

CANYON CONSERVATION CONCERT BY KEITH JOHNSON

Well, Hurrah for us. We pulled it off. Although I've yet to get money and receipts from advance ticket sales back from a couple of our outlets and have not determined an exact dollar amount or tallied the attendance, I declare WMC had a positive public event. I don't expect that we raised over a few hundred dollars, but I'd say the concert was a success in several ways. (1) While publizing the concert in the media there was oportunity to present the issue how our canyons are to be used. (2) I view the concert and the preconcert contacts and advertising as nothing but good PR for the WMC. (3) The process was supportive of Salt Lake City's effort to save a particular section of land in Little Cottonwood Canyon. (4) Around 400 people listened to some portion of 6 hours of terrific music on a beautiful day.

Why did we who planned and implemented the concert do it? Because in the beginning we thought that it would be supportive and necessary to the City's effort to preserve a section of Little Cottonwood from development. When Richard Middleton, Karen Sinclair and I met with people in and out of City Government back in early summer we heard encouragement to go ahead with the concert. Back then some people connected with the City felt that a whole series of public fund raising and consciousness raising events would be important to the attempt of saving the Little Cottonwood property. Never did the board or anyone involved with planning the concert have the illusion that the money raised from concert proceeds would help to buy the land. The proceeds would have been just a "drop in the bucket". But we thought that we could contribute to auxillary expenses involved with the land purchase such as research or PR. It was not clear until a week or so before the concert that the City's bond issue would make fund raising and public support less needed. It was easy to find reason to continue with the concert after that. The concert planners merely transferred their committment to addressing the question of what should be done for the tens of thousands of other acres of lands in the Wasatch that may soon face development.

The use of a concert to promote a conservation issue may not be an idea with which the club readily identifies, however, the idea was to leave people feeling good and empathizing with the canyon issue. I believed that music would attract folks to hear about the issue. If this concert could have been coordinated with a clear position and plan for a citizen effort to examine the question of canyon land use then more could have been said. As it was, a good amount was said in newspapers, magazines and on radio and TV about rescuing sections of our canyons.

A partial list of the PR makes it clear that we created a media event which could have been used to announce some specific conservation action. Concern for the mountains was expressed and people were made aware of the danger of loosing the land. PR included: (1) Radio PSA's — written by Karen Sinclair — for over 12 radio stations. (2) Two one-hour long radio talk shows: The Ray Grahm Show, KSL with Alexis Kelner and myself. Jim Dibakis Show, KZJO with Les Eillison and myself. (3) Short Radio interviews: I spoke on the Tom Barberi Program, KALL; Classics with Rick Noblis, KUER-FM; and Drivetime on KRCL-FM. (4) Radio Music and Interview: Chris Corey's Artist Corner, KALL, played music and interviewed two members of Amnesia. (5) TV: Channel 2, Reece Stein interviewed me re: issue and concert for the news; Channel 20, afternoon interview show: Walt Haas discussed the issue, Andalin Nosanchuk of Amnesia played her flute. (6) Postconcert TV: Channel 2 and 5 News and Prime Time Access on Channel 5. (7) Magazine and newspaper ads: Catalyst, Canyon Times. (8) News articles re: issue or music: SL

Tribune (5); Deseret News (3); Canyon Times (2); Catalyst (1). (9) Calendar of Events: KUER, Canyon Times, Tribune, Catalyst Magazine. (10) Phone Messages: TIPS. (11) Ticket Giveaways on KALL. (12) Posters: 100 three color designed by R. Middleton. (13) Flyers: 350 distributed. (14) Advance Ticket Outlets: Cosmic Airplane, Timberline, Safeway and Wasatch Touring. (15) Banner: 42 feet long in front of Westminster the day of the concert. (16) and of course in the Rambler — for three editions with ads, articles and advanced reservation applications.

Before I say anything else, I need to recognize and thank some people. The scary thing about this is that invariably someone gets forgotten — if I commit such a greivous omission may I be cursed with the task of putting on another concert.

First, thanks to all those members who attended the concert — hope you enjoyed it. Much appreciation should be shown to all the members of the bands for their musical talent and generosity. These people believed in the cause enough to give of their time and talent, Amnesia, Connie and the Rhythm Method, Jordan River Uptown Band and Saliva Sisters — Thanks! I can't acknowledge Kevin Johansen, a non-member, enough for contacting the bands and arranging for the music. He worked on the music and various other aspects of the concert off and on for 6 months.

Kevin was of the only non-WMCer to help out. People came out of nowhere. They'd seen or heard some of our advance publicity and just offered to help. Some of these peoples' names are: Bill Keating, Gary Hermansen and Don Johnson. I never met Don, but I believe that he took it upon himself to distribute some PSA's to stations.

Recognition should be given to Richard Middleton, my co-director, for jointly coming up with the original idea, along with me, for having some sort of concert. The idea to make it public came about when the city asked WMC for support in preserving Little Cottonwood Canyon. Richard also designed our posters and distributed a great many of them.

One shall never rely upon requests in the Rambler for help. In fact, don't take on a task this size unless you know people that you can personally call for help and ideas. Some people in this category are Brent Greenhalgh, Bill Carter and Carli Dixon. They came to early planning meetings and made necessary inquiries about concert sites, attractions, food, etc., or helped concert day or before. Sometimes the best approach for involving persons that I'd not known before was to just chat after a hike. Jerry Hatch and Marilyn Cavanaugh got involved this way. Thanks to Marilyn for arranging for the advanced ticket outlets and for co-ordinating ticket taking. WMC Secretary Janet Friend allowed her house to become the mail drop for advance reservations sent by Rambler and Catalyst magazine readers. The following people acted as ticket takers: Marilyn and Janet, plus Carli Dixon, Bill Monroe, Bill Keating, Joan River and Mary Aa. Mary Aa also arranged for her neighbor, Rick Thorton, to be the concert security guard. Officer Thorton, by the way, provided the service for considerably below the going rate.

The person who helped me the most — wrong, the person who was equally responsible for bringing it all together — Karen Sinclair. Besides preventing me from slitting my wrists and allowing me to repeatedly slam her telephone, she offered support when I needed it and questions when I needed those. She outlined the overall PR plan. She established good rapport with the musicians. Karen arranged the TV 20 interview where Walt Haas discussed the issue and Andalin Nosanchuck of Amnesia played her flute.

Bill Monroe may have been the only long-time member to check that he'd helped on his reservation application, but serveral new members did. They include Libby Hunter and Gayla Brashears who helped concert day.


Others who helped the day of the concert included: Aaron Jones, Pete Hovingh and non-members Ron ____ and Scot Kisliag. Thanks for lifting and hauling instruments and amps. I figure anytime that you can get a club president to haul and erect scaffolding, you've got his support. Thanks -- Pete.

Along with many named for other things, Al Gavere hung posters despite the fact he was to be operated on a day later. Alexis Kelner went on a KSL radio talk show with me and Les Ellison went on KZJO with me the day before he left to climb in the Himalyas. Les also paid for a Canyon Times ad. Greta Bolinger, a club member, and publisher of Catalyst Magazine designed and printed an ad for the concert free of charge. Thank you, Phyllis Robison for reminding Reece Stein to interview me. Well, I've probably forgotten someone who helped in an important way. I'm sorry, but I won't put together another concert unless paid, even if I am cursed. Thanks again to all who helped!

Right here, I need to say that three people worked very hard at planning and implementing the concert. Others helped with specific needs and a number of people helped the day of the concert. Not many of you lent a hand and I felt disappointed at times. Than I considered the possible reasons why only a small number volunteered. (1) Each of us have busy lives and have our own causes to pursue. (2) Some of you didn't believe in the cause. (3) Some believed in the cause but not in the approach. (4) A few of you told yourselves you didn't know what you could do to help. (5) Many assumed any action to be unnecessary—the City will save it — or next time someone else will do it. (6) People didn't hear about it.

There is nothing wrong with any of these reasons. I've used them all myself. But the consequences were that there wasn't the manpower or manhours to do some of the things that might have made the concert a bigger success. The trouble with these reasons is that whatever our reasons for non-involvement with whatever type of conservation approach the developers aren't sitting on the side lines. Can you assume that an innovative approach such as the City used will always occur? We are a large organization and can either push or support governments and organizations toward actions that preserve recreation, wildlife, and watershed lands for the benefit of the many rather than allow developments to occur that enhance the quality of life for a few. Whether you agreed or disagreed I wish that we could have discussed your ideas and could have had more club involvement. We can't not be involved, or someday we'll just remember where some of our favorite trails or camp spots were.







FROM THE PRESIDENT BY PETER HOVINGH

People who enjoy the great out-of-the-doors enjoy living in Salt Lake City. We have the Wasatch Mountains in our backyard. And most of these mountains belong to the public (administered by the Wasatch National Forest Supervisor). Unfortunately, over 700,000 people live along the Wasatch Front and as the public, they are eligible to enjoy these public lands. Some forecast that by the year 2000, Utah's population will increase to another million people. Thus, 1,400,000 people will share our public lands.

What this all means is that our national forests are basically urban parks. As urban parks they will have the same problems as any urban park — people will use and misuse these lands. Unfortunately, budgets for Forest Service to administer recreation tend to be cut. Thus, there is less and less administration of the public lands or urban parks.

Besides the public lands in our national forest mountains, there are the private lands. These will continue to be developed, for with good reason, why not move the mountains from our backyard to our own private property. There is no stopping of the current trend to the urbanization of the mountains. Unless, the public starts protesting down at the Salt Lake County Planning Commission. Write to them to be included on the mailing for the agenda's to be discussed at their regular business meetings. Attend their business meetings. And protest loud and clear any monkey business in the canyons!

Regarding your inquiry concerning the above-referenced files. Beartrap Subdivision is located on the mountainside in Section 16, Township 2 South, Range 3 East along Beartrap Gulch. It was first submitted in 1971, but was not completely approved so is now being reconsidered at the request of the owner of the property. The Planning Commission at its meeting on August 23, 1983, continued that agenda item to await a revised design to show lesser gradients on the internal roads and to receive a preliminary grading plan for the streets and proposed home sites as well as a vegetation preservation and restoration plan.


Dunyon Dell plat in the Silver Fork area was approved as submitted but was merely a "housekeeping" item to correct the public record wherein the original recording approved in 1960 does not represent the true location of the properties and structures located in that subdivision.


