COLORADO RIVER TRIP MAY 30-JUNE 2

So that all may obtain a trustworthy account of this trip, we present here two versions, one from each of the two boats. The first article is by Steve and Norma Macdonald, the second by Jen Giddings.

ITINERARY NOTES: GLORIOUS LEADERS' BOAT OR THE S.S.DERBIDGE BOAT #1

Speedy getaway at 9:00 P.M. Thursday. School bus built for 12 year olds to Green River. Dirt road about 125 miles to Hite. Crossed stream 60 times to breakfast at the 11:00 A.M. Launching site. River very high running about 8 miles per hour. Boats ran 5-6 miles per hour without motors. Derbidge overshot proposed canyon and we camped near Lake Canyon in the dark--other boat upstream.

MORNING: 3 MILE HIKE UP LAKE CANYON: CLEAR WATER, CASCADING FALLS, SWELL CLIFF DWELLINGS AND MUCH WIGGLING OF TOES IN POND. BACK TO DERBIDGE AND OFF. SWIM, SWIM, SWIM-SMALL RAPID. STOP AT SMALL CLEAR WATER CANYON. COLD EMERALD POOL WITH FRESH WATER SPOUTING OUT OF MOUNTAIN. REPLENISHED SUPPLY. WARM WATER TRICKLING OVER ROCKS ABOVE POOL. WARM FALLS ABOVE THAT. BATHED IN ROCK POCKETS AND UNDER FALLS. OFF AGAIN TO COMPLETE OUR DAILY 40 MILES OF RIVER TO FORBIDDEN CANYON-A LARGER FRESH WATER INLET. LARGE CLEAR POOLS WITH FISH AND SANDY CAMP SITE. SOME STAYED IN CAMP, THAT WISHED DINNER OR PREFERRED SWIMMING. OTHERS, RAN 6 MILES TO SPECTACULAR RAINBOW BRIDGE IN THOUR 45 MIN. ARRIVED JUST AT DUSK. FULL MOON COMING UP UNDER ARCH. HIKE BACK IN DARK TOOK A LITTLE LONGER-3 1/2 HOURS. MOST HIKERS TOO TIRED FOR DINNER AT 12:00 P.M. TOTAL FOR DAY: 40 MILES RIVER, 18 MILES HIKING, 5 MILES SWIMMING.

Morning: Off Early After Soap Baths to a hidden canyon with Shallow Clear Water. Motored in about a mile, walked in 2 miles looking for hole deep enough to swim. Back to Derbidge and down stream to Kane Creek or Crossing of the Fathers. Both boats made orderly

ALL SLEPT WELL.

CRASH LANDINGS ABOUT 12:30. BY 2:00 P.M. EVERYTHING WAS STOWED IN THE BUS. UNDER THE SKEPTICAL EYE OF SEVERAL OTHER RIVER PARTIES, WE WALKED THE BUS OUT OF THE CANYON. ONLY ONCE WERE WE AIR BORNE IN A DIP WHERE THE BUS MADE A NEAT BRIDGE FROM THE REAR END OF THE BUS (ON GRADE) TO THE FRONT WHEELS. THE REAR WHEELS WERE FLOATING. JACKS DID THE TRICK. THE REST OF THE DAY WE SPENT GORGING OURSELVES ON

LEMONADE, ICE SCREAM MILK, AND OTHER TASTE SENSATIONS. THE NIGHT WE SPENT IN THE LUXURIOUS COMFORT OF THE SCHOOL BUS AND ARRIVED HOME

LIFE ON THE S. S. ANTI-DERBIDGE

SLIGHTLY RECOVERED FROM THE BUS RIDE AND STOWED IN OUR MORE COMFORTABLE BOAT WE SHOVED OFF SHORE AND FOLLOWED JIM KENNEY AND HIS CREW DOWN THE COLORADO. THE MEMBERS IN OUR BOAT WERE, FROM FRONT TO BACK, LOG SWEEPER ALBERT FUNK AND HIS ABLE CREW COURTNEY CAMPBELL AND WIFE AND UTE GROSCHEL. BEHIND THEM WAS ALEXIS KELNERS OUR CINEMA STAR WHO SOMEHOW MANAGED TO SQUEEZE INTO EVERYONE'S PICTURES. TOWARD THE MIDDLE WERE ANN PROVSTGARD, ANNETTE MORTENSEN AND MYSELF. MOST OF OUR CREW, INSTEAD OF WASTING A NIGHT'S SLEEP HIKING, DIDN'T
GO TO SEE IT BUT AGAIN WENT FOR A SHORT SWIM. HOWEVER, FOR FIVE
OF US THE NIGHT SEEMED DESTINED FOR OTHER THINGS THAN SLEEPING-WE SPENT ALL OF IT CHASING IMAGINARY ANIMALS (PROBABLY PORCUPINES)
WHO WERE RUSTLING IN THE TREES ABOVE US. AND THEN ALEXIS WOKE

UP WITH A FROG SIX INCHES AWAY STARING HIM IN THE EYE. WHAT A YELL!

IT WAS ALMOST AS LOUD AS WHEN LLOYD CLUFF FOUND THE FROGS WE PUT IN HIS CAMERA CASE.

Morning finally came and we all were off on our final river day. We had time to explore a couple more canyons and then arrived at the spot where we were to disembark.
