WMC AVALANCHE COURSE

The annual Wasatch Mountain Club avalanche course will be held on Saturday, Jan. 9. It is open to the public for a \$3.00 donation. The course is set up primarily for x-country skiers, but downhill skiers and snowmobilers will find the information to be most valuable.

The course is in two parts. The morning session runs from 8:00 AM to noon at Zion Lutheran Church, 1070 Foothill Blvd. (rear entrance). This includes slides, movies, and lectures on such subjects as predicting and avoiding avalanche danger, safe route selection in the back country, proper actions of an avalanche victim, and rescue procedures.

After lunch, the class will reconvene in some snowy location to practice rescue techniques, with emphasis on use of electronic transceivers. No skis or snowshoes will be necessary.


LODGE NOTES

ZION NARROWS OUTING

Zion in October is a hit or miss proposition. The weather is either an absolute joy or a discouraging hinderance. Such was the case for the Mountain Club Columbus Weekend outing, which was to be highlighted by a hike through the Narrows.

I led the outing, which saw its ranks thinned from an anticipated group of 30 to a more manageable eleven by the ominous weather forecast for Utah that weekend. The Narrows greeted us with oppressive steep, confining walls and a cool death-defying current. I reminded our group that life is cheap and we pushed onward. As we moved up the canyon, we were assaulted by an onslought of staggering beauty - some of us staggered more than others.

The water level at times reached our thighs as we struggled over slippery rocks on the river bottom. The fantastic scenery made the hike well worth the sacrifice, and in fact the struggle was a major part of the fun. Our only regret was that we could not hike the entire canyon. We did hike about one-third of the canyon however and experienced some of its most impressive offering

Shortly after turning around, it started to rain very lightly. With the first drop, Cassie flew down the canyon, her feet not touching ground again until reaching the trail's end. The rest of us had no fear however, we were ready to ride the first big wave down the canyon if the opportunity presented itself.

From any approach, Nevada's Pilot Peak is a big pile of loose quartzite boulders, reminiscent of many high Uintah peaks. You can dig into the Indian history of a Louisiana bayou, or track kangaroos across the wilds of Australia.

You don't have to be a scientist to apply. EARTHWATCH expeditions can use your talents or your hobbies: photography, carpentry, scuba-diving, crafts, or mechanical know-how. Most of all they can use your sense of adventure--and sense of humor. EARTHWATCH projects are real working experiences.
