and few high peaks that have not resounded to the hearty laughter and banter of the Wasatch Mountain Club during the past season; for we have climbed Lone, Timp, Black, Nebo, Majestic, Iron Mountain, Mt. Ogden, Wolverine, Twin, and numerous other lesser known peaks and on many of these we have placed registration boxes. We have explored Coombs Canyon and its hieroglyphics, Big Cottonwood and its lakes, Little Cottonwood and its granite walls, American Fork and its branch canyons with their colorful views, and other canyons, almost too numerous to mention; but each having some special attraction or lesson.

We are rapidly gathering equipment which will make the handling of larger parties on all trips a very easy matter.

### **Preservation of Wild Flowers and Animals**

We have taken active steps toward educating the public in the preservation of the wild flowers and wild animal life.

### **Photography and Science**

Plans are now under way for the institution of a section of the club, devoted to the study of natural history. We have received advice from our photographic committee on the art of obtaining good pictures and as a result some splendid reminders of our good times and the inspiring things we have seen are available for our inspection. Our scientific committee has informed us of the geology of the country in which our trips are taken and under the direction of Ray Marsell, we have received evening class instruction which has resulted not only in increasing our education and broadening our views, but has made our trips of greater interest to us.

### **Winter Trips**

To many, the coming of winter means the wearing of "itching heavies" and the spending of one's time around the stove, wishing for spring or warmer weather, but to the Wasatch Mountain Club, it means the coming of some of our most enjoyable trips. To them it brings a healthy flush to the cheeks, a quickening of the blood in the veins and a spring in one's step. It is a time when we have skating, skiing, sleigh riding, tobogganing, and Alpinism. Although we boast of our canyons in their summer green, those who have visited them in the winter, and have seen them in their coat of white, have been doubly enthusiastic.

### **Tobogganing, the Latest Thriller**

Salt Lake City is ideally situated as a winter resort, and it is the intention of the Wasatch Mountain Club to popularize it as such. As an initial step in this direction, we recently obtained



permission from our mayor, whom we proudly claim as a member of our club, to construct a toboggan slide in the hills near the mouth of Dry Canyon. Not only did he give his permission but his hearty support and he has been interested in securing the co-operation of others in the enterprise. The work has gone forward with the help of Professor Ketchum of the engineering department of the University of Utah, who drew up the plans for the slide; Commissioner Burton, who sent tractors up to grade the slide and who promises that the city will furnish water to flood and freeze it when it is completed; Chief of Police Burbidge, who sent prisoners out to assist in the work of construction. It is very gratifying to know that we have our city officials behind us; it is another evidence that the club is receiving recognition and is becoming identified with the organizations representative of our city and state. While these people have helped so loyally, our own boys have worked hard and succeeded in having it ready by the last snowfall. That it is a wonderful success is attested to by the crowds of people who have visited it since the slide was completed.

Through the activities of the Wasatch Mountain Club and the University Hiking Club, Pinecrest Inn has become a popular winter resort. This New Year the Wasatch Mountain Club spent a three-day vacation there and all present acclaimed it one of the most enjoyable times of their lives. This trip is expected to be made annually.

### Our Intentions

From reading our official organ, the Rambler, you have no doubt noted the magnitude of what we intend to accomplish. We intend that the Wasatch Mountain Club shall be a great civic organization. We intend to develop the altruistic spirit, and we believe that there is no better way in which a more friendly feeling, or a bettering of mental and physical condition can be derived than in these outings.

Through our scientific committee, the club intends to educate its members in geology, mineralogy, biology, and the other natural sciences, so that our understanding of Nature will be

broadened, that we may better appreciate it and comprehend her wonderful workings in the formation of our natural beauties.

We intend to advertise these same scenic beauties by every means available, that Utah may become known as the greatest scenic state in the Union. We intend to co-operate in the improvement of conditions for the tourist, as we believe that through our treatment of the tourist, we obtain our most extensive publicity.

### Future Trips

In the coming year we intend to take a greater variety of trips than we have done in previous years.

Washington's Birthday, February 22, and 23, 24 and 25th will be our **Third Annual Skiing Trip to Brighton** by way of Park City and the Comstock mine, returning via Big Cottonwood Canyon. This will be the big ski trip of the year. Only those physically able should take the trip.

**The First Annual Camp of the Wasatch Mountain Club** will be established at Granddaddy Lakes, July 15th to 25th, inclusive. Machines will leave Salt Lake Sunday morning, July 15th, and the last machine will leave on July 22nd, taking those who desire to stay only one week. All machines return July 25th.

A permanent camp will be established at Fish Lake and a number of side trips will be taken from that point to surrounding lakes and peaks and other places of interest. This is one of the most beautiful regions in the state at which camp could be made. The entire district has an altitude of over 10,000 feet. There are about twenty-eight lakes, all within walking distance; also some of the highest peaks in the state, including King's Peak, which is the highest. The entire cost of this trip will be approximately \$30.00. Registration and a deposit of \$10.00 will be required on or before July 1st and the balance before July 10th. Members desiring to take this trip should arrange their vacations accordingly.

**Fourth Annual Trip to Southern Utah and the Grand Canyon**, including Bryce Canyon, Kaibab Forest, Utah's Dixie, Zion National Park, and Cedar Breaks, is to be made August 5th to



18th. Because of numerous requests, the club has arranged to take this trip again this year. The approximate cost will be \$50.00 and all members desiring to go must register and make a deposit of \$10.00 on or before July 25th. **Arrange your vacations now.**

### Moral Standing

It is the boast of the Wasatch Mountain Club that we only have as our members people of the highest type. Membership to the club is obtained by filling out an application blank, with the endorsement of two members of the club. Each application is turned over to the membership committee for the purpose of obtaining information about the applicant that might guide the action of the board of directors. Secret ballot is taken on each name. Our standards are of the highest and we desire only those men and women in our organization who can live up to them.

We feel that our club offers an opportunity for men and women to get together, out of doors, under ideal conditions, with the best of companions, with a chance to contribute something to an organization which works to popularize the wonders of the Rocky Mountain country; and to tell the people about it and show them how to better enjoy it. We number among our members many of the foremost leaders in our community.

We have heard the complaint from some that our trips are generally taken on Sundays. Obviously, it is necessary to make them on holidays and Sundays. Our club is non-sectarian, and on some of our trips we have held a non-sectarian service. It shall be our desire on some of our future trips to have some religious leader address us. We do not feel that we are lacking in the least in devotion on our Sunday outings, for no matter what one's interpretation of the Divine Dicty, one cannot stand on some rocky eminence—Nature's pulpit—and look out over God's assemblage of pure water, stately pines, majestic hills, graceful quaking aspen, reverence inspiring sky and clouds, and doubt the existence of a Supreme Being. One cannot stand there and not be impressed by the greatness of God's work, by the beauty and purity of Nature, untouched by man; nor could

he fail to be inspired to greater things. The great out of doors is truly God's cathedral, and is a most worthy place of worship.

### **Classification of Membership**

Our membership is divided into qualified and regular members. Only qualified members may hold office and the qualified members are those who have climbed to an elevation of 11,000 feet, as a member or guest of the Wasatch Mountain Club. Possessing as we do such high ideals and purposes, we realize that our activities are limited only by our membership and we are endeavoring to obtain a greatly increased number of new members.

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**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS  
OF  
WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB, INC.****PREAMBLE**

The name of this Club shall be: THE WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB, INC. Its purpose shall be to encourage out-door recreation; to unite the energy, interests, and knowledge of students, explorers, and lovers of the Mountains of Utah; to collect and disseminate information regarding the Rocky Mountains, in behalf of Science, Literature, and Art; to explore and picture the scenic wonders of this and surrounding states, and to help in advertising the natural resources and scenic beauties of the State of Utah. To encourage preservation of forests, flowers, and natural scenery, as well as wild animal and bird life.

**CONSTITUTION**

The officers of this Club shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, together with five additional members, and they shall constitute the Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors shall be elected at the annual business meeting which shall be held the last Friday in April of each year. Of the nine Board members elected, at least two shall have served on the previous Board.

The general membership shall elect the nine Board Members, who by ballot, among themselves, shall in turn elect of their members the President, Vice-President, and Secretary and Treasurer.

The qualification of all duly elected officers shall be by a majority of votes cast, which shall be attested by those in charge of election.

No one but a qualified member shall be a member of the Board of Directors.

There shall at no time be more than two female members on the Board of Directors.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to control all activities of the Club. Business of the Club shall be divided under the following acting committees, for presentation and recommendation, as to action of the Board, and a member of the Board of Directors shall be the Chairman of each Committee, nominated by the President, and elected by the Board:

Committee on Outings.

Committee on Purchasing and Finance.

Committee on Advertising and Publicity.

Committee on Membership and Morals and Reception.

Committee on Camps and Commissary.

Committee on Entertainment.

Committee on Photography.

Committee on Science.

#### COMMITTEE ON OUTINGS

Chairman..... Einar Lignell

It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and suggest all trips, hikes, and outings, etc., arrange routes, find out possible camp sites, and accommodations, and appoint leaders.

#### COMMITTEE ON PURCHASING AND FINANCE

Chairman ..... A. A. Lorenze

It shall be the duty of this committee to procure and purchase all supplies by requisition, such as food and utensils; arrange financial end of transportation, and buy such instruments



and implements as the Board thinks advisable for the Club to have.

It shall be necessary for this committee to co-operate with the committees on Outings, Commissary, and Publicity, in arranging for trip charges, camp supplies, and purchasing materials.

#### COMMITTEE ON ADVERTISING AND PUBLICITY

Chairman.....Clarence R. Parry

It shall be the duty of this committee to do all advertising, make public announcements, attend to newspaper work, banners, emblems, insignias, etc. Also any Club publications, and in every way with respect to bringing the Club and its activities before the public. Also act as historian.

#### COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP, MORALS AND RECEPTION

Chairman .....Dr. E. W. Lambert

It shall be the duty of this committee to keep a record of all members on hikes and also a guest book of all visitors, recording same. It shall attend to work of obtaining new members and mailing of literature to all applicants and desired applicants. It shall be their duty to increase membership, and also, to arrange for matrons and patrons, and be responsible for all conduct on trips and at camp. Appoint reception committee.

#### COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND COMMISSARY

Chairman .....L. P. Stoney

It shall be the duty of this committee to have charge of camp, planning menus, preparation of food, making bunk and meal assignments, and taking care of sanitation and have charge of all camp proceedings.

#### COMMITTEE ON ENTERTAINMENT, ETC.

Chairman .....Eugene D. Amott

It shall be the duty of this committee to arrange all entertainment programs, have charge of, and conduct a musical department, songs, yells, lectures, etc.

## COMMITTEE ON PHOTOGRAPHY

Chairman ..... Lee Webb

It shall be the duty of this committee to take and have charge of all pictures, slides, etc., furnishing same on demand for work of other committees. They shall operate under, and in conjunction with the Publicity Committee in obtaining pictures to be used in that department. They shall also instruct in photography.

## COMMITTEE ON SCIENCE

Chairman ..... D. M. Garn

It shall be the duty of this committee to make maps, topographical readings, and records of routes and trips, act as informants on physiography, natural history, mineralogy, and biology, and instruct in same.

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**The President shall have the power to appoint special Committees, if the occasion arises.**

It shall be the duty of the President of this Club to act as Chairman of the Board and preside at all meetings, and handle all matters that may properly come under the supervision of the President.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to act in absence or disability of the President.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the records and minutes of all the proceedings of the Club, and the Board meetings; to keep a roll of all members, to issue notices of meetings, and to handle all correspondence.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and distribute, under the direction of the Board, all funds, and to keep a record of accounts, and to make a written financial statement upon demand.

The Membership shall consist of two classes—regular and qualified.

The qualified member is one who has made one climb of eleven thousand feet altitude, as a member or guest of an authorized trip of this Club.

A quorum of this Club shall consist of twelve or more members, including two officers.

A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of a majority of its members.

The fee for membership of this Club shall be and is \$3.00 per annum, the fiscal year ending November 1st of that year.

No one shall become a member of this Club who is not passed favorably upon by a majority of the Board Members, and who has not deposited the annual dues of the Club.

In case of vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors, the President shall have the power to appoint, subject to the approval of the Board, his successor. No business shall be transacted which demands the approval of the Board except at a regular or special meeting of the Board. Should it become necessary that the membership of any member be no longer desired, such membership may be made null and void by the unanimous action of the Board.

Should it so happen that any officer or director be considered undesirable or inactive any longer, such officer may be deprived of his office by the unanimous action of the remaining officers.

The Meetings of the Club and Board shall be conducted as far as possible, according to Roberts' Rules of Order.

The Books of the Club shall be open for inspection to any member at all reasonable times.

No member or officer shall receive any compensation whatsoever for his services to the Club, unless it is to recompense him for actual money expended by him at the direction of the Board.

All records, accounts, etc., shall be the property of the Wasatch Mountain Club, Inc., and each officer or director shall turn in the same to his successor upon demand.



THIS CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the Wasatch Mountain Club, Inc., are subject to amendment, but only by a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors.

We, the undersigned Board Members, hereby accept the above and foregoing instrument as the Constitution and By-Laws by which the Wasatch Mountain Club, Inc., shall be governed.
