# CANADIAN ROCKIES - JULY 16 -25 BY CARL BAUER

SATURDAY MORNING JUST 20 CITY PICK-UPS AND ONE FLAT TIRE BEHIND SCHEDULE, THE STURDY BUS "LAS VEGAS", WITH CREW AND SUNDRY GEAR SECURE, AND HERALD HANSEN AT THE CONTROLS, BEGONE ONE OF THE MOST AMBITIOUS TRIPS EVER ATTEMPTED BY THE W.M.C. WITH DUSK AND A SPRINKLE OF RAIN, WE "HOVE TO" AT SMITH'S FERRY BEYOND BOISE; AND A SECOND DAY OF MOUNTAIN GRADES AND SCENIC COEUR D'ALENE FOUND US AT LITTLE ROUND LAKE, A RATHER DISAPPOINTING 025 MILES FROM HOME. BY MID-MORNING MONDAY, THE "WOMACS" HAD SATISFIED CUSTOM REQUIREMENTS AND CROSSED THEIR FIRST INTERNATIONAL BOUNDARY, AND WITH MOUNTING EXCITEMENT REVELED IN THE BEAUTY OF A 40 MILE SHORE LINE DRIVE AT KOOTENAY LAKE, PARENT OF THE MIGHTY COLUMBIA.

At the first "Port of Call", a trim ferry boat Laden with vacationers, and fading into the mist of the vast turquoise sea, beckned us westward to British Columbia, and a trip which is yet to be, but for now our goals were Yoho Park and the exotic country of Alberta Province, to the North and East.

AT CRANBROOK CAME NEW EXPERIENCES WITH OUR GRACIOUS CANADIAN NEIGH-BORS, WITH STRANGE MONEY AND TRADEMARKS, AND LARGER QUARTS. "BEST LAID PLANS OF MICE AND MEN" WILL GO AWRY AS DID OURS WHEN WE ENCOUNTERED A CROWDED CAMPGROUND, AND ROAD CONSTRUCTION, BUT A SHORT RETREAT AND ALTERNATE ROUTING FOUND US, ON A PERFECT TUESDAY MORNING, THREADING OUR WAY THROUGH A VERDANT PASS TOWARD LAKE LOUISE. WITH WITS SHARPENED BY A POSTPONED BREAKFAST, WE CONVENED OUR COMMISARY COUNCIL AS THE WAIL OF GASTRIC ANGUISH RENT THE AIR WITH THE PASSING OF THE FIRST OPPORTUNIITY FOR PREPARING NOURISHMENT UNTIL WE TURNED IN AT A CAMPGROUND, A FEW MILES BEYOND. THEN FOLLOWED HOURS FILLED WITH THE ENCHANTMENT OF LAKE LOUISE AND YOHO PARK, AND AN EVENING OF C MARADERIE WITH FELLOW WANDERERS FROM TORONTO.

On Wednesday sounded the call of the North Country with its unfolding pandrama of snow-capped peaks and jewelled lakes, and seldom a mile passing without the cry of "Picture, Picture". Diversion afforded a joling ride on the Columbia Ice Field in a preposterous vehicle which punishes the rider little less than its natural quarry, the Eskimo pedestrian.

WANING AFTERNOON BROUGHT JASPER, WITH ELKDOM'S CANDIDATE FOR AN "OSCAR", AND STEAM LOCOMOTIVES. A LANGUID THRUSDAY MORNING OFFERED SWIMMING, AND THE OPPORTUNITY TO RENAME OUR BUS THE "SALT LAKE CITY", BEFORE RETRACING OUR ROUTE TO CAMP AT MORAINE LAKE IN THE VALLEY OF TEN PEAKS. HIKING AND PAINTING PRECEDED FRIDAY'S LUNCH, THE NOW FAMILIAR CALL OF THE ROAD, AND BANFF. DINNER AT CALGARY BAITED THE NOMADS INTO OUR ONLY NIGHT DRIVING, WHICH ENDED AT WATERTON LAKE AFTER MIDNIGHT.

WITH THE DAWN AND A COT UPSET BY A CURIOUS BEAR, CAME THE DIS-COVERY OF A "NO CAMPING" SIGN WHICH WE HAD SURROUNDED IN THE DARK-NESS. A YAWNING AND HURRIED EVACUATION WAS FOLLOWED BY A NON- CHALANT AND REWARDING BREAKFAST. LATER, THE STRIDENT SUMMONS OF THE BUS HORN ROUNDED UP "ALL HANDS" FOR A DASH TO THE WHARF, WHERE THE KINDLY BOAT CAPTAIN HAD DELAYED FOR TEN MINUTES, HIS EARLIER THAN ANTICIPATED MORNING EXCURSION ON WATERTON LAKE. WE "LOGGED" OUR SECOND AND THIRD BORDER CROSSINGS AT A TIDY 20 KNOTS, AND SOME 20 "UNNAUTICAL" MILES LATER, THE FOURTH.

CANADIAN CAMPING FACILITIES SURPASSED THOSE FOUND IN GLACIER PARK WHERE RAIN BEGAN AS WE WERE APPROACHING LOGAN PASS. THE STORM ABATED AS WE DESCENDED ON THE PACIFIC SLOPE, AND PRECIPITATED NEW DEMANDS FOR PICUTRES AND AN EARLY RETURN TO GLACIER. A SIDE TRIP WAS MADE TO THE HUGE HUNGRY HORSE DAM, AND OUR LAST CAMP LOCATED SOUTH OF BUTTE.

WITH THE BROADENING WHICH RESULTS FROM TRAVEL IN AN EXOTIC FOREIGN LAND, THERE WAS EVIDENCED A HAPPINESS TO BE HOME AGAIN AND LITTLE DISAPPOINTMENT WITH THE FAMILIAR AND STILL MAJESTIC WASATCH PEAKS. AS WE ENTERED SALT LAKE VALLEY MONDAY AFTERNOON. MUCH CREDIT FOR OUR HAPPY INTERLUDE IN THE LAND TO THE NORTH MUST GO TO HAROLD (WE REGRET THAT HE FORGOT TO BRING HIS APPETITE ALONG), AND OUR CHOICE QUESTS WITHOUT WHOM THE TRIP WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN POSSIBLE. IT IS HOPED THAT NEW VOICES WILL NOW BE RAISED IN DEFENSE OF THE NOBLE CREATURES WHICH ADDED SO PLEASURABLY TO THE TRIP, THE BEAR, THE WILD HORSE, AND THE OTHER CITIZENS OF THE OPEN WEST.

THE LITTLE BIT THAT IS MADE GOES TOWARD PRINTING AND A FEW PENCE TOWARD LODGE UP-KEEP (BOARD OF DIREC-TORS' SALARIES CONSIST OF HARD WORK AND NOT MUCH THANKS). HAVE YOU EVER HAD 12 PEOPLE COMING TO YOUR HOME FOR DINNER AS AS YOU'RE MAKING THE GRAVY HAVE 6 OF THEM CALL TO SAY THEY CAN'T MAKE IT, OR STILL WORSE NEVER SHOW UP. THAT WEEK YOU HAD SPAGHETT! THREE TIMES A DAY. REMEMBER THE TIME YOU HAD UNEXPECTED GUESTS AND TRIED TO MAKE THREE COBS OF CORN STRETCH? BOTH HAVE HAPPENED AT YOUR LODGE. IT WILL HELP THE TRIP LEADER, COMMISSARY AND TRANSPORTATION DIRECTORS IF YOU WILL SIGN UP FOR A TRIP AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. IT MAKES A HARDSHIP ON ALL CONCERNED TO PLAN DETAILS AND HAVE ONE OF THE ABOVE HAPPEN. IT SHOULD BE A REQUIREMENT AND COURTESY TO OTHERS TO SIGN UP FOR ALL TRIPS. IF YOU MUST CANCEL - DO SO BEFORE REGISTRATION CLOSING TIME.

### THE STORY OF OUR OWN BACK YARD

THE STORY OF OUR OWN BACK YARD WAS THE THEME OF OUR GEOLOGIC FIELD TRIP, AS THE W.M.C. TRADED BOOTS FOR NOTEBOOKS, AND CLIMBED ABOARD OUR CHARTERED BUS FOR A FASCINATING TOUR LED BY PROFESSOR RAY E. MARSELL, OF THE U. OF U., OF OUR OWN VALLEY AND WASATCH MOUNTAINS.

PROFESSOR MARSELL EXPLAINED THAT THE WASATCH ARE THE THIRD RANGE BELIEVED TO HAVE OCCUPIED THIS SITE; THE MOST ANCIENT WERE FOLDED MOUNTS, THE SECOND VOLCANIC, AND THE PRESENT MAINLY A BLOCK FAULT RANGE. MOVEMENT ALONG THE FAULTS IS STILL OCCURING. THE PIPELINE FROM DEER CREEK RESERVOIR HAS BEEN BROKEN TWICE BY RECENT PRESSURES. WE INSEPCTED THE RARE, UNUSUALLY FINE EXPOSURE OF THE FACE OF THE FAULT AT THE GRAVEL PIT NEAR BECK'S, WHERE REMOVAL OF SAND AND GRAVEL HAS EXPOSED THE SLICK, POLISHED FACE OF THE WARM SPRINGS FAULT.

WE WERE SURPRISED TO LEARN THAT OUR VALLEY HAS CONTAINED THREE OTHER HUGE LAKES DURING THE PRECEDING (PLEISTOCENE) EPOCH. ALL THESE LAKES MAY BE CONSIDERED LAKE BONNEVILLE, SINCE THEY ARE APPARENTLY EXPANSIONS OF ONE BODY OF WATER WHICH GREW AND SHRANK, JUST AS IT IS NOW SHRINKING, WITH THE ADVANCE AND RETREAT OF THE ICE AGES. SHRUNKEN AND SALTY, LAKE BONNEVILLE IS STILL WITH US.

WE TOURED THE BASE OF THE WASATCH, NOTING THAT THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING IS BUILT ON ONE OF THE LOWER DELTAS OF CITY CREEK, AND ADMIRED THE EXCELLENT EXAMPLES OF DELTA FORE-SET BED EXPOSED IN THE CANYON WALLS. DIRECTLY BENEATH THE CEMENT BLOCK "U" IS THE BENCH WHICH MARKS THE LAKE'S HIGHEST LEVEL. AT THIS HEIGHT, THE LAKE OVERFLOWED AT RED ROCK PASS IN IDAHO AND EMPTIED INTO THE PACIFIC, VIA THE SNAKE AND COLUMBIA RIVERS.

PROFESSOR MARSELL EXPLAINED HOW THE LAKE BENCHES HAD BEEN FORMED. AT BIG COTTONWOOD WE SOLVED THE RIDDLE OF THE WANDERING BOULDERS AND STUDIED A HUGE SPIT CUT BY BIG COTTONWOOD CREEK AND BROKEN BY FAULTING.

A HIGH POINT OF THE TRIP WAS THE TOUR THROUGH THE UNIVERSITY'S GEOLOGY MUSEUM WHERE WE INSPECTED GREAT BEASTS FROM UTAH'S PAST AND A LARGE RELIEF MAP OF OUR STATE.

OUR SINCERE THANKS TO PROFESSOR MARSELL, WHO SO GENEROUSLY AND GRACIOUSLY GAVE HIS TIME AND KNOWLEDGE FOR THE CLUB'S ENJOYMENT AND EDUCATION, AS HE SHOWED US THAT THE ROCKS AND MOUNTAINS CAN SPEAK, IF ONE KNOWS HOW TO HEAR THEM.
