There is safety in numbers! The more of you that apply for permits the better the chance of obtaining the permits needed for an upcoming exciting season. Filing for permits in the various nearby systems is discussed below.

Applications for the Idaho Rivers can be obtained from any one of the following addresses. All of the rivers are on one application and stated as choice one, two, three, or four. CONSERVATION DIRECTOR SUSAN SWEIGERT

Happy New Year, and I hope all you Mountain Clubbers had a fine holiday season. About those New Year's resolutions - consider making at least this one: to give back a little to the beautiful public lands that are virtually the *raison d'être* for the Club's existence, by making at least one contribution to conservation efforts. With the ever-increasing pressures of population and commercial tourism on Utah's public lands, every voice is needed to support and protect these lands. Beyond hands-on activities like trail maintenance, your voices are especially needed in the political arena. Especially if you've never done this sort of thing before, **resolve that this year you will write or telephone one state or national politician, or one letter to the Forest Service or BLM**, about a current issue in Utah public-lands protection that concerns you. Without the action of citizens like us, who know and use these lands, can projects like the cat-track widening, tree thinning, and boulder blasting recently proposed by the Forest Service in the Alta Draft EIS be stopped or modified.

Moving on, as of December 10 we've received only twenty-three responses to the Conservation Issues questionnaire in the November issue of the Rambler. Please take a few moments to fill out the questionnaire and return it. The responses thus far range the gamut, with each item on the list being named as the most important by at

least one person. YOUR INPUT IS VALUABLE TO US - please let us know which issues are most important to you. And if you're interested in working on an issue, please let us know that too in the section for comments.

Finally, **you still have a chance to contribute to revising the boundaries of the Citizens' Wilderness Proposal** for Utah. The Utah Wilderness Coalition is conducting a re-survey of the boundaries of existing units and potential new units for the 1997 bill (the bill has to be re-introduced every two years when Congress changes). The UWC re-survey is unlikely to be completed by the end of the year. So, we continue to seek volunteers to help with the re-survey, especially in the West Desert and San Rafael Swell. Volunteers need to be pretty competent with a map and, given the time of year, willing to work in wet and cold conditions. You will be provided with 7.5' maps and detailed instructions. **If you're interested in helping put the capital "C" in the "Citizens Proposal" by doing a weekend or two of survey work**, please contact me (Susan Sweigert) at 521-8554, or Brad Yates at 521-4185.

A reminder, the annual WMC avalanche clinic is on Thursday, January 16th at the Zion's Lutheran church at 1070 S. Foothill Blvd. at 6:30 p.m. If you venture into the winter back country on skis, snowshoes, snowmobiles or other means, you should attend. What you learn here may save your life!

Last month I promised that I would write a little more on the skills and materials necessary to survive an unexpected back country incident. Among back country skiers, particularly 'Techno-Geeks', equipment is almost a religion. On any ski tour, invariably, there's a discussion about the merits of the newest 'ultra-waterproof/bulletproof thingamajig' or what not. Any of the local sports equipment stores will be happy to sell you an assortment of stuff that they claim is 'essential' for your convenience and or safety. Sometimes they're right, other times, well, you have to realize that everything you have must be carried on your back! Actually, there are only a few absolute necessities, most of the time, a person with a little imagination can improvise repairs. I once saw an improvised ski pole basket made from a Power Bar!

Below is list of the essentials that members of the ski committee believe you should have in your back country pack. Realize, that these items are oriented towards back country skiers, particularly telemarking/downhill tourists. Some of these items may not be needed for cross country ski tourists on flatter areas:.

Lightweight avalanche shovel.

A slope meter (put this in an outside pocket so that it'll be used often)

A snow saw.

Avalanche probe/probe poles.

Repair kit, including duct tape (10-20'), piano wire, a shoestring, spare binding/bail, screws to mount binding with a small section of steel wool to fill stripped holes, a multipurpose tool with pliers/screwdrivers/knife blade, a spare ski pole basket. All of these items will fit into a small bag.

A plastic sheet, i.e. a reinforced space blanket. This will keep a person warm, and also can be used to pull out an injured person.

A first aid kit. I've found that in wilderness situations, bandages and sterile gauze are most often needed for major trauma.

A length of rope. I use a 50' section of 4 mm static line. This is light, small and in a pinch, this rope can be used to belay a person, it can be used to stabilize a splint or cut cornices for slope testing.

Spare gloves, warm hat, goggles, sunglasses. Extra layers of insulating clothes.

Compass/map.

A Phone. In the Wasatch mountains, cellular reception is often available.

Food for lunch and plenty of water. I've heard that back country skiing is one of the most physically demanding sports around.

This list is not intended to be the last word on what you'll need in your pack, it is only a guide. There are as many different opinions on what should be carried along on a ski tour as there are ski tourists. This is one opinion from a somewhat experienced tourist.

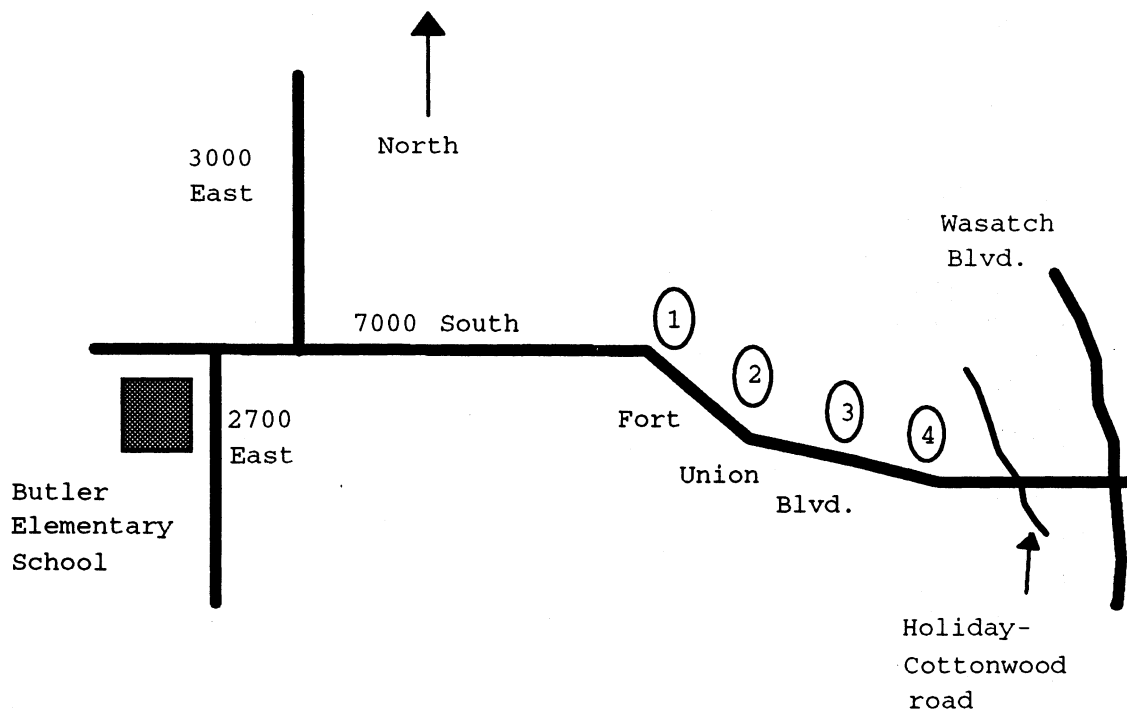

WASATCH MOUNTAIN CLUB YURT INFORMATION

This is a shortened version of the yurt information published in December's Rambler.

The yurts in Logan Canyon, which is a short 2 to 2.5 hour drive from Salt Lake are 3 to 4 miles and 1500 to 2100 vertical gain from the trailhead. As a veteran of both trips, I can say that these access trails are gentle enough for beginning intermediate skiers to handle as long they have good back country ski equipment and are in good cardio-vascular shape. I have used a sled to transport my gear into these yurts. It would be a rather long, yet technically easy snow shoe trip. Although the access terrain is relatively shallow and free of danger, an avalanche beacon/knowledge is recommended, particularly if you plan on 'yo-yo' skiing the adjacent slopes. These yurts are operated by Powder Ridge ski touring based in Cache valley, Utah. This year we have reserved three dates for these yurts;

The cost is \$46 per person with the maximum of 6 people in the yurt. The yurt operators requests that we send them release forms as soon as possible, so please contact the trip organizers soon. Besides, these are popular trips and, in the past, they filled up fast!

We have also reserved a yurt at Baldy Knoll through Rendezvous Ski Tours for the nights of January 18th and 19th.. This yurt is in Idaho, near Driggs. The access route to this yurt is more difficult. Carole Lowe, the yurt operator describes the ski out as "Mr. Toad's wild ride" in reference to an attraction at Disney Land. I've never been to it (Disney Land) but since I've done this yurt, I can only imagine! Needless to say, this trip is not for beginners. Avalanche transceiver/knowledge is required. After a ski in of 4.5 miles and a climb of 2100 feet, you're rewarded by solitude and some of the nicest skiing to be had. They average 500 inches of snow each season.

This year, the trip organizer is Walt Haas 534-1262. The operators don't require release forms until you get there, but it is wise to call early. This is a popular yurt, and we were lucky enough to get it on a holiday this year.

WASATCH FRONT FORUM

POLITICS AND UTAH WILDLIFE

An examination of the Governor's Office, DWR, Wildlife Board, and Wildlife Regional Advisory Council's activity in the balancing of predators and their prey, wildlife privatization, and bio-politics.

Tuesday Evening, January 14, 1997 - 7:00 p.m.

First Unitarian Church-Meeting Hall, 569 South 1300 East, Salt Lake City

The State Division of Wildlife Resources is charged with the duty and responsibility as trustee and custodian of wildlife in the State and determines facts relevant to wildlife resources. Upon the determination of these facts, Utah's Wildlife Board establishes policies that accommodate the purposes and fulfill the intent of all laws pertaining to wildlife along with the preservation, protection, conservation, perpetuation, introduction and management of wildlife. The Wildlife Board also determines the circumstances, time, location, means, and the amounts, and numbers of protected wildlife which may be taken or killed. Five Regional Advisory Councils (RAC's) currently make recommendations to the Wildlife Board on a wide spectrum of wildlife matters.

Conflicts in the Utah wildlife bureaucratic arena have escalated ever since the Leavitt Administration significantly "reorganized" the staffing and leadership of the Division, particularly after the whirling disease parasite was discovered in a Leavitt family private fish hatchery in Wayne County. Other wildlife conflicts escalate as urban and rural, and hunting and non-hunting interests clash. Sporting interests seek larger deer and elk herds, contrary to the interests of cattle and sheep owners, and animal activists and preservationists increasingly claim "hook and bullet" interests controls state wildlife policies. Has politics played a significant role in recent wildlife matters? Has biological reasoning taken a back-seat to rural political force? Who are the primary players in this stewardship and political wildlife controversy and what's the near future of wildlife, game and non-game, in the State, and along the Wasatch Front, where most Utahns live.

The Forum was created to provide a forum for Utahns to learn more about the natural history of the Wasatch Front and the legal, political and social issues facing public land managers and local governments. 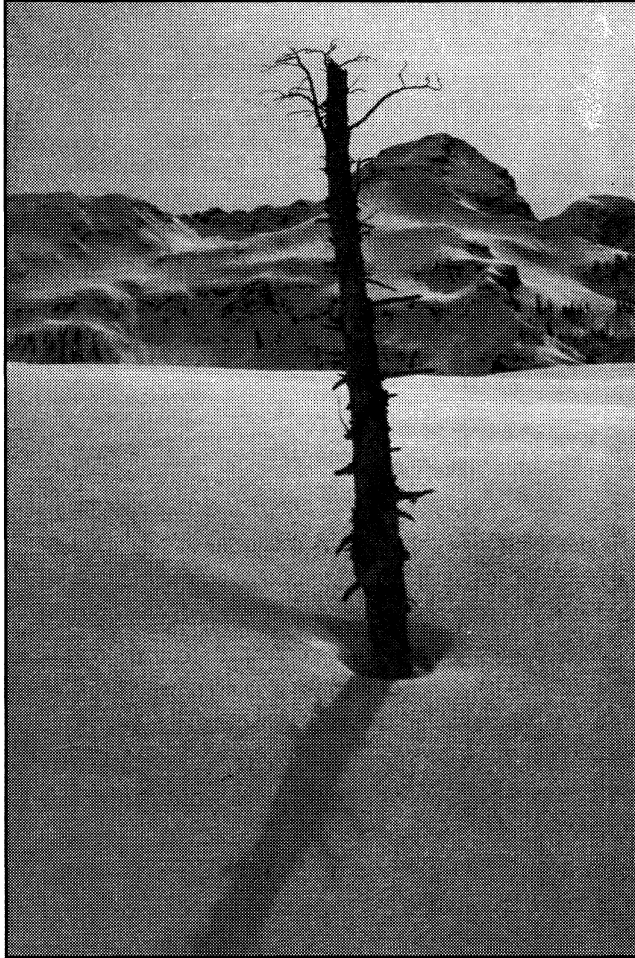
