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PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS

- are welcome on ALL club activities, with these exceptions:
- 1) Thursday Evening Hikes are for members only. However, prospective members may attend if the hike is their second qualifying activity for membership and they submit their dues check and application form to the leader before the hike.
 - 2) Boating trips are for members. However, prospective members may attend a weekend trip if they use the trip as their qualifying activity (each day counts as one activity.)
 - 3) A trip leader may choose to limit a trip to members, especially if there is limited space.

WMC SKI TOURS:

- Here is an explanation of ski tour ratings:
- NTD (Not too difficult): Terrain is mostly gentle. Participants should be able to do a kick turn, snowplow, and descend a slope by traversing. Usually no avalanche danger.
- MOD (Moderately difficult): Proficiency climbing and descending intermediate slopes is required. Pieps and shovels may sometimes be suggested or required. If a Pieps is carried, this implies knowledge of how to search for a buried companion.
- MSD (Most difficult): Strenuous. Usually involve long ascents, steep or narrow descents. Pieps and shovel always required.

WMC HIKES:

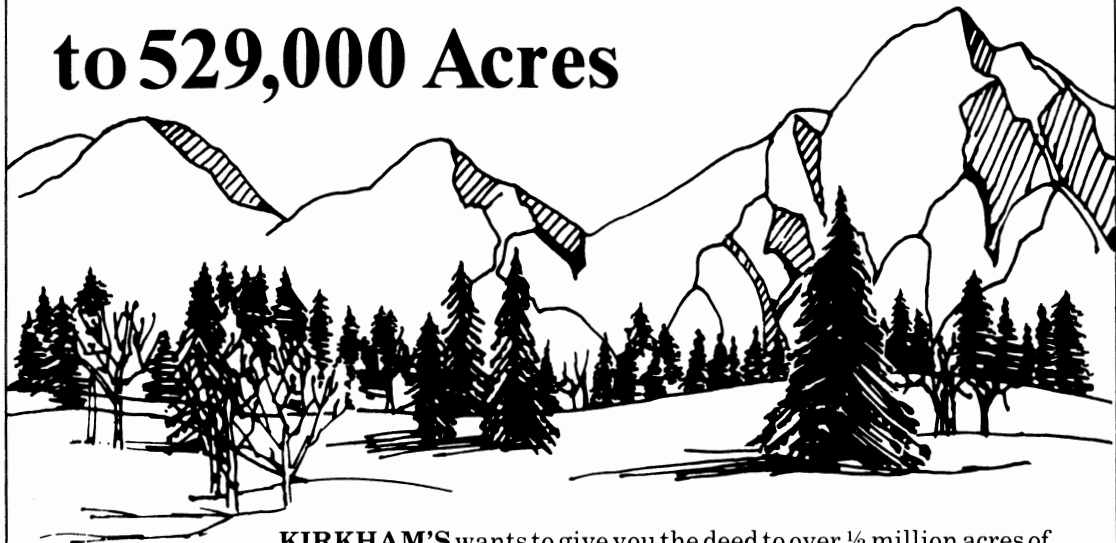
The hike rating indicates the difficulty of the hike. Hikes rated under 5 are easy, 5-8 are intermediate, above 8 are difficult. A hike may be more difficult than the rating would suggest. Watch for the terms "exposure", "rock scrambling", "bush whacking", and "steep". If you have any questions about a particular hike, feel free to call the leader ahead of time. Please come to the hike with proper equipment: adequate clothing, footwear, food, water, and any special equipment required for that hike. You must sign the liability release form to participate in any hike, and you are expected to stay with the group during the hike.

WMC BIKE RIDES:

Rides are rated Not Too Difficult (NTD), Moderate (MOD), or Most Difficult (MSD). NTD rides will generally be less than 30 miles. MOD rides will be 30 to 50 hilly or up to 60 flat miles. MSD rides will be over 50 hilly or 60 flat miles. On all but newcomer rides, riders must bring their own water, food, tire repair tools, extra tubes, repair knowledge, sunscreen, and money. Consider wearing protective gear. Helmets may be required on some rides.

There are several major issues that I expect the board to be involved with the next year. One is a continued program of recruiting new members. Many of the most popular club activities are very demanding of both time and energy and people burn out. I also hope to see more instruction and beginner trips for people who want to get started in new activities.

The BLM is about to publish their revised wilderness recommendation and this promises to be a critical issue for years. When the battle over wilderness boundaries becomes intense, these areas will need advocates with first hand knowledge. We have had a number of these trips in the past and they have always been enjoyable as well as informative. It is a great chance to learn about new areas in Utah.

EARTH DAY / EARTH WEEK EVENTS

I am involved with the steering committee and the environmental sub-committee for Earth Day.

Numerous events are planned on and preceding Earth Day. These include an Earth Fair at Cottonwood Mall at which the Club plans to have a booth. The Club may also participate in a high school assembly on environmental ethics and in some sort of outdoor conservation activity. This activity may consist of cooperating with the Forest Service to organize environmental clean-up and restoration work or involve leading hikes open to public participation. I hope to be able to tell you more about this in next month's *Rambler*.

MILLCREEK & THE COTTONWOOD CANYONS

The Wasatch Canyon Coordinating Committee, Salt Lake County Planning Commission, and the Forest Service seem to be effectively dealing with numerous canyon development issues. Among these issues is another Brighton expansion plan. The Salt Lake County Planning Department, the Wasatch County Planning agency and two Forest Service district

offices met in mid-February to consider the Brighton proposal.

The ski resort had plans to build two fixed lifts up the Wasatch County side of the mountain, a new quad lift on the Snake Creek terrain and a restaurant at the top. Although the plan may have merit (the lifts on the Wasatch County side would have run through slopes that are very avalanche prone and conceivably could have reduced pressure on the Salt Lake side), the counties and forest service have informed Brighton that no further "piecemeal" development will be considered until the resort provides an overall master plan. Consequently, construction which was to have begun next summer has been put on hold.

SNOWBASIN LAND EXCHANGE

The Forest Service has rejected the proposal to exchange 1320 acres of forest land near Snowbasin for other lands held by Earl Holdings' development company. The district office in Ogden has decided to trade 220 acres instead of the entire acreage sought by the developer.

In the opinion of Dale Bosworth, the Forest Supervisor for Wasatch Cache National Forest, this option will still "...allow expansion of Snowbasin from a day use ski area to a four season resort." Bosworth has endeavored to transfer to the developer what he believes is a sufficient amount of public land upon which to build support facilities for the resort expansion. In addition, he has authorized construction of some facilities on National Forest lands under special use permit. Residential units, which were to have been built had the full 1320 acre parcel been acquired, could still be constructed on a nearby 7000 acre section of land presently owned by the developer.

Time will tell how Holding's Sun Valley Company will respond to the decision. Had the 1320 acre trade been approved, a massive resort community would have spread across this land. If, for some reason, forest managers reverse their decision and the original development proposal is implemented, 1,450 condo units, restaurants, a golf course and an array of on-mountain luxury accommodations will be scattered across the 1320 acres. If completed as planned, the resort would cater to out-of-state tourists and dramatically alter an unspoiled area now used for hiking, ski touring and other low-impact outdoor pursuits. The complex would occupy an important watershed. Further, within the area there are many parcels of land which were deeded to the Forest Service in order to be protected from development.

Holding's proposal claimed all 1320 acres were required to make the operation economical. If the Forest Service can be convinced of this Snowbasin claim, so might it be swayed when other ski operators suggest the need for more land to make their resorts economical. Conservation groups will need to be vigilant as this process continues to unfold. In the coming weeks, the conservation community must consider the possibility that the trade and development of even this smaller acreage sets a dangerous precedent and should be litigated.

Of those who favored the exchange in its entirety, Congressman Hansen has been most vocal about his disappointment with the Forest Service decision. He believes Utah would have benefited from development of the entire 1320 acres, and opposes a decision that, as he puts it, "...favors tree lovers." Stand by for more action on this one.

PARKING IN THE CANYONS

RULE 1: THINK SNOW REMOVAL. UDOT has two responsibilities: Clear the roads the day of the storm, and widen the road area the day after the storm to allow for snow accumulation during the next storm.

After these two processes are complete, you may park on the shoulders of the roads to the OUTSIDE of the white lines (theoretically 15 feet from the road center.) If you park on the road, or on the shoulder while snow clearing is going on you could be towed, ticketed, or buried...sorry 'bout that folks.

RULE 2: KEEP ACCESS WAYS TO PARKING LOTS AND RESORTS CLEAR.

Do not park on shoulders of the entrances. Solitude has indicated they do not mind if tourers park in their lots. Be considerate. Park away from the lift area parking.

RULE 3: WMC OVERNIGHT PARKING.

You may park in the Brighton parking lot at the far south end. Do not park in front of the motel. If snow is falling, the Brighton crews will be clearing the lot at night. Move your vehicles to the LDS chapel area near the Millicent lift.

TARGHEE...HOT TUBS...RESORT TELEMARKING...AND TETON PASS

Want to get out of town for a change of pace? Follow I-15 north, head to Idaho Falls or Rexburg, then cut east to Driggs, Idaho. There, in the middle of nowhere, Grand Targhee Resort offers a perfect pinner's paradise: a variety of 26 to 30 degree slopes, beautiful views of the three Teton peaks (when the fog rises), a great bar with Flock of Mallards playing while we were there..you folk country fans would have been in heaven.

Outside the resort proper, to the west and south of the resort off the snow cat track, experienced tourers can find endless uncut glades of powder as a reward for an hour's hike. For an uncomplicated visit, get reservations at the resort condos, and plan to dine at their three restaurants: pizza, mexican, and continental - priced accordingly.

Back to Driggs and south to Victor, and you can find more warm beds. The Best Western in Driggs offers a hot tub, and the Timberline Lodge in Victor (208-787-2772) saves you a few dollars.

The locals congregate at the Driggs Teton Bakery for breakfast. You won't be able to resist putting a few of their home baked goodies in your pack if you're touring. For evening meals, travelers suggest O'Rourke's Pizza in Driggs, the British Rail Car, or Joe's Place. In Victor, the Knotty Pine Cafe and the Victor Steak Bank are both within a short walk of the Timberline.

The Teton Pass south of Victor is your best bet for the backcountry. South of the pass road from the top of the pass parking lot, you'll find an easy traverse to the east and west slopes. Some of it's gladed, but don't go without a Teton Pass topo and good slope testing skills. North of the pass, for a 2500 foot climb, you will receive an infinite choice of west facing slopes, gladed and of all angles back down to the lower elevation Cabin Creek parking lot.

Rendezvous Ski Tours can guide you around your first day if you want a little help finding safe terrain and good powder. Glen Vitucci and Carol Lowe are the ski scouts (208-787-2906) From their Fox Creek yurt, you can plan a more remote trip. Allow four days as the access in and out takes a day. Your meals are provided, along with guide service at \$75. per person per day. Carol and Glen can fill you in on the other huts in the system.

Has this happened to you: What to do? Boating is still two months away, I've gone through all my slides twice, and I'm still bored.

Here are some suggestions:

1- MAIL PERMITS. Most have been sent off by now, although the BLM is still accepting applications for Westwater, Deso, and San Juan until March 15. Drawings are held in March, so we just wait and hope for that card in the mail.

2- ROLL PRACTICE has already begun and I encourage everyone to come and work out those kinks in your roll. This activity is supported by the club, so please show your support by participating.

3- PLAN TRIPS. We are currently contacting a boating club in Phoenix concerning the Salt river, which typically runs in March (If they have a snowpack). There is no trip scheduled at print time, but you may want to stay in touch with me at 278-3510 for info.

4- RIVER CONSERVATION, that is writing letters to preserve free flowing rivers from dams and unnecessary power generation. There are serious threats to many nearby rivers. The Jordanelle, for example, will be built this year. Other threatened rivers are the Fremont, the Payettes, and Star Falls on the Murtaugh section of the Snake. The Jordanelle is inevitable, but these other projects can and should be stopped. I recommend that all serious boaters become involved in saving what few rivers we have left. There are several organizations dedicated to this cause and I encourage you to join one or several.

Friends of the Payette was founded in 1987 to stop new dams on the North and South Forks and to ultimately obtain Wild and Scenic River status for these much deserved rivers. Call Wendy at (208) 343-7481 for information.

American Rivers is a non-profit organization who lobby to Congress for wild and scenic status for many rivers across the country. Call (202)-547-6900 for information.

Star Falls is the beginning of what is called the Murtaugh stretch of the Snake river. This stretch contains BIG water class III - V rapids that are known as the "Best big one day whitewater stretch in the world". This canyon has easy access, no permit, and only four hours from SLC. It has not been run for years because of low water flows. This stretch is well worth fighting for and I urge all boaters to write letters to:

Ask that no hydropower project be approved at Star Falls. Rather the existing road should be improved to allow more recreationists access for boating, fishing, and camping. I have more information on these rivers and others, so feel free to call me for details. Happy Paddling.

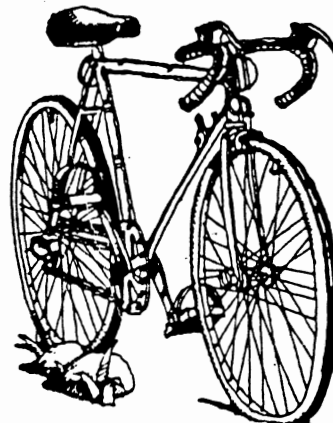

Lesson #1: This will cover the basics. How to pack for a ski tour; what to wear; and how to sign over your will to the ski school director should you not return from the first outing.

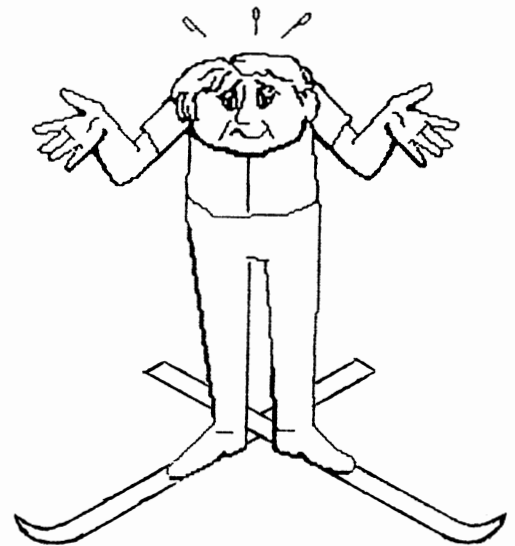
Lesson #2: The most efficient way to carry the instructor's pack and what are his favorite drinks and snacks.
