### CONSERVATION UPDATE BY MICHAEL BUDIG

### Utah Forest Service Wilderness Bill

The Utah Congressional Delegation has introduced a bill which would set aside 700,000 acres of Forest Service lands in Utah as wilderness. This is a major improvement from the previous draft which the delegation was considering. The new proposal calls for 450,000 acres of the High Uintas to be designated wilderness, and addition of 33,000 acres from the prior proposal. Other additions include 41,500 acres at Mount Naomi, 10,750 acres at Mount Timpanogos and 13,000 acres of the Dark-Woodenshoe Canyons area in the Manti-La Sal National Forest.

The new proposal also significantly eases the "release" language. The prior proposal would have prohibited any further additions to Utah's Forest Service Wilderness System once the act was signed into law. The new proposal would not permit any consideration of Forest Service wilderness additions until the year 2000.

The proposal is a major step in the right direction. However, it still falls significantly short of the acreage included in the Forest Service proposal and includes less than half of the acreage sought by conservationists. This combined with the hard release language still makes the bill unacceptable to conservationists in its current form. In particular, conservationists are adamant in seeking a larger High Uinta wilderness and a wilderness area in the Stansbury Range.

The Wasatch Mountain Club Board of Directors has endorsed this position. The Board also endorsed a proposal at its December 7 meeting to seek wilderness designation for an area which includes Butler Fork and Mill D Canyons in Big Cottonwood Canyon and the Little Water Trail in Mill Creek Canyon. This would be an addition to the Mt. Olympus Roadless Area. The addition would increase the congressional proposal for the Mt. Olympus Wilderness Area from 15,000 acres to about 25,000 acres.

In related developments, a report released by the US Geological Survey (USGS) states that most of the lands in federal wilderness preserves have little or no potential for producing oil or natural gas and only four percent have a high probability of containing reserves. The USGS is an agency of the Interior Department. The study considered 74 million acres of designated wilderness areas and federal lands being studied for wilderness protection in 11 western states.

### Canyon Growth Unleashing

Locally, the development pressure is continuing in Big and Little Cottonwood Canyons. New condominiums are evident at Alta this year. Meanwhile the path has been cut for the Snake Creek Pass chairlift at Brighton.

Forest Service officials conceded before the proposal was approved that the Snake Creek Lift would require a large timber removal and would increase erosion and cause some deterioriation in water quality. The path of the lift is now obvious to cross country skiers who ski up to Snake Creek Pass. The devastation is tempered by the deep early snows greeting skiers this year.

However, this may be the last year in which skiers may enjoy solitude at the pass, since Brighton expects to complete the lift next year if this is a good financial season for the resort.

Future long-term plans for Brighton include expansion into the Twin Lakes area. Meanwhile Solitude would like to expand into Silver Fork. In addition, Solitude will be allowed to construct a 300-unit condominium project once a sewer line has been installed down the length of the canyon.

Additionally, Snowbird would like to expand into American Fork and White Pine Canyons. And, proposals also loom for two additional entirely new large-scale resorts in the Wasatch, Heritage Mountain near Provo and Wasatch Mountain near Midway.

These proposals could make the ski-interconnect proposal a reality, whether it is planned as such or not. Although the Forest Service will evaluate the interconnect proposal in its next forest plan, many of the corridors are on private lands over which the Forest Service has no jurisdiction. In fact, Park City owns all the land necessary for a Park City-Brighton interconnect and apparently can develop this corridor whenever they deem it desireable.

#### Project BOLD

The state proposal to consolidate scattered state sections in a massive land exchange with the BLM is now ready for consideration by Congress.

The Proposal has made giant strides since its inception over two years ago. The plan is now a balanced exchange and includes provisions for the state to manage rather than just exploit its school section lands. The proposal also now generally avoids state acquisition of environmentally critical areas - with two noteable exceptions in proposed Wilderness Study Areas in the Kaparowitz area. Both areas also contain valuable coal reserves the state is seeking for future development.

# TRIP Talk talk talk talk

CLIMB TO THE TOP OF MT. FUJI IN A MONSOON By Bob Lufkin

Mt. Fuji is a volcanic crater located about 60 miles from Tokyo, Japan. It is 12,395 feet high. It is climbed by starting from station #5 at 8000 Feet and climbing to station #10 at the top. The climb has religious significance for many Japanese. There is a Japanese saying, "A wise man climbs Mt. Fuji once in his lifetime; only a fool climbs it more than once."

While on a visit to Japan with a Friendship Force group, I decided that climbing Mt. Fuji was one of the things I wanted to do. This happened to be during the monsoon season and not the best time to climb Mt. Fuji. However, with another member of the group, John Riley, who is also a Wasatch Mt. Club member, I took a bus to station #5 on Mt. Fuji, arriving there at 9:30 PM. It is common practice to climb Mt. Fuji at night to see the sunrise and the view before the clouds surround the peak at about 9:30 AM.

The group starting with us consisted of two college students from Colorado, a German doctor who had just graduated from medical school and 20 young Japanese men and women. The night was cloudy with a strong wind blowing when we left the station at 10:30 PM, with the bells on our hiking sticks jingling as we walked. Before we reached station #6, it had started raining and the park ranger who accompanied the group said that it was too slippery to continue hiking and that we must stav at station #6 until the rain stopped. When we reached station #6, we were informed that the fee for stopping was 3000 yen (\$13.00). Seven of us, we five foreigners and two Japanese, decided that the fee was too much and elected to continue hiking. One of the

Japanese could speak English and proved to be a great help in negotiating with the station operators.

After hiking a couple of hours, we reached station #8 in a dense fog. a pouring rain and wind of 50 miles per hour with gusts estimated at 75 mph. coffee at station #7 had momentarily warmed us, but we were again extremely cold and tired. Our English speaking Japanese friend negotiated beds for us at 500 yen for an hour. We were in bed by 1:00 AM and out on the trail again at 2:15 AM. The wind, fog, and rain were as bad as ever. Our hiking sticks proved to be of great value in checking our movement as the wind tried to blow us off the mountain.

The higher we went, the colder it got, and the force of the wind became stronger. The rain was turning into sleet. At the ninth station we warmed our half frozen bodies with scalding hot coffee at 400 yen (\$1.50) per cup, and learned we were half an hour from the top.

As we approached the top about two hours later, the wind had increased to an estimated hundred miles an hour, with gusts estimated at one hundred and twenty-five mph. The climbers were strung out on the trail and hanging on for dear life, reminding me of flies on the wall in the path of the blast from an electric fan. The climbers were prone against the mountain, since the wind velocity was great enough to blow an upright climber off the mountain. It was an extremely dangerous situation.

I overtook a family group consisting of a father, mother and a 10 year old son, who appeared to be in trouble. The father and son were about ten yards ahead and the father was fully occupied in keeping himself and his son from being blown off the mountain. The mother was immobile, frozen to the side of the mountain and hanging on for dear life. As I passed, I reached out a hand to her which she grasped eagerly and together we crawled the remaining hundred yards to the #10 station at the top. None of the family could speak English, but they expressed their appreciation by the universal language of smiles and bows. I complimented the son on his climbing ability, which brought smiles from the whole family.

Stepping into the 10th station was almost a religious experience. Outside, we were being buffeted by the wind, cold and wet from the rain and sleet, encircled by the fog and darkness, with our ears aching from the shrill howl of the wind. As we step through the door, the howling ceases, the air is still and warm and it is light. Perhaps it is something like this when we pass from this life to the next.

As we arrived at the #10 station, we were warned not to go outside to look at the crater, since the high winds made it extremely dangerous. One of our party went out in spite of the warning, and was lifted off his feet and blown fifteen or twenty feet through the air. Fortunately for him, the wind was out of the crater. We arrived at the #10 station at 9:30 AM, eleven hours after we started. In clear weather the climb usually takes 5 hours.

It was, by a great margin, the worst climbing weather I have ever encountered. If I had encountered weather one quarter as bad on a Utah mountain, I would quit and try it another day. However, this was my only chance at Mt. Fuji. I'm glad I did it, but I wouldn't recommend it.
