THIS MONTH'S PERSONALITY: KURT ROSENFELD

KURT ARRIVED IN NEW YORK CITY FROM BERN, SWITZERLAND, ON AUGUST 15, 1950.

AT THAT TIME KURT'S COUSINS, HANS AND ELSY REICH (CLUB MEMBERS) WERE RESIDING IN SALT LAKE CITY, AND KURT LEFT NEW YORK TO JOIN THEM HERE.

KURT HAD BEEN HERE ONLY A FEW DAYS WHEN HANS AND ELSY, WHO WERE QUITE ACTIVE IN THE CLUB, INVITED HIM TO CLIMB PROVO PEAK WITH THEM. THIS WAS THE BEGINNING OF KURT'S ACTIVITIES IN THE WASATCH MT. CLUB.

AT FIRST, KURT HAD A HARD TIME UNDERSTANDING ENGLISH, BUT AS TIME WENT ON HIS UNDERSTANDING AND SPEECH IMPORVED GREATLY.

STRANGELY ENOUGH, KURT HAD NEVER CLIMBED ANY MOUNTAINS PRIOR TO HIS ARRIVAL HERE, ALTHOUGH HE HAD SKIED SOME BACK HOME.

Kurt continued to climb with the Club. On the side he made such trips as the rarely climbed Cottonwood Ridge, Twin Peaks on skiis, and many others in the Wasatch. Over the Labor Day weekend in 1955, Kurt made the trip that separates the climbers from the boys - the double traverse of the Grand Canyon (45 miles) in 21 hours.

IN EARLY 1956, KURT WAS INTRODUCED TO LYNN SMITH OF LAYTON. AT THAT TIME LYNN WAS LIVING AT THE PIPHI HOUSE ON THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH CAMPUS. THEIR FIRST DATE TOOK THEM TO ALTA'S SKIING SLOPES. ALTA MUST HAVE BEEN A GOOD OMEN FOR THEM - THEY ARE TO BE MARRIED THIS OCTOBER 19.

I AM LOOKING FORWARD TO SEEING BOTH KURT AND LYNN AT ALL OF OUR FUTURE CLUB ACTIVITIES.

BEAR LAKE - AUG. 24-25

WE MET AT WASATCH SPRINGS ONE BY ONE AND, AFTER THE USUAL PAUSE TO COLLECT THE GROUP, STRAGGLED UP TO BEAR LAKE TO GUS RICH'S. THIS IS A FAIRLY CIVILIZED RESORT WITH CABINS OF LOGS SLICED UP WHOLE - WITHOUT BEING PEELED - GIVING A QUEER WAVY EFFECT.

FORTUNATELY, DEAN HAD FINISHED HIS SPECIAL EXPENSES-PAID VACATION AND WE HAD HIS BOAT AND ED GIBB'S, A VERY POWERFUL ONE. WE HAD DOUBLE SKIS, SLALOM SKIS, BANANA PEELS, SHOE SKIS, AND A SAUCER NOBODY GOT AROUND TO. THE PIER WAS LINED ALL UP AND DOWN WITH SKIS. EVERYBODY SKIED LIKE CRAZY. COKE MUST HAVE GONE HALF WAY AROUND THE LAKE. SHE WAS DOING SO WELL, SHE TOLD US SHE WENT BACKWARD ON A SLALOM SKI AND WE BELIEVED HER! BUD SUCCEEDED IN SPENDING ALL AFTERNOON SAILING THE LITTLE BOAT AROUND THE CORNER FROM THE LAUNCHING PLACE TO THE PIER. SYBIL GAVE UP AND ACCEPTED A RESCUE AT SEA AFTER HAVING BEEN DUMPED SEVERAL TIMES.

BY EVENING THE WATER HAD TURNED TO GLASS AND DIE-HARDS SKIED UNTIL DINNER. RATTLESNAKES WERE DISCUSSED AND A FEW PROVIDERS OF ANTI-SNAKE BITE PREPARATIONS DISTRIBUTED HOT TODDIES. MOST PARTIED, ESPECIALLY DEAN AND VERA.

KING'S PEAK ADVENTURE AUG. 31 - SEPT. 2 BY HAROLD GOODRO

IT ALL STARTED WITH THE ALARM CLOCK EXPLODING AT 3:30 A.M. ON SATURDAY MORNING. AN HOUR AND A HALF LATER, WHILE STILL HALF ASLEEP, OUR GROUP WAS IN TWO CARS HEADED UP PARLEY'S CANYON ON THE WAY TO THE HIGH UINTA COUNTRY. IN MY CAR WERE DENNIS McSharry, JANET CHRISTENSEN, BOB GOODRO AND RONNIE PETERSEN. IN DOROTHY BUNTING'S CAR WERE CARL BAUER, BOB CONROD AND PATTY PARMALEE.

AN UNEVENTFUL DRIVE TO BRIDGER, WYOMING, UNDER DARKENING SKIES, WAS THE FIRST PART. TWENTY-THREE MILES OF ROUGH ROAD TO LONE TREE FOLLOWED. IN THIS STRETCH DOROTHY'S CAR DEVELOPED A FLAT TIRE,

WHICH WAS QUICKLY CHANGED WITH THE COMBINED EFFORTS OF ALL NINE OF US. NEXT CAME EIGHT MILES OF TWICE AS ROUGH ROAD WITH SEVERAL WET CREEK CROSSINGS. WE NOW ENTERED HENRY'S FORK CANYON AND THE ROAD BECAME A NIGHTMARE FOR THE NEXT SEVEN MILES. A VERY POOR KIND OF MUSIC WAS MADE BY THE NETAL PARTS UNDER THE CARS CONTINUALLY HITTING ROCKS OR DRAGGING ON THE HIGH CENTER OF THE ROAD.

After driving to the end where the road turned into a deer path, we finally proceeded on foot with our heavy packs. The next six miles were fairly nice in spite of the recurring hall storms and the cold wind. A very beautiful, grassy camp site was found and in short order the tents were pitched and dinner was cooking. In the morning, although we got up at 6 A.M., it was 8:45 before we hit the trail.

THE HIKE UP THROUGH THE UPPER BASIN MEADOWS WAS SOMETHING TO REMEMBER. MANY SMALL LAKES AND VARI-COLORED CLIFFS ADD TO THE SCENERY. A LONG TRAVERSE AROUND AN UNAMED PEAK LED FROM GUN SIGHT PASS TO ANDERSON PASS. WE WERE FINALLY ON KING'S PEAK MASSIF AND A SHORT TIME LATER ON THE NORTH SUMMIT. THIS LAST PART WAS QUITE TRICKY, DUE TO ABOUT EIGHT INCHES OF NEW SNOW ON THE MOUNTAIN.

FROM THE NORTH PEAK, SIX OF US RACED FOR THE SOUTH PEAK, THE HIGHER BY JUST TWO FEET, BUT CLOSE TO A MILE AWAY ON A SNOW COVED RIDGE. WE WERE BACK ON THE NORTH PEAK AN HOUR AND A HALF LATER. IT WAS TRULY A GRAND VIEW IN EVERY DIRECTION AND THE CAMERAS WERE CLICKING MADLY.

IT WAS 4:45 P.M. AND WE WERE SIX OR SEVEN MILES FROM CAMP. WE MADE GOOD TIME ONCE WE WERE BACK AT THE PASS. MOST OF US NOW HAD BRUISES FROM SLIPS ON THE SNOW COVERED BOULDER FIELD. THE SUN ON THE RED CLIFFS WAS GLANCED AT MANY TIMES OVER OUR SHOULDERS AS WE HURRIED BACK THROUGH THE HUGE BASIN TOWARD CAMP. WE ARRIVED AT 8:45 P.M. AFTER LOSING THE TRAIL IN THE DARK SEVERAL TIMES. IT HAS BEEN A VERY WONDERFUL AND FULL DAY. ON THE WAY OUT TO OUR CARS THE NEXT DAY, BOBBY G. CAUGHT HIS LIMIT OF TEN NICE FISH FROM THE STREAM. THE ROAD GOING OUT SEEMED EVEN ROUGHER AND BOTH CARS WERE DAMAGED. NEXT TIME WE WILL TAKE JEEPS.
