TROPHIES, AND ENJOY AN EVENING OF DANCING TOGETHER. VERA VANTONGEL,
AS ENTERTAINMENT DIRECTOR, WAS CHAIRMAN, ASSISTED BY GERRY CRAIG.
AS USUAL, WENONAH MCGHAN BROUGHT FORTH ANOTHER DELIGHTFUL SPRING

AMONG NOTABLES PRESENT WERE LIFE MEMBERS EDITH AND SAMMY GREEN, CLARENCE R. AND MRS. PARRY, AND GEORGE UNSELD, AND GUESTS MR. AND MRS. FELIX KOZIOL. BRITHDAYS WERE CELEBRATED BY LEE STEORTS AND STAN MURDOCK.

AFTER STRAWBERRY SHORT CAKE AND COFFEE, PRESIDENT HAROLD GOODRO PRESIDED OVER THE BUSINESS MEETING. NOMINATIONS WERE MADE FOR THE COMING ELECTION OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS. HIGH-LIGHTING THE MEETING WAS THE LONG-AWAITED PRESENTATION OF THE PARRY TROPIES. NEW MEMBERS AND GUESTS WERE REMINDED THAT THIS IS THE SECOND YEAR FOR THE TROPHIES SPCNSORED BY CLARENCE R. PARRY, TO RECOGNIZE TWO MEMBERS OF THE CLUB EACH YEAR, AN "ACTIVITY AWARD" FOR OUTSTANDING ALL-AROUND CLUB ACTIVITIES, AND THE "MOUNTAINEERING AWARD" FOR MOUNTAINEERING ACHIEVEMENT. LEE STEORTS, LONG AN OUTSTANDING MOUNTAINEER, RECEIVED THE "MOUNTAINEERING AWARD" AND JANET CHRISTENSEN, FOR HER YEARS OF CLUB ACTIVITES, RECEIVED THE "ACTIVITY AWARD."

GAIETY, SET OFF BY THE GIRLS FRESH-COLORED SPRING GOWNS, FILLED THE EVENING OF DANCING AND VISITING OF FRIENDS, TO BRING TO A CLOSE ANOTHER ANNUAL W.M.C. SPRING SOCIAL EVENT. (IT WAS SNOWING OUTSIDE.)

IN RESPONSE TO YOUR REQUEST FOR A DESCRIPTION OF OUR RE-CENT ACTIVITY IN REGARDS TO THE PLANE CRASH, I WILL GIVE YOU THE DETAILS AS I REMEMBER THEM. FOR MANY YEARS THE WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB HAS BEEN VOLUNTEERING THEIR SERVICES TO THE FOREST SERVICE FOR ANY KIND OF SEARCH AND RESCUE MISSIONS. IN THIS CASE THERE WERE TWO PLANES MISSING THE SAME NIGHT. MR. KOZIOL OF THE FOREST SERVICE CALLED AND TOLD ME TO GET SOME MEN READY TO GO AT A MOMENTS NOTICE. THE NEXT DAY, WRECKAGE OF ONE PLANE WAS SEEN BY AIR ON A HIGH HANGING SNOWFIELD ON MOUNT TIMPANOGAS AT AN ELEVATION OF 11,000 FEET. AT 10:00 AM, SIX OF THE CLUB MEMBERS STARTED UP, BEING PULLED BY A SNOW CAT FOR THE FIRST FEW MILES. AFTER SETTING UP BASE CAMP AT A SUM-MER GUARD STATION, WE PUT CLIMBERS ON OUR SKIS AND STARTED UP THE NORTH PEAK OF THE MOUNTAIN; WE CARRIED ROPES AND OTHER EQUIPMENT. IT TOOK SIX HOURS TO CLIMB TO THE POINT INDICATED ON A MAP BY THE AIR RESCUE UNIT. WE FOUND NOTHING AND WERE TURNED BACK BY APPROACHING DARK. THE NEXT MORNING WE STARTED UP THE NEXT CANYON TO THE SOUTHEAST, AFTER RECEIVING A RADIO MESSAGE THAT THE WRECKAGE WAS FURTHER SOUTH. WE WERE ACCOM-PANIED BY RANGER MONTE ATWATER, AVALANCHE EXPERT. AT AN ELE-VATION OF 9,000 FEET, HE TURNED US BACK, DUE TO AVALANCHE DANGER, AS THE DAY WAS CLOUDY AND VERY WARM. THREE OF THE MOUNTAINEERS, LEE STEORTS, JIM SHANE AND MYSELF, FINALLY TALKED MONTE INTO LETTING US TRY ANOTHER ROUTE. WE MADE IT SUCCESSFULLY BY WORK-ING OUR WAY UP CONNECTING ICE CHUTES AND FINALLY ARRIVED AT THE CRASH AT 5:30 PM.

AFTER MAKING SURE ALL HAD BEEN KILLED IN THE CRASH AND IDENTIFYING THE PLANE AS THE ARMY B-25, WE DESCENDED TO BASE CAMP AGAIN. THREE DAYS LATER, WITH A LARGER GROUP OF CLIMBERS, WE AGAIN CLIMBED TO THE PLANE, AND WITH THE AID OF AN AIR-DROP BY THE AIR RESCUE UNIT FROM DENVER, WE HAD THE PROPER EQUIPMENT TO BRING OUT THE BODIES. WE WORKED UNTIL 6:00 PM. BUT WERE UNABLE TO FIND THE FIFTH BODY, SO WE PROCEEDED DOWN THE MOUNTAIN WITH THE OTHER FOUR, CARRIED IN SPECIAL BAGS, WHICH WERE LOWERED DOWN THE CLIFFS WITH REGULAR CLIMBING ROPES. WE ARRIVED AT BASE CAMP AT 8:00 PM. AFTER WORKING 16 HOURS. SIX WASATCH MOUNTAINERS - CAINE ALDER, HAROLD GOODRO, JIM SHANE, LEE STEORTS, JACK WHITE, AND BOB WRIGHT - TOOK PART, AIDED BY THREE PROFESSIONAL SKIERS FROM THE ALTA SKI RESORT.
