Ann Weschler has resigned her position as Information Director. There are 1383 members in the club, now.


WMC LODGE AVAILABLE FOR RENTAL USE








There are some important points to be disseminated this year, so I hope you'll continue reading this column.

Most importantly, we are all going to the new avalanche transceiver frequency (457 khz) this year. Those folks with old single frequency beacons which operate at 22 khz will not be allowed on tours requiring beacons. Last year was the 'phase-in' period and besides, there was always confusion associated with determining who had which frequency and who was compatible with who. This year we catch up with the rest of the world and adopt the new standard. Dual frequency beacons are acceptable. If you have any questions, contact any ski committee member. Unfortunately, the new frequency beacons are expensive, most are over \$200. But, ask yourself, 'how much is your life worth?' And if anyone tries to sell you an old beacon for 20 bucks, don't buy; it may beep, but no one will be able to locate you!

This year Harry Kimbrough will be mailing out the trip sign-up sheets to the tour leaders. If you have any problems call him at 288-1858. Thanks Harry!

Last year we had an 'almost' emergency. Apparently, someone became concerned when a friend did not return home after an MSD tour. She called the leaders house, but there was no answer. So, she contacted Cheryl, the ski director who called folks to run out and see if their cars where at the trailhead and then she called search and rescue. The situation was getting scary! Finally we found the tour, they were at the leaders house, in the hot tub, relaxing and sucking on some beers! They couldn't hear the phone!

So, to prevent this from happening again, we'd like for the tour leaders to call a message in to the WMC phone mail system. Dial 238-9669, our mailbox is #2. Just leave a short message saying your home and safe. If we have any problems, we'll call the box to see if you've checked in. We'll also put a little reminder in the sign-up lists we send to the leaders. This doesn't excuse folks from having a responsible/caring person worrying about you if you don't come home. We'll only check the box if there is a problem!

From the Snowshoeing Coordinator

Snowshoeing as a winter sports activity is continuing to gain popularity. Last winter was my first experience on snowshoes. This year I was asked to be the coordinator. Although I have years of experience on the downhill slats and some ski touring experience, which I expect to be doing occasionally during the upcoming season, I'll be trading some softer snowshoe face plants for some harder skiing face and body ploughs.

Snowshoeing provides excellent winter exercise. Winter weather conditions such as heavy snow fall, crusty snow and lousy visibility have much less effect on snowshoers than other winter sports activities participants. But, common sense applies in wearing or having immediately available, proper equipment and adequate warm underwear, outerwear, and footwear when participating in winter snowshoeing activities. Poles, with a longer length than one would use in downhill skiing, can help with a snowshoen's balance and I recommend their use on any snowshoeing tour.

I have been able to recruit some enthusiastic committee members from the WMC rolls, some experienced and capable, some novices like myself. Last year's coordinator, Knick Knickerbocker, who will be a member of the committee this season, initiated some general guidelines that appear prudent to continue for the upcoming season. We will continue the established ratings of NTD, MOD, and MSD, with appropriate plus and minus signs to indicate activities between these ratings. For safety reasons, another good rule is to keep the person behind you in sight when participating in the WMC snowshoeing tours!

As the season progresses, the Snowshoeing Committee will increase the number of moderate and difficult tours and the difficult tours could have a requirement that beacons and shovels be carried.

Watch for further notices in the Rambler regarding snowshoe rental rates and availability, show and tell (snow sports season opener) on snowshoeing gear, and group parking.

riod. This is a working board, not just a policy setting body and we have a good time. Maybe this is the year for you to see how the Club works and to help set the Club's direction. Give it some thought won't you? In general, a director's responsibilities include: responsibility for a respective area, forming a working committee, being a conduit for information to the Board and back to the membership, timely submissions of events and activities to the Rambler editor(s), keeping a current inventory list, and attending all Board meetings regardless of the season of the respective activity.

Below is a brief outline of the duties of the open positions on the Board.

President Must have been a WMC member in good standing for at least five years and have

Treasurer Receives and disburses all funds under the direction of the Board; prepares and makes deposits and writes all checks, at least twice a month, prepares and presents monthly financial statements to the Board; balances the checking account; transfers and tracks funds; and keeps records for the annual financial review. Must be computer literate and able to learn/use bookkeeping software.

Conservation Director Forms and serves as chair of the conservation committee; and trails coordinator reports to this position.

Mountaineering Director is responsible for planning the annual climbing schedule, climbing instruction, safety, and all WMC mountaineering equipment. (See the From the Mountaineering Director column in this Rambler.)

Boating Director is responsible for the annual boating schedule, safety, obtaining necessary permits, and obtaining and maintaining boating equipment. Six coordinators: canoeing, kayaking, sailing, rafting, boating equipment, and boating instruction report to this director; has a budget; and works with a committee.

Entertainment Director is responsible for arranging all entertainment and social programs in addition to securing facilities for membership meetings works with a committee; and has a budget.

Lodge Director is responsible for maintenance and Lodge work parties; the Lodge user rep. reports to this position;

> has a budget; The Club must secure culinary water and connect to the water and sewer system in 1996.

Membership Director keeps an accurate list of members, oversees membership activities for renewal and attracting new members; verifies applications and presents to the Board for approval; works with a committee; coordinates efforts with the information director; and needs to be computer literate and maintain the membership data base.

Information Director is responsible for promoting the Club and its activiattracting members and enhancing the Club's image; and coordinates efforts with the membership director.

Sulliman said we would not need skins because the sand was coherent enough to grip the bases. Like on snow, we



SUGAR HOUSE PARK

Do you live or work near Sugarhouse Park. Do you and your family use and enjoy Sugarhouse Park.

The Park as we know it is in jeopardy of change.

Friends of Sugarhouse Park is a non-profit community organization, founded out of a dedication to preserve the natural and historical value of the park. The main current concern is with a contract granted to Highland High Schol to build a baseball diamond in the park. Future concern is with any organization, wanting to develop permanent facilities in the park that will make it necessary to remove trees and open space that we need in our city.

At the Park Authority hearing in August, "Friends of Sugar House Park" presented roughly 2,040 signatures from a petition drive now into its third month. The petition states that open space in the park should be protected from development, politics, and special interests. It also demands a re-vote on the Highland High regulation baseball diamond approved by the Park Authority in February. The Authority refused their petition. To date, the contract

between Highland and the Park Authority has not been completed and the school has raised only half of the \$288,000 needed for construction. There are two conditions that are to be met before any construction can take place; if and when they are met there must be a public hearing on the proposal.

The Park Authority maintains that the "improvements" to the Little League diamond will enhance and beautify the park. Even though many trees are scheduled for removal or relocation. Experts, contacted by "Friends", advised that large trees lose 90% if their root systems during a move and take 3-5 years to recover. "Friends" will continue to gather signatures for their petition. Their goal is 10,000 signatures.


