MOUNTAINEERING NOTES BY CALVIN GIDDINGS

A NUMBER OF NOTABLE CLIMBS, EXPEDITIONS, AND EXCURSIONS INVOLVING THE MORE VERTICAL ASPECTS OF MOUNTAIN TERRAIN HAVE TAKEN THE TIME OF CLUB MEMBERS AS THIS MOUNTAINEERING SEASON DRAWS TO A HALFWAY POINT. Some OF THESE CLIMBS ARE ON A PAR WITH THE BEST IN THE NATION. HERE IS A LIST OF SOME OF THE PARTICIPANTS, ALONG WITH THEIR CLIMBS:

BUD TEMPLE AND PATTY PARMALEE CLIMBED MT. OWEN OVER THE JULY 4TH WORK RECESS. MT. OWEN, THE SECOND HIGHEST IN THE TETONS, IS FAMOUS FOR ITS HANGING SNOWFIELD.

JEN GIDDINGS, ALEXIS KELNERS, WISCONSIN VISITOR BOB WEST, AND I CLIMBED THE DURRANCE RIDGE ON SYMMETRY SPIRE IN MID-JUNE. ALTHOUGH RATED AS CLASS 4 (NO DOUBT THE GUIDE BOOK WRITER HAD A VERY GOOD DAY HERE) IT IS AS DIFFICULT AS SOME CLASS 5 CLIMBS. THE STEEP 1000 FT. RIDGE IS AN EXCEPTIONALLY ENJOYABLE CLIMB FEATURING GOOD EXPOSURE AND EXCELLENT ROCK.

ALEXIS KELNERS AND DICK BELL MADE THE SECOND ASCENT FOR "KELNERS CORNER" IN THE STORM MOUNTAIN AREA. THIS CLIMB IS ALONG THE EDGE OF A SMOOTH FACE WHICH IS BROKEN BY UPSIDE-DOWN LEDGES (OTHERWISE KNOWN AS OVERHANGS). THE EXPOSURE OF THIS CLIMB IS RARELY EQUALLED, EVEN IN THE TETONS.

DICK BELL AND BOB CONRAD ASCENDED THE INSIDE CORNER WHICH IS SECOND TO THE LEFT OF "KELNER'S CORNER". AS FAR AS I KNOW, THE FIRST ASCENT. DIFFICULT!

OUR GROUP OF DICK, ALEXIS, AND I RETURNED TO THE WEST FACE OF LONE PEAK, THIS TIME TO MAKE AN ASCENT DIRECTLY UP THE SUMMIT MASSIVE. AFTER ELEVEN HOURS OF SEVERE ROCK CLIMBING, WE EMERGED TO MEET THE SETTING SUN WITHIN TEN FEET OF THE SUMMIT REGISTER.

HAROLD GOODRO, DICK BELL, AND GARY LARSON ARE AT THIS WRITING IN THE TETONS CLIMBING THE DIRECT SOUTH RIDGE OF MORAN. THE 5000 VERTICAL FEET OF THIS RIDGE APPARENTLY MAKE IT THE LONGEST ROPED CLIMB IN THE COUNTRY. THE CALIBER OF THIS CLIMB IS INDICATED IN THE GUIDEBOOK: "IT CONTAINS TECHNICALLY THE MOST DIFFICULT PITCH IN THE (TETON) PARK". WE ALL WISH SUCCESS TO THE THREE.

OUR THURSDAY NIGHT CLIMBING SESSIONS ARE NOW IN FULL SWING AT

STORM MOUNTAIN AND EVERYONE IS INVITED TO COME OUT WITH US. RECENT ADDITIONS TO THE CLIMBING GROUP INCLUDE JOHN DESPAIN AND LARRY LOVE, BOTH SHOWING A GREAT DEAL OF CLIMBING ABILITY. WITH SOME MORE PRACTICE, THESE TWO SHOULD MAKE EXCELLENT ROPE LEADERS.

ALTHOUGH THE PROSPECT IS SLOW, WE ARE STILL IN HOPES OF NAMING AND GRADING (AS TO DIFFICULITY) THE PROMINENT CLIMBS IN THE STORM MOUNTAIN AREA. SUGGESTIONS ARE WELCOME FROM ANYONE. THE NAME OF A CLIMB SHOULD DISPLAY SOME HISTORICAL EVENT (SUCH AS A FIRST ASCENT) OR SOME PROMINENT FEATURE OF THE CLIMB. HOW ABOUT THESE?

"THE PEDESTAL CLIMB", THE MODERATE CLIMB ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE ROAD WHERE THE QUARTZITE AND THE BLUE-BLACK SHALE JOIN. SO NAMED FOR THE OUTCROP WHICH ONE STANDS ON (AS A STATUE) TO BELAY THOSE FOLLOWING.

"Kelner's Corner", That exposed overhanging corner one hundred yards up canyon from the Pedestal climb.

"GOODRO'S CHIMNEY", A SINGLE PITCH RATHER THAN A LONG CLIMB, NEAR THE PICNIC AREA. THIS DIFFICULT CHIMNEY WAS FIRST CLIMBED BY HAROLD GOODRO.

A VISIT TO THE HUMBOLDT NATIONAL FOREST, OR LAMOILLE I SEE YOU, LAMOILLE I WANT YOU BY ROGER DORRELL AS TOLD TO AUSTIN WAHRHAFTIG, WHO WAS THERE TOO.

JULY 4-6, 1958

THE DESERT AIR HAD TAKEN ON A DECIDED NATURALLY-REFRIGERATED CRISPNESS AS TWO CAR-LOADS OF WOMACERS AND THEIR GUEST, DOROTHY PARKS, LEFT WELLS, NEVADA, A LITTLE AFTER MIDNIGHT, JULY 4 ON THEIR WAY TOWARD ANGEL LAKE, 12 MILES DISTANT, HIGH IN THE EAST HUMBOLDT RANGE. FROM THE NARROW DIRT (AND DUSTY, FOR THOSE IN THE SECOND CAR) ROAD WE HAD A SPECTACULAR VIEW OF THE VALLEY TO THE EAST, WHERE IN THE BRIGHT MOONLIGHT WE COULD SEE THE SILHOUETTES OF THE INDEPENDENCE AND PEQUOP MOUNTAINS. AFTER AN HOUR'S DRIVE, WE ARRIVED AT THE LAKE AND FOUND CLIX BYRNE AND HAROLD BINGHAM, WHO HAD LEFT SALT LAKE CITY FOUR HOURS EARLIER THAN WE DID, ALL SNUG IN THEIR TENT. THE LATE HOUR AND THE POLAR BREEZE PRECLUDED A WARMER WELCOME SO WITH SURPRISING SPEED THE WEARY AND COLD LATECOMERS CRAWLED INTO THEIR SLEEPING BAGS.

The first rays of the sun brought Roger Dorrell and Clare Sundwall from their frosty cocoons to bask in its warmth while the others continued their hibernation. Meanwhile, fishermen from other campsites around the lake were busy pulling the fish in with apparant ease. About 7 AM, our camp was astir and while the menu for breakfast was being discussed, our co-leader, Ruby Wahrhaftig, returned with a string of fish, telling us a little 5 year old boy had twisted her arm to take them, asking her not to tell

ANYONE: AFTER BREAKFAST, HAVING HAD THE FRESH FISH AS AN APPETIZER, SEVERAL OF OUR GROUP BEGAN TO FRATERNIZE WITH THE FISHING GROUPS AND MANAGED TO FINAGLE AN INVITATION FOR FISHING LESSONS ON THE OPPOSITE IDE OF THE LAKE WHERE A STREAM FED BY A WATERFALL ENTERED. SO WHILE CLIX CAVORTED UP AND AROUND THE WATERFALL, AND ROGER WAITED PATIENTLY FOR A CLOUD'S SHADOW TO MOVE OFF A LARGE DEAD TREE, AND DOROTHY BUNTING AND DOROTHY PARKS WATCHED, THE REST OF OUR GROUP ATTENDED FISHING SCHOOL. WITHIN AN HOUR WE HAD ENOUGH FOR THE NEXT MORNING'S BREAKFAST. (IT WAS NOT PERHAPS SO MUCH THE SKILL AND EXPERIENCE OF OUR FISHERMEN, BUT MORE LIKELY THE INEXPERIENCE OF THE FISH. THE LAKE HAD BEEN PLANTED ONLY THE DAY BEFORE!)

TAKING LEAVE OF ANGEL LAKE WE HEADED FOR LAMOILLE CANYON, MAKING A LOOP SOUTH ALONG THE WEST SIDE OF RUBY VALLEY. THE VALLEY IS WIDE AND FLAT WITH MANY MARSHY AREAS. CATTLE RAISING SEEMS TO BE THE MAIN ACTIVITY. WE HAD PLANNED ON GOING TO THE SOUTH END OF THE VALLEY TO SEE RUBY LAKE, A WILDLIFE REFUGE, BUT WERE ADVISED BY A NATIVE IT WOULD BE OF INTEREST ONLY TO DUCKS AND DUCK HUNTERS. HAVING NEITHER WITH US, WE DECIDED TO GO DIRECTLY WEST OVER HENDERSON PASS AND UP TO LAMOILLE CANYON WHERE WE ARRIVED AT 5 PM. IMMEDIATELY WE SET UP CAMP IN A THICK PATCH OF ASPEN TREES. WE SOON HAD DINNER COOKED, EATEN, AND THE DISHES WASHED ALL BEFORE DARK, AND RETIRED TO THE SMOKY WARMTH OF THE CAMPFIRE WHERE WE LISTENED INCREDULOUSLY TO THE STORIES CLIX AND HAROLD TOLD OF HOW THEY FRIGHTEN WOMEN AND CHILDREN AND OTHER INNOCENT CREATURES WITH THEIR BIZARRE COSTUMES. BUT EVEN THOSE FANASTIC TALES COULD NOT KEEP US FROM TURNING IN EARLY TO CATCH UP ON SOME MUCH-NEEDED SLEEP.

THE NEXT MORNING, AFTER A SUMPTUOUS FISH BREAKFAST, WE TOOK OFF TO EXPLORE THREE LAKES IN UPPER LAMOILLE CANYON. LAMOILLE CANYON IS A WIDE, U-SHAPED, GLACIER CARVED VALLEY WITH MANY KNIFE-EDGE PEAKS, SOME 11,000 FEET PLUS. THE FIRST LAKE, AT AN ELEVATION OF 9500 FEET WAS MOSTLY SURROUNDED BY FIELDS OF SNOW, WITH SNOWBANKS COMING RIGHT DOWN INTO THE WATER. CLIX. FOR THE BENEFIT OF HIS STEREO CAMERA, PERSUADED CLARE AND JANET CHRISTENSEN TO JOIN HIM IN A SERIES OF POLAR BEAR STUNTS. WE ARE WAITING TO SEE HOW THEIR GOOSEBUMPS LOOK IN 3-D: AFTER EATING LUNCH, WE HIKED TO THE SECOND LAKE A FEW HUNDRED YARDS TO THE NORTH. THEN TO THE THIRD LAKE, COMPLETELY SURROUNDED BY SNOW, WHICH WE FOUND WAS STILL FROZEN OVER. CRACKS NEAR THE EDGE INDICATED THE ICE WAS MANY FEET THICK. A SIGN PROJECTING NEARBY SAID THE ELEV-ATION WAS 9700 FEET. IT WAS A MORE ANIMATED GROUP THAT ASSEMBLED AROUND THE CAMPFIRE THAT EVENING AFTER A WAHRHAFTIG DINNER SUPREME. DODGING FLYING WOOD CHIPS AS HAROLD WITH HIS TRUSTY AXE MADE US SOME "COMFORTABLE LIVING ROOM FURNITURE", WE SANG AND LISTENED TO MORE IMPROBABLE TALES.

Next morning after breakfast, we set out to explore Thomas anyon in which we were actually camped. We followed a trail that paralleled a mountain stream in which there were many small waterfalls. Clix was again in and out of every pothole he found on the way up, photographing like mad. Time being limited we were not able to go all the way to the head of the canyon, but we did arrive on the

WHILE THE HUMBOLDT NATIONAL FOREST AND THE RUBY MOUNTAINS MAY HAVE BEEN A NEW EXPERIENCE FOR THE MOUNTAIN CLUB, WE, IN OUR TURN, FEEL WE ENRICHED ONE LIFE IN RUBY VALLEY. WHILE MOTOR-CYCLING SOUTH IN THE VALLEY, HAROLD, WITH DOROTHY BUNTING RIDING SECOND SADDLE, STOPPED AT A HOUSE TO ASK WHERE HE MIGHT GET SOME GASOLINE. BEFORE ANSWERING, THE RUBYITE ASKED HAROLD WHAT HE CALLED THE THING HE WAS RIDING. HAROLD REPLIED THAT IT WAS A MOTORCYCLE. IMPRESSED, THE MAN GAVE HAROLD THE NECESSARY DIRECTIONS AND WENT INTO THE HOUSE. HARDLY HAD THE DOOR SHUT WHEN HE REAPPEARED AND SAID, "Y' KNOW, THIS IS THE FIRST TIME ONE OF THOSE CONTRAPTIONS EVER CAME DOWN THIS ROAD!". THEN DIS-
