"UP ALL NIGHT AND HIKE ALL DAY," "BOY IS THIS WATER COLD," "LOOK AT THE BEAUTIFUL COLORS," "WHAT VIVID YELLOWS AND REDS," "LOOK HOW NARROW THIS CANYON IS," "LONG WAY STRAIGHT UP ISN'T IT," "HOW MANY TIMES ARE WE GOING TO CROSS THIS CREEK," "WHERE IN THE WORLD IS THAT FIRST CAMP," "WHERE IS THE EXIT TO THIS PLACE."

THE ABOVE REMARKS AND MANY OTHERS WERE BROUGHT ABOUT BY SOMEONE SUGGESTING A HIKE DOWN THE NARROWS IN ZION'S PARK, SINCE WE HAD A MEMBER WHO WAS ACQUAINTED WITH THE CANYON. SO THE HIKE WAS SCHED-ULED, PLANNED AND ORGANIZED BY O'DELL PETERSEN. A BUS FROM THE LAKESHORE LINES WAS USED TO PICK UP PEOPLE FROM THE SHOE SHOP TO THE STATE PRISON WHERE DICK BELL WAS THE LAST TO BOARD. SUPPER STOP WAS IN OREM AND COFFEE STOP ABOUT 2:30 A.M. SAT. SO BE IT AND IT CAME TO PASS THAT ALL WERE WET FROM THEIR KNEES DOWN WHEN THE FIRST CAMP WAS REACHED.

Supper was cooked, socks were rinsed out and dried, shoes propped up to dry, sleeping bags unrolled, some muscles massaged, (Bud's Bottle consumed), (whose Bottle - Ed.) and the sacks were hit and snores ensued from the congregation and the canyon walls reverberated with the music of the tired.

BREAKFAST WAS COOKED, CONSUMED, DIRTY DISHES PACKED (NOT WASHED) AND THE LAST LEG STARTED ABOUT 8:30 SUNDAY. MOST OF SUNDAY WAS SPENT IN

WATER AND A FEW DUNKINGS WERE HAD BY ALL. THE FIRST GROUP ARRIVED AT THE BUS ABOUT 3, NEXT GROUP ABOUT 3:30 AND THE LAST AROUND. 4:15. EVERYONE CLEANED UP AND CHANGED BLOTHES, BOARDED THE BUS AND HOME WE HEADED. SUPPER AT RICHFIELD HELPED BOLSTER SOME MIGHTY POOPED PEOPLE.
