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BOX ELDER PEAK - SEPTEMBER 14

WE GOT LOST BEFORE WE GOT STARTED. THE MOUNTAIN HAD AGAIN BEEN MOVED, SO WE CLIMBED STRAIGHT UP THE HILLSIDE FOR FIFTEEN MINUTES UNTIL WE REACHED THE TRAIL, AN IMPROVEMENT OVER PREVIOUS EXPERIENCES. GEORGE UNSELD AND PA PERRY HAD PREFERRED TO STAY AROUND THE CAMP. BELOW THE SADDLE WE MET PETE, WHO WAS ON HIS WAY DOWN. HE HAD TAKEN AN EARLIER GROUP AND MARY TUTTLE WAS GLAD TO ACCEPT A PARKA FROM HIM, FOR WE ENCOUNTERED TRACES OF FRESH SNOW AND THE BARE RIDGE BELOW THE TOP LEFT US EXPOSED TO A BITING WIND. BUT THIS HIKE IS ALWAYS WORTH THE EFFORT, AND WHEN WE REACHED THE TOP A FIRE WAS AWAITING US. BILL KAMP AND RONNIE PETERSEN, AS WELL AS DR. SAMUEL THOMAS, AN ARDENT ADMIRER OF THESE WASATCH MOUNTAINS, GREETED BY BY THE FIRESIDE.

WE CHOSE TO GO DOWN ON THE OTHER SIDE, WHICH IS STEEPER AND MORE SCENIC. WE LOST THE TRAIL IN DUE TIME, BUT SOME HONKING HORN BELOW KEPT US ON THE COURSE. THIS HIKE IS ONE OF THE BEST IN THIS RANGE, AND I SHALL VOLUNTEER AS LEADER UNTIL I'LL BE ABLE TO FIND AND STAY ON THE TRAIL. AFTER THAT, IT WON'T BE ANY FUN. ON THE TRIP: PA PERRY, GEORGE UNSELD, GENE HIGGENBOTHAM, KURT ROSENFELD, VIRGINIA PARMELEE, CARL BAUER, ANITA REDD AND GUESTS MARY TUTTLE, VIRGINIA WINKLE AND CLYDE.

THE LONG TRAVERSE

FOR ALMOST TWO YEARS CAINE ALDER AND I HAD TALKED ABOUT THE FEASABILITY OF CLIMBING AS MANY PEAKS AS POSSIBLE, IN ONE DAY, TO SET SOME KIND OF RECORD. WE FINALLY DECIDED ON A ROUTE THAT WOULD INCLUDE MOST OF THE HIGH PEAKS IN THE BRIGHTON-ALTA AREA. SO ON A SATURDAY MORNING IN EARLY OCTOBER, WE STARTED OUT AT 5 A.M. FROM THE LODGE AT

BRIGHTON. MT. MILLICENT WAS OUT FIRST OBJECTIVE AND WE FOLLOWED THE TRAIL UP THE SKI LIFT. AS WE NEARED THE TOP THE FIRST GLOW OF MORNING APPEARED IN THE EAST TO HERALD A BEAUTIFUL CLOUDLESS DAY. WE PAUSED FOR A FEW MIN-UTES ON TOP THEN HEADED FOR MT. WOLVERINE. AS WE REACHED TO TOP OF THIS PEAK, THE SCENERY IN EVERY DIRECTION WAS ALMOST UNBELIEVABLE AS THE SOFT MORNING LIGHT DEEPENED THE YELLOWS AND REDS OF THE MAPLES AND NEXT WE CLIMBED TUSCARORA AND THEN ON TO POINT SUPREME. WE COULD SEE OUR MAIN OBJECTIVE: THE LITTLE COTTONWOOD RIDGE WITH ITS MANY OUTSTANDING PEAKS. WE HURRIED ALONG THE RIDGE TO AN UNNAMED PEAK NEXT, THEN DOWN TO A LOW SADDLE AND STARTED UP THE JAGGED SHOULDER OF DEVIL'S CASTLE. HERE CAINE STARTED TO FEEL ILL FROM HIS HURRIED BREAK-FAST AND SHORT NIGHTS SLEEP AND BY THE TIME WE HAD LEFT DEVIL'S CASTLE AND CLIMBED MT. SUGARLOAF, HE WAS DEFINITELY A VERY SICK MAN. HELD A COUNCIL OF WAR THEN AND HE DECIDED TO GO TO BED IN THE GERMANIA HUT TILL HE FELT BETTER, THEN TRY TO CATCH UP. IN THE MEANTIME I WA TO TAKE IT EASY ALONG THE RIDGE. AFTER CLIMBING OVER MY. BALDY AND THE SMALLER PEAK BEHIND IT, I STARTED UP THE AMERICAN FORK TWIN PEAKS. ARRIVING AT THE TOP. I ATE LUNCH AND WAITED AWHILE TO SEE IF CAINE WOULD SHOW UP. I FINALLY HAD TO LEAVE WITHOUT HIM. THERE WAS A LONG. LONG WAY YET TO GO AND IT WAS 1 P.M. NEXT ON THE ROUTE WAS RED STACK MT., THEN RED MOUNTAIN, WHICH WAS VERY LOOSE AND TREACHEROUS. BALDY CAME NEXT AND WAS QUITE ENJOYABLE WITH SOME ROCK SCRAMBLING. I HEADED FOR PFIFERHORN, I LOOKED LONGINGLY DOWN AT THE GOOD TRAIL GOING DOWN FROM RED PINE LAKES. WHITE BALDY CAME NEXT AND WAS QUITE ENJOYABLE WITH SOME ROCK SCRAMBLING. AS I HEADED FOR PFIFERHORN, I LOOKED LONGINGLY DOWN AT THE GOOD TRAIL GOING DOWN FROM RED PINE LAKES. IT WAS A GREAT TEMPTATION TO QUIT THERE AND THEN, BUT I HAD COME SO VERY FAR AND, ALTHOUGH I WAS GETTING VERY TIRED, I DECIDED TO PRESS ON. IT WAS WHILE DESCENDING THE WEST RIDGE OF PFEIFFERHORN THAT I BECAME CLUMSY FROM FATIGUE AND FELL AND ROLLED SOME 25 FEET DOWN A ROCKY SLOPE. I ENDED UP WITH A SPRAINED WRIST, CUTS ON BOTH HANDS AND BOTH KNEES, AND FEELING EXTERMELY ANGRY AT MUSELF. AFTER A SHORT REST AND A RESOLUTION TO BE MORE CAREFUL I TRAVERSED OVER CHIPMAN PEAK AND ON TO THE SOUTH PEAK OF THUNDER MOUNTAIN. AS I STARTED DOWN FROM THERE SUN HAD SET AND I KNEW I WOULD BE FINISHING THE HIKE LONG AFTER DARK. BIGHORN PEAK WAS QUITE A CHALLENGE IN THE DARK, AFTER WHICH LONE PEAK WAS MORE FAMILIAR AND WAS ACHIEVED WITHOUT TOO MUCH TROUBLE. I DESCENDED THE WEST COULOUR, CAREFULLY PICKING MY WAY. I HAD TROUBLE FINDING THE RESERVOIR AND MISSED IT TWICE BEFORE ALMOST FALLING INTO IT. FROM THERE I TURNED ON MY SMALL FLASHLITE AND, AFTER LOSING THE TRAIL MANY TIMES, I EMERGED FROM THE MOUTH OF BELLS CANYON AT 11 P.M. TO FIND HELEN WAITING FOR ME WITH THE

CAR. IT HAS BEEN THE MOST STRENUOUS DAY OF MY LIFE WITH 16 PEAKS CLIMBED, 23 MILES IN DISTANCE AND A TOTAL OF 23,400 FEET UP AND DOWN OF CLIMBING. TOTAL TIME WAS 18 HOURS. INCIDENTALLY, CAINE WANTS TO TRY IT AGAIN NEXT YEAR AND IS LOOKING FOR VOLUNTEERS TO ACCOMPANY HIM.

ME, I DON'T KNOW WHETHER I COULD EVER DO IT AGAIN.

DROMEDARY PEAK - OCTOBER 19

As usual, we left Smith's about a half hour past the scheduled time. A few minutes later we were emerging from the warmth and comfort of our cars to don boots, parkas, and packs, for it was rather chilly on this late October morning.

DENIS McSherry set an excellent pace, and we were soon removing surplus clothes. The trail up to Lake Blanche was in reasonably good condition and practically in no time at all we were comfortably seated near the lake. The sky was blue and a few clouds drifted over Sundial and Mt. Monte Cristo.

AFTER CROSSING THE DAMS OF LAKES FLORENCE AND LILIAN, WE CAME TO A SMALL BRIDGE CONSTRUCTED OF ROTTEN TIMBERS AND TEETERING WITH EVERY STEP ON IT. AT THIS CREEK CROSSING, WHILE SOME OF US WERE SEEKING A REFRESHING DRINK FROM THE SMALL RIVULETS OF WATER, OUR LEADER, MUCH TO HIS SURPRISE, SOMEHOW MANAGED TO FALL THROUGH THIS RICKETY STRUCTURE.

AGAIN WE SET OFF WITH A GOOD PACE, BUT OUR NEAT FILE OF HIKERS SOON DISPERSED TO LEAVE LONE FIGURES WANDERING ALL OVER THE HILLS. AFTER WHAT SEEMED LIKE A VERY LONG PERIOD OF TIME, WE WERE ALL EATING AND RELAXING AT THE PASS. THE SPLENDID VIEW THAT SHOULD HAVE BEEN - WASN'T, FOR THE DEER SEASON'S ANNUAL FOREST FIRES, MIXED INTO THE PATTERNS OF SALT LAKE'S DUST STORMS HAD PUT A GREEN HAZE OVER ALL THE SURROUNDING SUMMITS.

Two of the HIKERS REMAINED BEHIND WHILE THE REST OF THE GROUP RESUMED THE SHORT CLIMB TO THE SUMMIT. RON PETERSON DISAPPEARED

INTO A SMALL GULLY; HE WAS NOT TO BE SEEN AGAIN UNTIL LATER IN THE AFTERNOON. THE OTHER HIKERS TRAVERSED TO THE RIGHT AND AFTER A SHORT ROCK SCRAMBLE WE WERE ALL PLODDING ALONG THE SUMMIT RIDGE. THE COLD WIND WAS EVERYWHERE, AND SO WERE THE SMOKE AND DUST.

IT WAS YOUNG MR. PETERSON WHO GREETED US AT THE TOP. A FEW PHOTO-GRAPHS, A HURRIED LUNCH, AND SOME NASTY REMARKS ABOUT DEER HUNTERS ARE THE ONLY MEMORIES OF THE DROMEDARY PEAK SUMMIT.

WHILE WE WERE ON OUR WAY DOWN THE DUSTY WINDS HAD TURNED INTO A THICK MIST, DRIFTING OVER ALL THE SURROUNDING MOUNTAINS. IT STARTED TO HAIL, THEN TO SNOW. IT WAS NICE TO BE ON THE TRAIL AGAIN.

DARKNESS WAS ALL AROUND AS WE SLUMPED INTO THE WARM AND COMFORTABLE SEATS OF THE AUTOMOBILES.
