





TWENTY FIVE YEARS AGO IN THE RAMBLER JULY 1968

The list of needed lodge repairs and clean-up items seems endless as the Summer work party season started. Director Pete Hovingh details many tasks which were much the same then as now. He sagely notes that "there is no flowing water in the lodge in Winter except that which comes through the roof." Melting snow on the old wood stove was recommended.

That ever-popular river-run, Desolation Canyon, is the feature trip-talk report. El Tortugita, our bus, transported the group to the put-in at Ouray, where the six boats were roped together to make two large rafts of three boats. Scribe Sally Nelson reported the river as high, fast, and too cold to swim in.

One of the earliest attempts at Wildcat Ridge, our highest rated hike, was taken on June 2. The presently-used name was not in vogue at that time, being simply referred to as the "Mount Raymond to Mount Olympus Hike". There was just too much snow for the hike at that date in 1968 forcing the last climb to Mt. Olympus to be bypassed in favor of a traverse to the trail. One of the group was breaking in new boots which caused delays and she had to be sent down Neffs Canyon. All was forgiven for the delays she caused, said leader Dale Green, when she showed up at the trailhead with cold beer after a grueling 14 hour hike.



Last week on the Lake Blanche trail, Leslie Woods asked me how it was going as president. I gave her some glib, silly answer about not really being in a position to make an objective judgment. What I wish that I had said was that being president of the Club was quite an educational experience. 
FROM THE BOATING DIRECTOR by Randy Klein

The "River Safety Report" is published every two to three years by the River Safety Task Force of the American Canoe Association (Edited by Charlie Walbridge of Wildwater Designs). Each issue contains facts and analyses of river accidents (drownings and near drownings). While this may seem to be morbid reading, it's professionally presented, and your own safety can be enhanced by reading these reports.

Common themes are extreme lack of river experience (Mountain Clubbers would not fall into this group when on Club trips, but please take a safety class so we can all contribute to safety), cold and flood conditions (which is why we carefully screen applicants for early season trips and cancelled several trips this year), boating alone and/or alcohol (self explanatory), running too-difficult rapids without scouting them (poor judgment) and improper equipment (don't be too cheap to purchase excellent equipment, clothing, and safety/rescue gear).

Several reports in particular from the most recent issue caught my attention. In one case, a paddler was on a difficult section of river with less than adequate sleep and having eaten little food. In another, a paddler first swam safely to shore and then lost his life attempting to recover his gear from the river. Several times paddlers died because they waited to roll and were smashed or strained instead. Please, let's all try to remember that portaging difficult rapids (especially when physically tired) and willingness to sacrifice expensive gear may sometimes be required if we are to return home safely.

Rent to current students and faculty only. they no longer have outfitted whitewater boats. Boats rent for \$12/day.

255-2293. Gary has several boats for \$20/day or \$16/day for a week period. Gary also has a canoe trailer which will hold many boats for \$20/day. He can probably set you up with flotation for beginning whitewater.

If you are *really* interested in whitewater and want to try a fully outfitted solo-type boat, give me a call (359-0754). I probably can set you up with one of my own boats (be careful—I'm emotionally involved with all my boats and want them back in one piece! However, I hate to see them languishing in the back yard just because I'm too busy to get on the river!)





The climbing courses offered by the Mountaineering Section provide a good and safe introduction to climbing, but more practice is required before a student can become a competent snow, ice, or rock climber. Ice ax techniques and rock climbing skills need to be practiced until they become instinctive responses. An experienced partner who emphasizes safety is a good resource for continuing the learning of the art of safe and responsible climbing. Thursday Night Climbing at Storm Mountain is oriented toward safe and fun climbing, so show up, climb, and learn. We look forward to seeing you. 



Gray Canyon Beginner Boating Trip May 14-15, 1993 by Jan Nystrom

The annual beginners trip down Gray Canyon took place over the weekend of May 14-15, 1993. Janis Huber was the trip leader and organizer-extraordinare of a slew of kayakers, an oar frame, a paddle raft, and a couple of duckies. Although skies threatened rain all weekend, it never delivered, so we paddled down Gray Canyon in sunshine on both days.

The abilities of the kayakers varied from class 4+ to those who had never been in moving water in a kayak. The more experienced "yakers" got to practice their "rescue skills" while we beginners practiced rolls, eddy turns, and, yes, swimming. We were given lots of kayaking tips from how to execute a sharp eddy turn, to how to surf, how to do a screw roll, what kind of squirt boat to buy if fun and not pain is your primary objective, and how to paddle into the wind. Also held, a special mini-session conducted by Bill Shallbetter on how to do a C-to-Croll. (We're hoping he will turn his expertise into an evening workshop at the reservoir of his choice).

Everyone in the paddle raft who felt left out because they hadn't been swimming got their opportunity on Sunday's lunch break. We had lunch beside a rapid. Then, after lunch, with the kayakers waiting below the rapid, anyone who wanted to swim it with their lifejacket on, did so. Other trip highlights included a visit to the Gray Canyon petroglyphs on Sunday, Phyllis Anderson's incredible homemade brownies, a lightening and thunder show when we were packing up camp on Sunday, and an opportunity on Saturday to learn how to get a raft right-side-up in the river. Janis led the raft rescue while the paddlers participated and the kayakers watched. You never know when that very skill might come in handy...

The weather was cloudy off and on, but hot. Having been to Gray's Canyon just two weeks prior to the Wasatch trip, I can verify that the desert went from winter to summer this year skipping over spring all together—with the possible exception of the myriad of wildflowers and blooming


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Gray Ganyon River Trip







It was, however, very, very wet; water poured down through chimneys and cracks soaking us. We then scrambled (sideways mostly if I remember right) along Broadway and climbed to the summit via the really very enjoyable Little Notch.

We were almost on top when the thunderstorm broke—11:30 is the programmed time for the Front Range's daily storm. There was a lot of scary static which made my hair stand on end and ice axes hum. The driving rain turned to hail! Thunder crashed around us! We ran over the top, ignoring the summit register, and scurried down to the top of the cable route. There we huddled, wringing wet, not daring to touch the cables 'til the lightning storm was over. When it ended, we scrambled down the cables on the slick, hail-covered rock. Straight Wash and the North Fork of Iron Wash


May 22-23 1993 by Wil McCarvill

Originally billed as Grotto and Big Holes, the coming of summer and heat changed our venue to deeper and hopefully cooler canyons. We travelled further south along the San Rafael Reef and camped just outside the Wilderness Study Area sign on a road leading to Straight Wash. I have always felt an attraction for this canyon that pierces the reef, probably because I am always attracted to the Eardly Canyon in it.

We hiked across the desert which was close to maximum bloom and entered the wash. We found the important petroglyph panel, but the snake was only about ten feet long looping around figures of bighorn sheep and anthromorphs. (I had heard it was fifty feet long!) A thunderstorm far up canyon had brought down a load of red sediment, filling the pool at the mouth of Eardley with muddy water. After replenishing our water at a clear pothole, we walked up the Coconino bulge and looked into the depths of Eardley. Always awesome! The late afternoon heat was made tolerable by setting up lawn chairs under an overhanging cliff band with a clear cool stream at our feet.

On Sunday a march up the North Fork of Iron led to pour-offs, potholes, and running stream segments within an ever deepening Navaho walled canyon. At lunch time the bravest and boldest, Peter Rexer, stemmed over a frigid pool in the narrows of the North Fork. A slot exists behind the deep and dark pour-off that leads through and up into more narrows. Looks like another trip is required to finally pass through all of the North Fork narrows. As we returned to our cars, a thunderhead provided relief from the sun. The timing couldn't have been better. A few hours earlier and we would have been running out of the narrows at the sound of thunder.

Horse Thief Trail and Cottonwood Wash



While the snow fell in Salt Lake, the sun shone on the San Rafael Reef; well, at least some of the time. On Saturday, we hiked up from Smith's cabin on the Eastern edge of the reef just in time to see massive storm clouds filling the sky above Spring and Nates Canyons. A brief but heavy hailstorm made the benches of Mexican and Lone Mountains white. The view was outstanding after the sky cleared and the sun warmed us as we walked down the Horse Thief trail. A local rancher claimed to have brought his horse up from the river bottom via this route. But, he added, "I wasn't riding it." We found a surprise hidden pool, and the slot over the pour-off led down to a canyon filled with vegetation. A clear stream of water ran over the impermeable mudstone at the mouth of the canyon only to disappear within yards in the thirsty sand.


Sunday was clear, dry and cool; a perfect day for the desert. The desert plants were putting on their spring show. Globe Mallow, Evening Primrose, Barrel Cacti and Prickly Pear Cacti lined our path with color up Cottonwood Wash under rows of light green leaved cottonwoods. The clear running stream was as attractive to us as the earlier inhabitants who left their signs. Although I have yet to find the petroglyph panels listed in the guide book, two other panels attract my attention every time I walk through Cottonwood Wash.

I always like a little variety and the thrill of the unknown. We went up a seldom seen branch of Cottonwood Wash and were stopped by a pour-off. We found a way out by locating several sawed branches propped against a cliff band. It is difficult to imagine who and why they were put there. The view from the top of the cliffs showed an immense, eroded landscape. The topographical map was almost useless due to the complex mixture of cliffs, canyons and domes. A long round-about hike through narrow canyons, up stone filled talus slopes, and over slickrock domes led us back to the beginning.
