GRAND CANYON - SEPTEMBER 3-4-5

THE W.M.C. LABOR DAY EXCURSION WAS QUITE VARIED AND WITHOUT "CHOW CALL" TO BIND THE GROUP TOGETHER, THERE ARE AS MANY VERSIONS AS THERE WERE CARS, WHICH MET AND CROSSED EACH OTHERS! TRAILS, FOR SHORT INTERVALS, TO OH AND AWE.

PROBABLY THE MOST FRUSTRATING PART OF THE WHOLE TRIP WAS OUR INABILITY TO OBTAIN OVER-NIGHT ACCOMMODATIONS AT PHANTON RANCH. A
FEW OF US DETERMINED TO GO AT LEAST PART WAY TO THE RANCH AND BACK

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A CLIMB THROUGH THE GRAND CANYON - BY CAINE ALDER
