



Now that I am finally filling in the last of the scheduled trips of the season, I can look back over a season at accomplishments and fun times.

Safety upgrades were made with some new equipment and a new stove that accommodate the large pots without hanging over the sides. New throw ropes and life jackets were also added to the inventory. The first aid kits were inventoried and refilled by a registered nurse.

Sanitation standards were upgraded in the form of a new toilet system and a bail bucket hand wash system. The new toilet system biodegrades the waste better, has a tight lid and is more hygienic than the open rocket box. (The rocket boxes are still available.)

A new paddle raft was added to the fleet. It is a sporty little 13 foot Riken. The boat is a zippy craft that reacts quickly and is a lot of fun on the river.

The "Boaters Trip Organizer's Guide" was reorganized and rewritten for greater ease in organizing a trip along additional information and guidance to the trip leaders.

Rented flatbed trailers were taken and used successfully on both the Payette and Split Mountain trips to haul fully inflated rafts from the take out points to the put ins. The trailers eliminated the work of deflating, folding and rolling boats for each trip.

A successful multi-day family trip was made to the Clearwater River in Idaho and there were at least three other family oriented trips over the season.

Three evening canoe trips on the Jordan River were organized and greatly attractive to the flat water canoe enthusiasts. These trips were wonderful for introducing WMC members to the boating program. The trips were also popular as membership qualifying trips.

Other successful trips were the Desolation Canyon Trip, Westwater trips, and Ruby Horsethief Canyon.

Overall it was a successful season in spite of the scarcity of the permits. A lot of volunteer time was committed to accomplishing the above things and please let me take this opportunity to personally thank all of you who volunteered your time unselfishly.

Challenges of the future might include obtaining more permits and recruiting more members to apply for permits, recruiting and training trip organizers, making the boating orientation trips work for drawing new boaters to the

program, finding and organizing more weekend trips, and increasing the non-permit trips as permits become more difficult to obtain.

All of you have made it a fun and successful season and thank you all!



# Summary of September 1996 WMC Board Meeting Camille Pierce

Lodge income/expenditures since Jan 1, 1996 resulted in a profit of \$6,275.95. The club's total current assets as of August 31, 1996 are \$202,815.40 and total assets are \$260,299.40.

Rich Osborne attended an informal settlement conference with the Salt Lake City County Health Department concerning water hook-up to the lodge. We discussed non-compliance with Solitude Improvement District and Salt Lake City County Health re: the sewer line. Resolution of point of diversion on a possible water source is pending.

Preliminary tabulation of lodge surveys: 60 respondents indicate, "it doesn't matter to me", 96 respondents wish the W.M.C. to retain ownership of the lodge, 90 are for creating an historical foundation and 35 wish to dispose of the structure. The board agreed to extend the deadline for returning the surveys. Board volunteers are calling members to remind them to return surveys.

A lodge work party is scheduled for October 19th and 20th.


The board approved Brad Yates as the W.M.C. representative to the Utah Wilderness Coalition until a new Conservation Director is admitted to the board.

The board accepted the W.M.C. Coordinator, Lodge Users Representative job description.

The General Membership meeting is scheduled for October 9, 1996. Tentative agenda items include: lodge status and results of survey, synopsis of director's activities, budget and a program

The board voted to contribute \$10 towards purchase of the engraved Pfeifferhorn plaque to recognize outstanding work by an individual to preserve and protect some natural aspect of the environment of Utah.

The group noted that W.M.C. members participated in the cancer Survivors at the Summit climb of Kings Peak.



19 new members were approved for membership making a total of 1245 members in the club.

# TREASURER'S REPORT **Bob Janzen**

Where does my \$30 (or \$45 for couples) in annual dues go? I'm sure that this has been a burning question that keeps many of you up late at night! For starters, the WMC has an office that we rent (\$270/month rent), a boat shed (\$50/month rent), and a Lodge that we own. Both the office and the Lodge have operating expenses that need to be covered. The WMC maintains the office with telephone, however, there is no paid clerical help there during the day. That is all done by volunteer help - people come in to open mail, check messages, process memberships, etc. None of the WMC Trustees, Board members or leaders are salaried or paid for their time.

#### Out of your dues:

- 25 % (approximately) covers the direct cost of the Rambler printing and mailing
- 10 % is allocated toward Conservation and Conservation related issues
- 15 % goes to the Lodge Operations and Maintenance Fund

50 % (more or less) goes to General Fund expenses such as maintaining the office, phone line, computer and printer for Rambler preparation, miscellaneous postage, copying, and expenses associated with the many activities that the Club sponsors. The more expensive activities, such as boating and entertainment, generally tend to cover most of their expenses by the fees that they charge.

These numbers can vary fairly widely from year to year due to conservation, lodge and other expenditures. WMC finances will also be discussed during the Oct. 9 General Membership meeting.

#### LODGE SURVEY RESULTS

Preliminary results of the Lodge Survey are in. The survey form was sent out August 20 with a deadline of the 30th. Due to the late delivery of some of the mail, plus the Governing Board's decision to allow more time, we were still tabulating the late survey forms up to the middle of September.

Following the format of the survey form the results are as follows:

The math doesn't quite add up because of ambiguous or incomplete answers. The tentative total stands at 345 survey forms returned. This is about 25% of the total membership of the Club.

In addition to the choices of alternatives, the majority of club members submitted comments and feelings such as

- I have worked hundreds of days over a period of 50 years working on the Lodge. I think it is about time some of the younger club members supported the Lodge too.
- Never been there. Map Please?
- Most viable long term prospect for survival of the lodge, plus the best business footing to operate it, is by means of a Foundation.
- Don't lose this historic treasure!

Detailed results will be discussed at the General Membership Meeting scheduled for October 9, 1996. Be there and be informed!






Kermit Earl and Bonnie Walsh Utah Centennial Bike Ride

## Ferguson Canyon to Salt Lake Overlook Hike by Richard J. Zeamer

We met in the park and ride lot at the entrance to Big Cottonwood Canyon. The hike we were to go on was remarkable close by. We could see Ferguson Canyon from the parking lot. It is a small, high and steep-sided canyon just to the right and south of Big Cottonwood Canyon, above the houses on the right side slope, that is above the road entering Big Cottonwood Canyon.

Going down was much easier, not just because we were going down, but because we selected, from our recent experiences, the most firm and level trails. These were mainly on the south side of the canyon.


## Maybird Lakes Hike by Randy Long

In the process, preservationists' views often clash with those who wish to mine, graze, cut lumber, or introduce recreational vehicles on these same lands.

At the forum, candidates Cook and Anderson will share their opinions about a broad spectrum of environmental and public land matters. Selected members of the conservation and industry community along with media representatives will ask specific questions of the candidates as will members of the audience. The key issues to be discussed at the forum include the candidate's views on:

- Commercial Use of Public Lands Grazing, Logging and Mineral and Oil and Gas Development; the Endangered Species Act and the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act; Open Space, Biodiversity, and Ecosystem Management.
- Public Use of Public Lands Privatization of National Parks and Public Lands, S.R. 2477 Rights of Way, Utah BLM Wilderness Designation, Off Highway Vehicle Recreational Use, and Compatible Multiple Uses.

Please join in this informative discussion as a prelude to the November elections.

The Wasatch Front Forum, now in its fifth year, will feature the 1996-97 meetings on the second Tuesday of most months, during the six-month period of October through March. The Forum was created to provide a forum for Utahns to learn more about the natural history of the Wasatch Front and the legal, political and social issues facing public land managers and local governments. The Forum is supported in part by the Citizens' Committee to Save Our Canyons, The Utah Chapter of the Sierra Club, Friends of The Uintas!, Wasatch Mountain Club, and Great Salt Lake Audubon.
