BOARD ACTIONS

THE WMC BOARD OF DIRECTORS HAS RECENTLY ADOPTED TWO NEW REGULATIONS REGARDING CLUB ACTIVITIES.

- 1. A MEMBER WHO MAKES A RESERVATION INVOLVING THE CLUB IN EXPENSE, SUCH AS FOR THE PURCHASE OF FOOD, AND WHO NEITHER SHOWS NOR CANCELS ADEQUATELY IN ADVANCE, SHALL BE BILLED HALF THE SCHEDULED COST OF THE EVENT.
- ONLY MEMBERS SHALL BE PERMITTED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE MAJOR SCHEDULED CLUB TRIPS, EXCEPT THAT MEMBERS OF OTHER MOUNTAIN CLUBS, NOT RESIDENTS OF THIS AREA, SHALL HAVE THE PRIVI-LEGES OF MEMBERS.

THE NEED FOR THE FIRST OF THESE REREGULATIONS IS OBVIOUS. THE CLUB DOES NOT HAVE THE FUNDS TO PURCHASE FOOD - OR GUARANTEE A MINIMUM NUMBER OF FARES ON A BUS - AND THEN HAVE AN APPRECIABLE NUMBER NOT APPEAR. THE TIME GIVEN FOR CLOSE OF REGISTRATION IS MADE AS LATE AS POSSIBLE FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT PLAN FAR IN ADVANCE. PLEASE REGISTER EARLY IF YOU ARE GOING ON A TRIP; CANCEL EARLY IF YOUR PLANS MUST CHANGE.

IN REGARD TO THE SECOND REGULATION: GUESTS ARE, OF COURSE, WELCOME ON ALL LOCAL TRIPS. ATTENDANCE AT AT LEAST ONE CLUB EVENT IS USUALLY REQUIRED BEFORE A PERSON IS ELECTED TO MEMBERSHIP.

BUD TEMPLE HAS RESIGNED FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS HE IS MOVING TO THE SEATTLE AREA, AT LEAST FOR THE SUMMER. HIS LEADER-SHIP IN MOUNTAINEERING ACTIVITIES WILL BE GREATLY MISSED. THE BOARD REGRETS HIS DEPARTURE; MANY ALSO REGRET THAT THEY WILL BE UNABLE TO JOIN HIM IN HIS CLIMBS IN THE CASCADES OF WASHINGTON THESE NEXT MONTHS. HE WILL PROBABLY RETURN HERE WHEN THE SKIING GETS GOOD.

IT IS BELIEVED HIS PLACE ON THE BOARD WILL BE TAKEN BY J. CALVIN GIDDINGS, BUT CAL IS OUT OF TOWN FOR A COUPLE OF WEEKS.

BLOOD GROUP

IT HAS BEEN AGREED UPON BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTOFS OF THE W.M.C. TO START A BLOOD GROUP WITH THE AMERICAN RED CROSS UNDER THE NAME OF "WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB GROUP." THE BENEFITS OF SUCH A GROUP WILL BE:

- 1. ALL MEMBERS OF THE CLUB AND THEIR CLOSE FAMILIES WILL HAVE THE GROUP TO CALL ON FOR NEEDED BLOOD THRU THE A.R.C.
 - 2. WITHOUT SUCH A GROUP A CHARGE OF \$25 A PINT WILL BE ADDED

TO YOUR HOSPITAL CHARGE UNLESS THE BLOOD IS REPLACED WITHIN THE HOSPITAL.

- 3. A PATIENT CAN TELL THE HOSPITAL OF HIS GROUP ASSOCIATION WITH THE A.R.C. THE HOSPITAL CONTACTS THE A.R.C., WHICH IN TURN CALLS A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE GROUP FOR CONFIRMATION OF RELEASE. BLOOD IS SENT TO THE HOSPITAL, THE TRANSFUSION IS GIVEN AND NO CANRGE IS MADE FOR THE BLOOD.
- 4. Even the a patient may need more than the number of pints the group has credit for, the blood is still sent to the hospital and no charge will be made to the group by the A.R.C., but the group is expected to replace those that were used over the credit they had.
- 5. WITHOUT SUCH A GROUP CONTACT, THE PATIENT WILL STILL RECEIVE THE BLOOD, BUT HE WILL BE EXPECTED TO GET THE BLOOD REPLACED WITHIN 30 DAYS AFTER LEAVING THE HOSPITAL OR PAY \$25 A PINT FOR ALL NOT REPLACED. THIS APPLIES ALSO TO ANY OF THE BLOOD DIVIATES THAT MAY BE NEEDED.
- 6. Who can donate? Anyone Between the ages of 21 and 59. Also 18 to 21 with parents' consent.
- 7. You may donate blood every 8 weeks but not more than 5 times a year.
- 8. This is the only way that an individual who is not a group number may receive blood without being charged for it by the hospital if not replaced.

JULY 7-9 ONLY, THE PUBLIC SAFETY BLDG., 1ST SOUTH AND STATE. 11:00 A.M. TO 5:00 P.M.

TRANSPORTATION CAN BE ARRANGED BY THE A.R.C. FOR THOSE DESIRING IT ON FRIDAY.

THE LATTER-DAY-SAINTS HOSPITAL IS THE ONLY INSTITUTION NOT ACCEPTING RED CROSS BLOOD. ALL OTHER HOSPITALS AND CLINICS USE THE A.R.C. GROUP SYSTEM.

CAL IS ONE OF THE FEW WHO HAS CLIMBED TWIN PEAKS ALONG THE RIDGE FROM MT. SUPERIOR. HE HAS CLIMBED ALL OF THE NUMBERED ROUTES AT PETE'S ROCK, INCLUDING THE FORMIDABLE NUMBER 13. IN SEPTEMBER, 1956, HE CLIMBED THE DEVIL'S TOWER, IN WYOMING.

ANYONE WHO HAS SEEN OR TRIED TO FOLLOW CAL DOWN THE RACE COURSE AT ALTA CAN VOUCH FOR HIS ABILITY ON SKIS. WHILE MOST OF HIS SKIING HAS BEEN IN THE PROVO - SALT LAKE CITY AREA, IN THE Spring of 1956 He went on a skiing tour of Switzerland and Austria AND ALSO VISITED ENGLAND, GERMANY, AND DENMARK.

CAL IS ONE OF THE MOST MODEST PERSONS THIS WRITER HAS EVER MET. AFTER FOUR YEARS OF CLIMBING AND SKIING WITH HIM, IT WAS ONLY THREE WEEKS AGO THAT I LEARNED OF HIS HAVING A PH. D. HE RECEIVED HIS B.S. IN CHEMISTRY FROM B.Y.U. IN 1952.

IN 1954, IN JUST TWO YEARS, HE RECEIVED HIS PH.D. FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH IN PHYSICAL CHEMISTRY.

HE HAS WRITTEN SEVERAL ARTICLES IN CONJUNCTION WITH DEAN EYRING AND HAS FOURTEEN PUBLICATIONS OF HIS OWN TO HIS CREDIT. THESE ARTICLES ARE ON THEORETICAL CHEMISTRY AND ARE VERY COMPLEX. FOR EXAMPLE, HERE IS A TITLE OF ONE OF HIS ARTICLES: "STOCHASTIC CONSIDERATIONS ON CHROMATOGRAPHIC DISPERSION."

FOR THE UMPTEENTH TIME THE TRIP TO THE TOP OF MT. RAYMOND WAS CANCELLED; THE WEATHER, OF COURSE.

BOB, DORDY AND FAMILY ARE VACATIONING IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA FOR A FEW WEEKS. THEY EXPECT TO SEE DISNEYLAND, CINERAMA AND THE OTHER ATTRACTIONS THAT CALIFORNIA OFFERS.

FOR TWO WEEKS OR SO, HAROLD GOODRO, GARY LARSEN AND BILL SPENCER HAVE BEEN IN THE SUMMER NATIONAL GUARD CAMP, WORKING ON THE BRIGHTON-MIDWAY ROAD.

On June 24, Bud Temple Left for the Northwest for the summer. HE EXPECTS TO BE BACK IN THE FALL.

CAL GIDDINGS IS REPLACING HIM - ON THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, THAT IS!

SHIPROCK ADVENTURE BY HAROLD GOODRO

AFTER PLANNING AND SCHEMING FOR SEVERAL MONTHS, LEE STEORTS AND I ARRIVED AT THE AIRPORT AT NOON ON FRIDAY, MAY 24, ALL PACKED AND READY TO TAKE OFF. THE WEATHER WAS TERRIBLE, THE LIFHT PLANES WERE GROUNDED, AND LEE WAS SUFFERING FROM A DEEP COLD AND SORE THROAT. HE DECIDED TO GO HOME TO BED. I JUST COULDN'T LET A DREAM FADE, SO AFTER TALKING MRS. G. INTO GOING WITH ME ON 10 MINUTES NOTICE, WE JUMPED INTO THE STATION WAGON AND WERE OFF. ARRIVING IN THE AREA OF SHIPPOCK AT MIDNIGHT, WE STARTED LOOKING FOR DICK WOODFORD AND MIKE, HIS FRIEND. THEY HAD DRIVEN DOWN FROM CAMP CARSON TO JOIN US.

By sheer luck alone, we found them camping in the desert. At 5 A.M. next morning, we were on our way to the base of the peak. Dick and Mike had decided to try a 2nd ascent up a new route called Long's Col, so up we went. We alternated leads up the long smooth col with all friction climbing and very few belay points. We climbed up a blind pitch and were turned back in the right col. After 6 hours of climbing (all friction), we arrived at the top of the Black Bowl, which is the usual route. A real tricky lead by Mike across the top of the bowl was followed by a hasty rappel 140 feet down to the customary bivouac place.

IT WAS THEN 3 P.M. AND CONTRARY TO ALL GOOD SENSE, WE DECIDED TO TRY FOR THE TOP. WE RAPPELED DOWN ANOTHER 120 FEET; THEN A 120 FOOT TRAVERSE OF TERRIFIC EXPOSURE ON THE FRICTION SLABS, BROUGHT US AROUND THE CORNER TO THE OPPOSITE SIDE OF THE PEAK. WE THEN ARRIVED AT THE "DOUBLE OVERHAND" WHERE MANY PARTIES HAVE TURNED BACK.

DICK DECIDED TO LEAD THE FIRST OVERHANG AND STARTED PLACING PITONS FOR TENSION CLIMBING. AS HE WORKED HIS WAY UP, THE FIRST PITON HE PUT HIS WEIGHT ON SAME OUT AND DICK SAILED OUTWARD AND DOWN. I, AS BELAYER, WAS TRYING TO PULL IN SLACK AND GIVE A DYNAMIC BELAY AT THE SAME TIME. DICK LIT ON THE EDGE OF THE SHELF AND SLID TO THE EDGE AS HE CAUGHT ON TO THE ROCK WITH HIS HANDS. VERY CLOSE ESCAPE FOR 2 OF US ABOVE A HUGE DROP. DICK'S SECOND TRY WAS SUCCESSFUL, AFTER WHICH HE BROUGHT MIKE UP TO LEAD THE SECOND OVERHANG. AFTER A BIG STRUGGLE, HE MADE IT AND SOON WE WERE ON THE WAY UP THE BIG "ZEE", MORE FRICTION CLIMBING.

WE WERE GETTING NEAR THE SUMMIT, BUT IT WAS GETTING LATE. NEXT DICK LED A TENSION CLIMB UP THE "SPORHUNG" WHICH SEEMS TO LEAN OUT OVER THE GREAT FACE OF 1800 FEET SHEER. MIKE LED ONE MORE TENSION PITCH UP THE FINAL CRACK AND WERE WERE ON THE TOP. OUR ELATION WAS DAMPENED BY THE FACT THAT IT WAS 7:30 P.M.: WE HAD ONE HOUR LEFT BEFORE DARK.

AFTER TWO TERRIFIC 120 FOOT RAPPELS AND A SCRAMBLE DOWN THE BIG "Z", WE WERE READY TO RAPPEL DOWN THE DOUBLE OVERHANG. AFTER MIKE AND I WENT DOWN, IT WAS DICK'S TURN. WE WERE STANDING ON A LEDGE, UNROPED, WHEN WE HEARD A YELL AND DICK CAME SAILING OVER THE

LEDGE ABOVE US, ALMOST LANDING ON TOP OF US. HIS RAPPEL ROPE HAD JAMMED SOMEHOW AND THEN SUDDENLY ALLOWED ABOUT 20 FEET OF SLACK. LUCKILY HE HUNG TO HIS RAPPEL STANCE AND WAS SAVED. IT WAS NOW PITCH DARK AND WE SPENT 2 1/2 HOURS CROSSING THE 200 FEET OF GREAT SLABS BY THE GROPE AND TOUCH SYSTEM.

HAD THE STRENGTH LEFT TO HAND-OVER-HAND UP OUR LAST FIXED ROPE TO OUR BIVOUAC SHELF. | HELPED DICK AND MIKE UP WITH A LOT OF PULLING AND SOON WE WERE EATING AND ROLLING OUT OUR SLEEPING BAGS. ON THE SMALLEST SHELVES ! EVER HOPE TO SLEEP ON. IT WAS NOW 11:30 P.M. AT 5:30 A.M. WE WERE READY TO GO AGAIN. WE HAD TO PRUSSIK UP A 120 FOOT FIXED ROPT TO START, BUT SOON WE WERE AT THE TOP OF THE BIG BOWL. NEXT CAME TWO WONDERFUL RAPPELS DOWN THE LOOSE SHEER HEADWALL OF THE BOWL. THEN, AFTER SOME CAREFUL CLIMBING DOWN VERY LOOSE ROCKS, WE HAD TWO MORE RAPPELS AND WERE BACK ON TALUS SLOPES AGAIN. HELEN WAS WAITING WITH REFRESHMENTS. IT WAS NOON AND WE FELT WONDERFUL ABOUT OUR CLIMB. WE HAD BEEN GONE FOR 30 HOURS OF WHICH WE SLEPT 5. WE WERE THE FIRST TO MAKE IT TO THE TOP AND BACK TO THE BIVOUAC IN ONE DAY. A GROUP OF FOUR FELLOWS FROM COLORADO LEFT THAT MORNING AFTER SPENDING 3 DAYS ON THE PEAK AND ONLY GETTING ONE-THIRD OF THE WAY UP.

I CAN ONLY SAY THAT MAKING THIS CLIMB WITH DICK AND MIKE WAS THE MOST EXCITING THING I HAVE EVER DONE AND WHAT A GREAT PLEASURE IT WAS TO CLIMB WITH THOSE TWO.

TWIN PEAKS - MAY 26 BY KURT ROSENFELD

THERE IS STILL A LOT OF SNOW IN THE MOUNTAINS, AND THAT MAY HAVE BEEN THE REASON FOR THE MEAGER TURNOUT. AS IT WAS, OUR GROUP CONSISTED OF ONLY SIX PEOPLE.

THE SNOW STILL REACHES DOWN TO THE CREEK, AND FROM THERE ON WE HAD A ROUGH TIME BREAKING TRAIL. PETE AND YENTA KAUFMANN GAVE US THEIR BLESSINGS AT THE LOWER MEADOW AND TURNED BACK. GENE HIGGENBOTHAM, RONNIE PETERSEN, BOB GOODRO AND I MARCHED ON, THROUGH SOFT SNOW WHICH MADE US SINK IN WITH EVERY STEP. SEVERAL AVLANCHES MUST HAVE COME DOWN THE DAY BEFORE, AND CORNICES WERE BREAKING LOOSE ALL AROUND US AS WE FINALLY REACHED THE SADDLE. THE MANY OVERHANGS AND CORNICES MADE AN ATTEMPT FOR THE PEAK IMPOSSIBLE. SO WE STARTED OUR WAY DOWN, BUT AGAIN THE SOFT SNOW PLAYED A TRICK ON US, AND THERE WAS NO GLISSADING WHATSOEVER. SOON OUR FROZEN FEET GOT BACK SOME FEELING, AND WE WERE BACK HOME IN TIME FOR A LIESURLY AFTERNOON UNDER A SHADY TREE IN THE BACK YARD.
