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## THE WIND RIVER VACATION TRIP BY LEADER, HAROLD GOODRO

THE WEATHER LOOKED VERY THREATENING ON AUGUST 9, THIS YEAR AS OUR ANNUAL VACATION TRIP GOT UNDERWAY. THE RIDE UP THROUGH NORTHERN UTAH AND SOUTHERN WYOMING WAS VERY SCENIC WITH BLACK CLOUDS AND BRILLIANT LIGHTNING FLASHING ON THE HORIZON IN FRONT OF US ALL THE WAY UP. THE LEAD CAR, CONSISTING OF JANET C., LEE JENSEN AND MYSELF, AND PULLING A HEAVY TRAILER FULL OF THE WEEK'S FOOD AND SUPPLIES, WENT UP THROUGH PINEDALE, WYOMING AND ON TO JOE HICK'S RANCH TO GET THE FACTS FOR THE GROUP ON PACKING IN ON THE MORROW. THERE WE FINALLY CAUGHT UP WITH THE WEATHER AND A CLOUDBURST THAT LASTED AN HOUR. WE HAD QUITE A TIME SLIPPING AND SLIDING IN THE MUD FOR 12 MILES AS WE DROVE BACK TO PINEDALE TO MEET THE GANG.

THE TOWN WAS BRIMMING OVER WITH COWBOYS AND TOURISTS. WE STAYED IN TOWN UNTIL 11:00 ABSORBING THE LOCAL COLOR, THEN THREE CAR'S FULL DROVE UP TO ELKHEART PARK TO CAMP FOR THE NIGHT. UP BRIGHT AND EARLY FOR OUR HIKE INTO ISLAND LAKE BASE CAMP, A NICE FOURTEEN MILES OF SCENIC BEAUTY. BEAUTIFUL FORESTS, JAGGED PEAKS AND BLUE LAKES IN ENDLESS SUCCESSION PASSED BY TO MAKE THE HIKE APPRECIATED.

WE ARRIVED AT ISLAND LAKE A LITTLE TIRED BUT THE VIEW OF UPPER TITCOMB BASIN QUICKLY DISPELLED THAT. WHILE WAITING FOR THE PACK HORSES TO BRING OUR FOOD AND EQUIPMENT IN, WE STARTED LAYING OUT THE CAMP AND GATHERING FIREWOOD. THEY SOON ARRIVED, ALONG WITH SAMMY AND EDITH GREEN AND DR. AND MRS. RIDGES ON SADDLE HORSES. WE HAD GIVEN THESE FOUR UP FOR LOST, BUT THEY HAD ARRIVED JUST IN TIME TO GO IN WITH THE PACK TRAIN. WE NOW HAD 15 PEOPLE, THE LARGEST CLUB GROUP TO EVER GO INTO THIS AREA.

THAT EVENING IT RAINED AGAIN, BUT WE HAD A WONDERFUL STEAK DINNER, AND EVERYONE WENT TO BED CHEERFUL. THE NEXT DAY, MONDAY, CLYDE, LEE, GEORGE AND MYSELF PACKED UP OUR TENTS AND FOOD AND HIKED FOUR MORE MILES UP INTO UPPER TITCOMB LAKE FOR OUR MOUNTAIN CLIMBING CAMP. THIS IS AT AN ELEVATION OF 10,600 FEET AND RIGHT AMONG THE HIGH JAGGED PEAKS AND HUGE GLACIERS THAT MAKE THE SPOT SO MUCH LIKE THE SWISS ALPS.

ON THE TUESDAY SCHEDULE WAS MT. GANNETT, 13,870 FEET, THE HIGHEST IN WYOMING. So, WE STARTED OUT UP THE BASIN, OVER DINWOODY PASS, 12,500 FEET, THEN DOWN AND ACROSS THE HUGE DINWOODY GLACIER AND UP MIGHTY GANNETT. WE REACHED THE TOP AT 4:00 P.M. AND THEN HAD TO HURRY ALL THE WAY BACK TO CAMP TO GET THERE BY DARK. THE VIEW FROM THE TOP WAS TERRIFIC. YOU CAN SEE THE TETONS IN THE DISTANCE AS WELL AS HUNDREDS OF LAKES, PEAKS AND SNOWFIELDS IN EVERY DIRECTION. A LONG HIKE, BUT WELL WORTH EVERY STEP OF IT.

On Wednesday, Lee and myself decided to climb Mt. Helen while Clyde and George rested for the day. However, we ended up climbing mountains Helen, Sacajaewea and Fremont all in one day and arrived back at camp just at dark again.

THURSDAY, CLYDE, LEE AND MYSELF STARTED OUT TO CLIMB CATHEDRAL PEAK, 13,600 FEET. THE WEATHER WAS THREATENING BUT WE GOT AN EARLY START AND WAS ON TOP AT 11:30 A.M., JUST AS THE STORM BLEW IN. HAILSTONES LARGE AS MARBLES AND A STRONG WIND ADDED TO OUR DISCOMFORT. WE THEN DECIDED TO CLIMB CHURCH SPIRE SO IN SPITE OF THE HAIL AND SNOW AND LIGHTNING, WE DASHED TO THE TOP AND HAD TO PICK OUR WAY DOWN CARE-

FULLY AS TWO OR THREE INCHES OF HAIL AND SNOW WERE ON ALL THE LEDGES AND HANDHOLDS. WE HAD A WONDERFUL GLISSADE DOWN THE HUGE SNOWFIELDS AND ARRIVED BACK AT CAMP AT 3:00 P.M.

WE THEN PACKED UP AND HIKED BACK OUT TO THE BASE CAMP TO JOIN THE MAIN GROUP WHO HAD BEEN HAVING THE TIME OF THEIR LIVES FISHING, HIKING, PICTURE TAKING, LOAFING AND EATING. THAT DAY JANET, ROGER, TOM, ORSON AND PAUL K. HAD CLIMBED A 12,900 FOOT MOUNTAIN UP NEAR INDIAN PASS, AND SAMMY HAD CLIMBED UP TABLE TOP MOUNTAIN. TUESDAY, ROGER, TOM AND PAUL K. HAD CLIMBED FREMONT.

THE NEXT DAY, FRIDAY, WE RELAXED WHILE TOM AND PAUL K. CLIMBED ANOTHER PEAK ON THE WEST SLIDE OF TITCOMB BASIN AND GEORGE AND CLYDE CLIMBED FREMONT. IN ALL, THE GANG CLIMBED TEN BIG MOUNTAINS IN FOUR DAYS, SOME KIND OF A RECORD, I BELIEVE.

VERY BUSY FISHERMEN WERE PAUL AND ELIZABETH LARSEN, GEORGE, DR. AND MRS. RIDGES, AND ORSON SPENCER. THEY HAD A LOT OF GOOD LUCK TOO, AS SOME OF OUR PICTURES SHOW. THOSE TROUT DINNERS WERE WONDERFUL, TOO. SAMMY AND EDITH SPENT A LOT OF TIME TAKING PICTURES WHICH WE WILL ALL HAVE A CHANCE TO SEE SOON.

WE HAD A BEAUTIFUL DAY SATURDAY TO PACK OUT AND THE HIKE WAS ENJOYABLE, ENDING IN A COOL SWIN IN FREMONT LAKE, PAINFUL SHAVING OF A WEEK'S WHISKERS AND THEN INTO PINEDALE FOR A LITTLE CELEBRATING. SUNDAY MORNING WE TOOK ANOTHER SWIN IN THE LAKE, THEN LEISURELY DROVE THE CARS BACK TO SALT LAKE. IT WAS A VERY FULL AND COMPLETE WEEK AND ALL HANDS ENJOYED IT TO THE UTMOST. FROM THERE, WITH THE HELP OF FOREST SERVICE TRAIL MARKERS AND MAPS WE LOCATED AND CLIMBED KINGS PEAK AND RETURNED BY MOONLIGHT.
