

TWENTY FIVE YEARS AGO IN THE RAMBLER MARCH 1969

Our newest Life Member, Karin Dahlgren (now Caldwell) describes an attempt to ski from Alta to Brighton and back to Alta. The weather was horrible, and after reaching Brighton they learned that the storm had knocked out the power and the Marys lift was allowing people on only 1 chair in 4. Eventually they had to hitch-hike down Big Cottonwood and get rides back to Alta.

FIFTY YEARS AGO IN THE WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB

March 1944 (From Board of Governors' Meeting Minutes)

"The matter of the Wasatch Mountain Club investing in and erecting a Ski Tow was discussed and the following Committee was appointed to investigate the matter: Chas. B. Morton, chairman, Harold Goodro, O'Dell Petersen, Joel Cobia and Guy Anderson. Motion being made by O'Dell Petersen and seconded by Harold Goodro."

Further business during the month could not be conducted for lack of a quorum.

(Historian's Note: These fifty-year-old minutes were taken and typed by then Secretary Guy Anderson. His nephew, David Anderson, is a current member of the WMC and says that Guy is still alive, although somewhat enfeebled, at an age of over 90 years.)

Dear Wasatch Mountain Club Member:

February 16, 1994

I am writing to you today to ask for <u>your</u> support to secure a renewed US Forest Service lease for the lodge.

In December, a lease renewal application was submitted to the US Forest Service. The public comment period for the proposed lease renewal runs from now through March 7, 1994. (See the attached letter requesting comments.) Your letters are needed to ensure that the lease is in fact renewed. Listed below are points you may want to include in your letter:

The log building we call the lodge, was built in 1929 by the Wasatch Mountain Club. It is the oldest building of its kind in Brighton.

The log building has been on the National Register of Historic Places since 1980.

The lodge is used year-round as an organizational camp. As such, a variety of not-for-profit groups seeking lodging for retreats, trainings, and renewed environmental awareness have used the building.

Finally, if you have had a special experience at the lodge, mention it. For example, you met your spouse and/or were married in the lodge.

WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB APPLICATION FOR RENEWAL OF SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR THE WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB LODGE

Introduction

The Wasatch Mountain Club Lodge is a log structure located on National Forest System Lands in Brighton Utah. It has been used by the Wasatch Mountain Club since its construction in 1929. In 1980 the lodge was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The lodge is used by club members for social and instructional gatherings.

The lodge has also been used by many non-club members over the years, providing numerous local groups with an opportunity for a close-up appreciation of the National Forest.

Facility

Occupancy of the National Forest is 0.71 acres and includes the lodge, lodge parking lot and driveway. It is located in the SW 1/16 of Section 35, T. 2S, R. 3E, SLBM. The lodge is in year round use. The Wasatch Mountain Club would need to meet all City-County Health Department standards which includes securing a suitable and practical water source, connecting to the source and sewer system to allow installation of low-flow, flush toilets. If no water source is available, the Wasatch Mountain Club will install non-water toilets approved by the Salt Lake City-County Health Department. Water and sewer lines will be analyzed in the environmental analysis.

Construction

Anticipated construction will include removal of the old vault toilet house (7'x11'x9') on concrete foundation and replaced with a storage shed approximately 8'x10'

on concrete slab; connection of grey water to sewer; ongoing maintenance. If a suitable and practical water source can be secured, flush toilets will be installed. If no such water source is available, the Wasatch Mountain Club will install non-water toilets approved by the Salt Lake City-County Health Department.

Term of Permit

Due to anticipated significant capital improvements including water and sewer hook-up and structural upgrades, a 15 year term permit would be issued.

Preliminary Issues and Concerns - The forest service has identified the following issues and concerns.

Brighton is a high use area and public use is increasing.

Forest Service Direction (Forest Service Manual 2347.2) regarding private type clubs is to:

- 1. Issue no new authorizations for private club type uses. Reserve property with high outdoor recreation resources values for future use by the general public.
- 2. Where conflict exists between currently permitted private club use and the needs of the general public, always consider the public's needs first.
- 3. As opportunity presents, phase out private-club use unless forest plans indicate there will be no public needs of the general public for the land involved.

What type of use permit should be issued.

The lodge is on the National Register of Historic Places.

NTD (Not too difficult): Terrain is mostly gentle. Participants should be able to do a kick turn, snowplow, and descend a slope by traversing. Usually no avalanche danger.

MOD (Moderately difficult): Proficiency climbing and descending intermediate slopes is required. Beacons* and shovels may sometimes be suggested or required. If a beacon* is carried, this implies knowledge of how to search for a buried companion.

MSD (most difficult) Strenuous, usually involves long ascents, steep or narrow descents. Beacons* and shovels are always required. (See bottom p 8, "Beacon/Pieps)

Each quarter, classes are also offered through the University of Utah. I suggest getting a course schedule from the registration office for a complete list of classes.

I wish to thank Rod Huck (of the Utah Whitewater Association), and Wasatch Touring for allowing me to post this information.

In conjunction with the American Whitewater Affiliation* and Idaho Rivers United*, a focused effort is being made to mandate minimum, regular recreational releases from the Milner Dam which controls the Snake River's flow for the Murtaugh whitewater run. In the spring of 1993, the Idaho flow study indicated that more water equals more fun for river runners.

The next step is to gather a significant number of signatures to accompany a formal letter to the Federal Regulatory Commission (FERC). This letter will be drafted by the AWA*

YES, I am in strong support of the Idaho Parks and Recreation Dept. instigating a minimum/recreational flow in the Snake River's Murtaugh Section. CONSERVATION COMMENTS

Randy Long

Some of you might remember a phone tree which the Club had some three or four years ago. Well, it fell apart which led to missing issues such as the Stansbury Island

issue. John Veranth (our current conservation director) asked me to start this up again and take charge of it to avoid any more problems. I'll do all I can to get information out to the Club as it becomes available. Most callers have been secured, but I may still need help as we are currently facing two important issues.

The first one is the "down-zoning" in the foothills south from 6600 south to the county line. The main area of concern presently is the Deaf Smith area (about 8800 south), where the present zoning calls for 20 acre lots. Twenty acres is pretty big, and some lots will stay that size, but others will be down zoned to 5 acres, some will go further to just 1 acre, and even 1/2 acre lots; not much larger than regular house lots. A neighborhood council has formed within the subdivisions below. This group is putting a great deal of effort into fighting the down sizing, since having all 20 acre lots would be a big step toward stopping all further development in the foothills. Listen for further information and a possible evening hearing.

The other very important issue has to do with the new extension of Wasatch Boulevard south from 9400 South. Part of it is now under construction and it's proposed to go all the way to Draper. The problem is that no provisions are being made for any hiker parking anywhere along it. The Forest Service, working with the Bells Canyon property owners, says, "We need parking along that road." Sandy City says, "Maybe." The county on the other hand seems not to favor parking. I've been really battling all three agencies on this all-important issue. Sandy is trying to schedule a hearing on this early in April. Again, "Stay tuned," for further information, hopefully by April.

FROM THE HIKING DIRECTOR

Spring is coming, and so is the new hiking season. This year we've scheduled a few hikes in March on the chance that the weather might be more conducive to hiking than skiing; we'll see what happens.

March also brings the first Hiking Committee meetings. I'm afraid that these were scheduled rather awkwardly around some out-of-town trips that I'm making, but I'm hopeful that we'll still be able to get the work done on time. The first Hiking Committee meeting will be on Thursday, March 3, just a few days after you receive your Rambler. Hiking Committee meetings are open to all Club members, and we especially welcome spring hike leaders, since the Committee will be scheduling hiking and camping activities for April and early May. Of course, you don't need to attend a Committee meeting to lead a hike; just give me a call (595-1747), afternoons or evenings to discuss it. A second Committee meeting on Tuesday, March 22, will put together activities for May through early June. If you're interested in supporting the Club's hiking activities, I hope you will attend at least one Committee meeting.

After each Committee meeting, our volunteers from the Committee will be calling folks to coax them to lead trips for the Club. Since the Club is a volunteer organization, when you don't volunteer, the Club has to cut down on its activities. Because of changes in policy (see below), we will need more volunteers than ever this year. If you are an experienced hiker, we need you to help us lead other hikers into our beautiful mountains and canyons. In the Club membership cycle, spring is early and we're changing the way that we handle renewals this year. Our information may be out of date, so please be nice to our callers and take the time to straighten us out. If you have a favorite hike to lead, don't wait for us to call: call me directly (595-1747) and I'll get you on our schedule.

The Club is changing the way it schedules hikes in order to accommodate upcoming Forest Service policies about group sizes on wilderness trails. Wilderness is supposed to provide opportunities for solitude and the enjoyment of nature, but when the Club sends an army of hikers up a trail, we often diminish wilderness



Values for ourselves and for others. Starting this season, the Club will limit the group sizes of its day hikes into wilderness areas to 14 hikers, following Forest Service proposals.

The Club has discussed some ways to limit group sizes on day hikes without greatly inconveniencing our members. Our current plan is to require preregistration with limits for more difficult wilderness hikes like Timpanogos, Lone Peak and the Big Cottonwood Twin P eaks, and to arrange for easy and moderate hikes to meet at a common time and place so that if a wilderness hike fills up, there will always be another hike to choose from. Openings on hikes into wilderness areas will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Some details still need to be worked out, such as whether we will choose just one meeting place for weekend hikes or two, and w here those meeting places will be. We will probably require family hikes into wilderness areas to be pre-registered with limits, al though this is still open for discussion. You should expect to see these changes come into effect by May when the snow clears from wilderness trails.

There will be some changes in evening hikes too. Dale Green has officially retired as coordinator (and leader!) of the famous Thursday Evening Hikes. If we can't find some volunteers to replace Dale, the Thursday Evening Hikes will cease. Please call me (595-1747) if you want to help out. The current plan is to run the evening hikes like the weekend day hikes, with different hikes departing from the same meeting place at the same time and with limits on group sizes in wilderness areas. We will maintain a list of qualified leaders and split the crowd up at sign-up time into groups led by these folks, so that we can accommodate everyone. Because of the new difficulties in getting organized, the hikes may start a little earlier too. We will need real support from the membership to keep the evening hike program running; please help!

As an aside, there is now a proposal for Monday or Tuesday Evening Hikes that are even gentler than the Wednesday Evening Hikes and are open to prospective members. We will also need help with the Wednesday Evening Hikes, so please let me know if you can help there too. We welcome volunteer leaders for any level of evening hike, of course.







Snowshoeing: Lower Red PineJanuary 22 and Lake Blanche January 23

Six of us are standing west of Sundial when trip leader Clarence Bertino mentions that someone should submit an article to the Rambler.

The sun is shining, the temperature must be close to 30 degrees, we're eating lunch, and I'm feeling pretty good about the world. "I'll do it," I volunteer. "I led the Red Pine snowshoe yesterday, so it'll be easy enough to combine that with our trip to Lake Blanche today."

Here, three days later and I'm straining to write something unique and unusual about consecutive snowshoe trips down trails up two different canyons. It's not easy. What can I say? Each of the two groups—Saturday's and Sunday's—cracked a few jokes and we had some good laughs. The weather was not typically "icebox" January on either day, and we momentarily sympathized with those west braving earthquakes and those east huddling against below zero temperatures.

But heck (pardon the Utah euphemism), the ground was steady under our shoes and the sun radiated any chill from the bones. What's to groan about? The punchlines from Norm Pobanz's and Vince Desimone's jokes on the Lake Blanche trip? Or the fact we were sweating under down vests and wool shirts?

But to tell you the truth, nothing was unique and unusual. Secondly, fresh powder can make slopes on Red Pine difficult to maneuver. Shoers need poles. Lake Blanche is steep, especially near the end and during the climb toward the lake.

Finally, both trips are great, no matter the season. Sundial speaks well for the Club's logo shrouded or not by snow, and Red Pine lakes reflect the sun either iced or free flowing. And, as always, the camaraderie of the Club complements any venture.



Mercury, Mars, and Saturn appear together low in the east at dawn, being closes on March 24. To see them you will need a good eastern view from a place like the eastern slope of the Swell or Capitol Reef.

PROTECT OUR STATE PARK SYSTEM

Contact your State Legislators to Vote AGAINST Senate Bill #299

Senate Bill #299, sponsored by Senator Mike Dmitrich, commands the Utah Dept of Natural Resources to conduct hearings in the coming year to consider turning 1200 acres of Wasatch Mt. State Park over to private development. The genesis of this idea comes from a development proposal made by Deer Run Development to develop a 300 room luxury hotel, 400 expensive homesites, and two high-priced gold course on this state park land.

We oppose this bill for the following reasons:

- !) It will establish a dangerous precedent that will open the door for similar assaults on other valuable parks such as Kodachrome Basin, Snow Canyon, Dead Horse Point, and others.
- 2) The State Parks Board can consider this proposal over the coming year—they have the background and expertise to perform this function, and they will be less vulnerable to political pressure than the Dept. of Natural Resources.
- 3) The Natural Park Service has the power to overrule this conversion because Land & Water Conservation Fund monies were used to acquire these state park lands. *Oddly enough*, NPS officials have not been consulted by any of the proponents of this bill.
- 4) These State park lands were acquired from local farmers and ranchers, under heavy pressure and with the assurance that they would remain in the public trust in perpetuity Legislators should think seriously about breaking such a commitment.
- 5.) Utah's burgeoning population needs more open park space close to the Wasatch Front, not less.



Mountain Bikes in the Wasatch; Are there Solutions to User Conflicts?

Social hour follows discussions

Balloon knobby tires, low gears and considerable physical exertion have carried an increasingly numerous new user group into the backcountry. Can backcountry cycling exist harmoniously with other traditional trail uses? Does mountain bike access create unacceptable levels of trail erosion? Should bicycling be restricted to dirt roads and highways? Is there a backcountry cycling ethic, and can it be effectively brought to the cycling public? Who are mountain bikers, anyway?

Moderator B.J. Nicholls, Utah Mountain Bike Association (UMBA) Communications Coordinator will introduce a discussion by panelists: Gregg Bromka, whose book "Mountain Biking the Wasatch" offers information about accessing Wasatch area trails; a mountain runner (to be named shortly) who advocates banning mountain bikes from all singletrack trails; a yet to be named representative of the U.S. Forest Service, Wasatch Cache National Forest; and Doug Alley, former head of UMBA. The discussion will finish with an opportunity for your questions, comments and opinions. Before the panel discussion, Greg Bromka and B.J. Nicholls will offer a brief slide presentation about mountain biking, including UMBA's volunteer trail projects and its rider education efforts.

This is one in a series of meeting sponsored by the Wasatch Front Forum, an organization created to provide a forum for Utahns to learn more about the natural history of the Wasatch Front and the legal, political and social issues facing public land managers and local governments. WFF in not intended to provide public hearings on projects, but rather to involve interested people; it will enable you to find out more about what is going on in our nearby mountains and to ask questions about new proposals. WFF is supported by the Utah Chapter of the Sierra Club, the Wasatch Mountain Club, Great Salt Lake Audubon, The Utah Nordic Alliance, the Utah Wilderness Association, the Utah Mountain Bike Association and the Citizen's Committee to Save Our Canyons.
