More Concrete for Little Cottonwood Canyon

Sweetwater Properties is proposing to build 226 condominium units between Alta and Snowbird. The 15 buildings would be located on 11.33 acres of gently sloping, wooded land just east of the present Blackjack lodge at Snowbird. Access would be via the bypass road south of the Superior slide area. Each unit would contain two bedrooms and have a total of 800 square feet of space. The total number of residents would, therefore, be in the 800-to-1000 range. During the winter, these are expected to be out-of-state skiers. During the summer, Sweetwater expects people from the valley to occupy the units for long periods, commuting down the canyon to work. The proposed development is the maximum number of units permissible at this site under the present FM-20 zoning.

Sweetwater claims that the units will be designed and built with great sensitivity to the environment and minimal disturbance of existing vegetation. They assert that there is ample water, sewer and road capacity to support the condomininium residents. However, Mayor Bill Leavitt of Alta points out that it is notoriously difficult to get a reliable figure on the available sewage capacity in Little Cottonwood Canyon. Sweetwater claims that additional traffic will be minimal because of the great reliance which the customers will place upon public transportation, including a shuttle to be provided by Sweetwater; however, the proposed layout does not appear to me to conform very well to good practice for buses. Furthermore, the UTA has had difficulty with the bypass road. Anyone who has skied Alta or Snowbird can guess the impact of an additional 800 to 1000 skiers on the lift lines.

It appears clear that the proposed development would have major impacts outside its boundaries. For one thing, there are no restaurants or night clubs proposed with the development. The additional business would go either to the existing establishments, creating long waits, or to new facilities, which would add still further concrete to the canyon. The additional skiers would require additional lifts; the placement of these lifts could be a greater issue than the condominiums. In spite of Sweetwater's claim, it seems clear to me that there would be a substantial increase in traffic on the highway.

The major issue now is whether Salt Lake County will issue a building permit for the condominiums. You can express your opinion on the subject to commissioners Bill Dunn, William Hutchinson and Bob Salter at the City and County Building, Salt Lake City, Utah 84111.


