# \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* RED BUTTE - - EMIGRATION CANYONS

NEARLY 36 WMC MEMBERS MET DR. WALTER P. COTTAM AND HIS STUDENTS AT THE UNIVERSITY ANNEX, WHERE WE BOARDED OUR CHARTERED BUS, AND GENIAL GENE, THE DRIVER, WHISKED US THROUGH EMIGRATION CANYON TO THE LITTLE MOUNTAIN SUMMIT.

THERE DR. COTTAM POINTED OUT THE OVER-ALL SCARCITY OF PLANT-COVER, THE DENUDED SHEEP TRAIL, AND THE LOW PROPORTION OF EDIBLE GRASSES ON THIS ONCE BADLY OVER-GRAZED AREA. HE COMPARED THE AREA AT PRESENT WITH DESCRIPTIONS BY THE PIONEER SCOUTS, WHO HAD TO CRAWL THROUGH DENSE TANGLES OF TREES AND BRUSH.

THE THIN SOIL DEPTH WAS ILLUSTRATED. BY CROSS-SECTION IN THE HIGHWAY CUT. FURTHER EVIDENCE OF LOSS OF TOP SOIL WERE THE EXPOSED ROOTS OF THE MOUNTAIN MAPLE, WHICH ORDINARILY DOES NOT GROW ROOTS SO CLOSE TO THE SURFACE. DR. COTTAM EXPLAINED THAT PLANT COVER ON SUCH AN ERODED AREA DOES NOT QUICKLY RECOVER, EVEN WHEN PROTECTED, DUE TO LOSS OF THE BEST TOPSOIL.

HE EMPHASIZED THE IMPORTANCE OF HEALTHY WATERSHEDS IN FLOOD
PREVENTION AND MAINTENANCE OF A CLEAN DEPENDABLE WATER SUPPLY, AND
OF SOIL CONSERVATION TO CONTINUED PRODUCTIVITY OF GRAZING LANDS.

DESCENDING TO PINECREST, WE ABANDONED THE BUS AND HIKED OVER THE HUMP INTO RED BUTTE CANYON. IT WAS MORE OF A CLIMB THAN IT LOOKED, BUT EVERYBODY MADE IT - EVEN THE LADY IN HEELS.

RED BUTTE, WITH ITS LUSH GRASS AND DENSE FIR, SPRUCE, AND BRUSH FOREST, WAS AN IMMENSE CONTRAST TO ONCE-SIMILAR EMIGRATION CANYON. CUTS ALONG THE JEEP-TRAIL SHOWED AN 18 IN. TO TWO-FOOT DEPTH OF RICH TOPSOIL. THE CREEK'S RAVINE WAS SMALL AND SHALLOW, SHOWING THAT HEAVY

VEGETATION HAD PREVENTED THE WASTEFUL, DAMAGING RAPID RUN-OFF COMMON TO DENUDED AREAS. COMPARISON OF THE TWO CANYONS SHOWS THE RESULTS OF SELFISH OR UNINFORMED TREATMENT OF OUR RENEWABLE RESOURCES.

ARRIVING AT FORT DOUGLAS' GATES, OUR SYMPATHY WAS DIVIDED BETWEEN OVER-GRAZED EMIGRATION CANYON AND OUR ACHING FEET; SEVEN MILES OF ROAD-HIKING IS HARDER, APPARENTLY, THAN SEVEN MILES ON A TRAIL.
