
TURKEY OR BELIZE SAILING AND LAND





The Bonneville Shoreline Trail Needs Your Help

If you use trails in the Salt Lake foothills, your help is needed to support an amendment to the Open Space Master Plan necessary to allow construction of a segment leading to Ensign Peak through the North Cove area. (Ensign Peak is north of the Capitol and west of City Creek Canyon.) The Salt Lake Planning Commission unanimously approved this route as being the most environmentally sound, the best for meeting the major goal of the Shoreline Trail (which is to provide an urban interface trail that runs along most of the Wasatch Front), and the best for trail users. The Bonneville Shoreline Trail Committee (BSTC) fully supports this recommendation. However, the final decision on amending the Open Space Master Plan to accommodate this route rests with the Salt Lake City Council.

Unfortunately, the Planning Commission/BSTC-approved route is being vigorously opposed by a few homeowners in an exclusive, private "gated" development located in North Cove. They say they are concerned that the route will bring crime and vagrants to their neighborhood. However, the opposite effect has been found along segments of the Shoreline Trail already constructed. Increased use by legitimate and responsible hikers and mountain bikers brings a presence which tends to discourage daytime crime and casual vandalism.

Conversely, it is my belief if the North Cove owners succeed in forcing routing of the trail totally outside North Cove, the risk to trail users of predatory crimes such as rape is likely to be greater than with the Planning Commission-approved route. At least in California, where I lived for eight years, such crimes seem to occur more often on segments of urban trails that are more remote and/or receive less use. There seem to be fewer incidents where trails are visible and in audible range of nearby neighborhoods, or where there is a steady flow of foot (and/or bicycle) traffic. The alternate route outside North Cove, which I observed on a hike with the Planning Commission, would be considerably longer and somewhat steeper than the approved route. Thus, foot/bicycle traffic would probably be reduced on this segment. Much of that segment would also be completely out of sight of the neighborhood.

The City Council will decide this issue in January. Please write or call Council members, and plan to attend the hearing. The date will be announced in the January Rambler and elsewhere.

THE 1998 YURT SCHEDULE (THE BEST WAY TO SKI/SNOWSHOE) BRIAN BARKEY

Think of the most wonderful time you've ever had, and multiply the fun by 6 (or 8)! Yup, that's the experience most folks have when they go on a mountain club sponsored yurt trip. The fun is so great, that it seems we see the same folks on these trips every year! But don't be shy, there are no dangerous, alcohol induced initiation ceremonies or extreme attitudes required. Nope, all you need is a desire to enjoy the winter wonderland with similar minded folks.

Yurts are reinforced canvas tents, similar to the round Mongolian yurts, but with wood fired stoves for heat and to melt water from snow, complete kitchen facilities, including pots, pans, plates, cups, silverware, propane stoves and lanterns. You bring your food, clothes, personal gear, and (unless you rent a sleeping bag liner from the Baldy Knoll operators) your own sleeping bag. The personal hygiene facilities are, uh, lets say, rustic, but they have great views!

This year, the Wasatch Mountain Club has reserved four time slots at three different yurts. In Logan canyon, a short two hour drive from Salt Lake, we have reserved the Steammill yurt January 2nd and 3rd (What a great way to start the new year!), The Bunchgrass yurt on February 14th and 15th (Bring your Valentine), and Steammill again on March 6th and 7th. These are excellent yurts for beginner-intermediate skiers/snowshoers/snowboarders as they are only a short 2-3 miles from the trailhead and an easy 1400ft or so climb. It is possible to use s sled to bring your stuff up to these yurts. There are no dangerously steep slopes on the approach to these yurts, but if you plan to ski the local hills, avalanche equipment and knowledge is recommended. These yurts have room for 6 people at a total cost of \$42 each.

We have also reserved the Baldy Knoll yurt located near Driggs, Idaho for 3 days, January 16th, 17th, and 18th. This yurt is a bit more difficult to approach, and avalanche equipment and knowledge is required. Sleds are not appropriate for this yurt, but the reward is some wonderful hills for skiing right outside your door. This yurt can accommodate 8 people at a total cost of \$56.25 each.

Cell Phones Save Lives by Phil Mimmack

While hiking on the west slope of Timp in the afternoon of November 2nd, I came upon a man whose horse had stumbled and fallen on top of him. His leg was broken and he could not even sit on the horse for the ride back down. I called 911, they sent an AirMed helicopter, and we were able to med-evac him with an hour of daylight remaining.

While the cell phone probably did not actually save his life, it did get him rescued by nightfall, saving him from serious complications due to exposure and a much more strenuous trip off the mountain. A November evening at 8000' would be difficult for anyone who was unprepared, but for someone with a serious injury, it could be very traumatic. There was a good chance of a ground rescue team reaching him by 7 or 8, since a fellow rider had started for the trail head just before I arrived. But that would have been a far more traumatic evacuation, which certainly would have caused additional damage. As it was, a team of surgical specialists spent 3 hours repairing the compound fracture just above the ankle and he will have trouble with it for the rest of his life.

Moral of the story? Bring your cell phone on all trips. I put mine in a zip-loc baggie, and put that in a padded Totes carrying case (\$7 at the Factory outlet store in Draper). If you don't have one and are considering getting one, I hope this story tips the scale. If they're too expensive for you (I admit that I got mine due to a good deal thru my employer), Radio Shack has a portable CB radio that costs \$80 and weighs less than 2 lbs. Ch 9 is a designated emergency channel.

Winter is upon us, and time-to-rescue becomes all the more critical. We skiers all carry avalanche beacons because every minute counts if someone is buried. But the hours count as well, so having a phone or radio is very, very valuable.

Kessler Peak Hike by Jerry Hatch

I finally got the chance to climb Mt. Kessler with Charlie Keller. His association with the mountain is, of course, legendary. He and his wife, Allene have climbed the peak an amazing number of times, and have even established some of the trails that wend their way up its flanks. What I didn't know until I went on Charlie's Labor Day hike, was that he is also an expert on the history of the mountain, and what a fascinating history it is.

Charlie and Allene like to get started early; when the faint sunlight streams obliquely through the tops of the highest pines and aspens, and all the verdure below is still wrapped in cool damp shadow. We started out by crossing Big Cottonwood Creek on a pile of debris, and quickly made our way to the cabin of the blind miner. Roy Neuman has been gone from the cabin for over a quarter of a century, but much of his spirit remains. The white painted, corrugated iron cabin has a substantial, tidy feel to it. It was obviously meant to be a comfortable home for that sadly maimed, but very determined man. (It is the only Wasatch Mountain miner's cabin, that I know of, that has a cellar.)

Our route was up the very steep Argenta Trail. It began as a skid path where lumber from the high slopes was brought down to the mill near the stream. After about an hour's climb, we came to a clearing that was thickly covered with the reddish-brown duff of disintegrating logs. Charlie explained that this was a collection point for logs cut farther up the mountain. Frederick Kesler, (only one 's'), was an early Mormon bishop and entrepreneur. In the 1850's and 60's he walked all over the mountain to find adequate trees; trees to be used in the building of pioneer Salt Lake City,

With the coming of the railroad in 1869, it became more economical to bring in lumber from farther away, and the chopping crews drifted off the mountain. The mountain wasn't at peace for very long, however. Later in the decade the Carbonate mine was established. This was one of the first great mines of the Wasatch.

About twenty minutes beyond the first clearing, Charlie pointed out another clearing. This clearing, he believed was where the road from the Carbonate mine had ended. Since the mine was located near the summit, and the ore needed to be brought down to Argenta, (a settlement near where we started hiking), the miners had hacked a road down to the top of Kesler's log slide. From there they skidded the ore down in big cowhide bags. "Did you notice how the rocks had been thrown off to either side of the trail?" Charlie asked, "that was to keep them from tearing up the bags."

The trail continued up the now faint trace of the road, past a few great, solitary, old growth pines, which, because of the inaccessibility, had escaped Frederick Kesler's axemen. Their very massiveness made them wonderful and unique. I marveled at their lower branches, thick as small trees, and how they angled away from the trunks in parallel with the slope.


Farther up, (past the famous stone cabin, which looked like an Anazazi ruin on top of its cliff), the road trace was completely gone. We had to cross a steep scree slope, which shot down to a band of cliffs. Acrophobia froze me in place until Allene commanded, "don't look down, just keep going." Once across I reflected on how absolutely alpine nature can abolish the works of man; a hundred and twenty years ago this place had been a decent roadway for heavily laden ore wagons.

Little remained of the Carbonate mine either. There was a great tip, of course, (nature has her work cut out reclaiming that mess), but of the interesting, historic stuff there was precious little left. A few low stone walls, and a few piles of broken iron flat work, and that was about it. "Sic transit gloria mundi", . . . still a faint odor of history remained.

On the top Charlie told us more stories of the mountain. The one I remembered most vividly was about a tramway that went to a mine on top of the Reed and Benson ridge, and about how when the cable snapped, one of the cars came crashing down through the back of the tram house. Charlie is a good historian, and a good story teller, (I would argue that all good historians are good story tellers), and he knows that mountain, and the

country around it. For four years now he was been researching a book about the Cottonwood canyons and Millcreek. I hope that he gets it finished. I want to read it.









God's Dog: A Discussion of Coyote Management in Utah and the West

Tuesday Evening, December 9, 1997-7:00 p.m.

First Unitarian Church-Weeting Hall, 569 South 1200 East, Salt Lake City

Since the latter half of the nineteenth century coyotes have been hunted and killed in great numbers because of the threat they were believed to pose to livestock. Since that time these adaptable and resilient animals have tripled their range and they have flourished.

As we approach the end of the 20th century these animals are still hunted and killed by government agents, ranchers and others. There are still arguments over exactly what toll coyotes take on our livestock industry and which methods of livestock protection work and which ones don't. Many environmentalists and wildlife advocates argue that we should be focusing our attention on non-lethal means of protecting livestock, or that the government shouldn't be in the livestock protection business at all. Ranchers, farmers and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and many state agriculture departments, argue that lethal methods are an essential part of coyote control and are appropriate to protect the property of livestock owners.

Is coyote control in Utah and the West having the desired effect? Are there ethical problems with the way we manage coyotes? What are the economic costs to the livestock industry? Do they justify the expense of coyote management efforts? Who are the major players in the debate over coyote management and control? Join us for what is sure to be an interesting discussion at the December Wasatch Front Forum.
