FROM THE EDITOR:

Some of you want to know why the deadline for submissions to the Rambler was permanently changed to the 10th of the month.

Rambler Timeline:

4 days = time for volunteers to do the Rambler

7 days = time for Transcript Bulletin (the printing company) to print the Rambler

2-4 days = time for World Wide Mailing (the labeling company) to label, sort, bag, and deliver the Ramblers

7 days = time for U.S. Postal Service to deliver the Rambler to your doorstep

20-22 days = total time to produce, print, label, and deliver the Rambler

As you can see, producing the Rambler is a three-week process that involves WMC volunteers and three companies. You cannot get your Rambler on your doorstep in the first week of the month with the old deadline of the 15th. If you are concerned about missing out on activities, look at the previous month's Rambler or get on line at www.wasatchmountainclub.org.

Why does it take the volunteers so long? Because we're volunteers with 9-5 jobs.

Why doesn't the club label, sort, bag, and deliver the Ramblers to the U.S. Postal Service instead of paying a company? First, we suck at our own labeling. We don't get enough volunteers and the Postal Service rules are too complex. Second, World Wide Mailing does this for us for free; because they have the equipment and resources, they get us a better postage rate. This service costs \$1,200 - \$2,000 per year. In summary, the benefits outweigh the cost.

Why does it take so long for the Transcript Bulletin to print the Rambler? Seven days to print the Rambler is a reasonable time in the printing industry. Printing the Rambler is not as simple as putting it on the printer, pushing a few buttons, and all the Ramblers are printed. To shorten the length of time from seven days to two days, the club would have to purchase software such as Quark Xpress (\$900) and pay more (sometimes twice as much) to make the master (the document that is used to make all the copies). In turn, this means you would pay more in dues. I opt to use a simple Word document and not increase dues.

Why does it take seven days for the U.S. Postal Service? Ask them.

- 1. Email them to: wmc@xmission.com. You can email your pictures too!
- 2. Submit the trip talk, **on a 3.5" disk**, to the club office (1390 South 1100 East in Salt Lake City). Use Microsoft Word and Arial, 10 point for all submissions. Label the diskette with your name and identify which file(s) are submissions. Enclose a hard copy in case your diskette cannot be read. The deadline is 6:00 p.m. on the 10th of the month.

How to submit pictures: The same way you submit trip talks. Photos of all kinds are accepted. Make sure that each photo is labeled with the photographer, date, and names of people. Unless a S.A.S.E. is provided, photographs will be left in the red bucket outside the WMC office door.

How to submit to the Marketplace:



Highlights from the General Membership Meeting October 18, 2000

Membership consists of 1110 members, of which, 246 are couples, 98 are partners, 2 are students, and 735 are singles. Overall, the membership is holding steady at just over 1100. Boating reported that a river clean-up trip on Desolation was added to the program this year. Members enjoyed over 400 hikes this season. A speciel thanks to Knick Knickerbocker for his help. Two conservation issues that the club has been involved with are the Snowbird Expansion Project and the San Rafael Swell Bill. Since Publications is naving difficulty meeting—the necessary deadlines to get the Rambler out on time, beginning with the December issue, the deadline for submission will be on the 10th rather than on the 15th of the month.

The Lodge report stated that 400 people hours and 40 trips to the Lodge have been put in toward Phase I of the water project. The budget is \$150K, of which, \$30,000 has been spent on 1000' of lines, \$20,000 has been spent on architect/engineer/permit costs, and \$35,000 has been spent on the excavation concrete and rough plumbing work. The balance is \$65,000 to complete the addition. The Lodge Director is trying to develop a volunteer program to utilize electricians, plumbers, roofers, and carpenters to assist with the completion of the addition. So, please call Rob Merritt and volunteer your services. We ended the evening by watching the video of the Old Timer's Party that Jean Frances and Mike Treshow made.

? How do I submit my activity to the club?

Send your proposed activity for approval to the appropriate director for inclusion in their activity schedule. Activities sent directly to the Rambler are not accepted.

? What are some of the rules and regulations?

- Dogs and children are not allowed on WMC activities, except when specifically stated in the activity description.
- Car pool rates: Gas plus \$0.15/mile, shared by everyone in the vehicle (including the driver) on 2WD roads, OR gas plus \$0.25/mile on 4WD roads OR \$0.08/mile/person on 2WD roads shared by everyone in the vehicle.
- 3. **Notice to Non-Members:** Prospective members must attend, and have trip organizers sign, two qualifying activities (not including socials) prior to submission of an application for membership. Most WMC activities are open to prospective members as one of the two qualifying activities for membership, except when specifically stated in the activity description. Weekend outings count as both qualifying activities.

SKI RATINGS:

Here is the listing of ski tours and their ratings according to difficulty.

- There is considerable subjectivity in this, so if you feel the rating is too high or low, please let us know.
- All mile numbers are ROUND TRIP, from beginning to end.
- Unless otherwise noted, all trips are in the category labeled SKI BACKCOUNTRY.
 - This type of trip requires stout metal-edged skis, radio beacon, skins, and the skill of executing turns.
 - Typical examples are Powder Park or Catherine Pass.
- A trip labeled SKI TOUR is one that is mostly horizontal, involves using the kick-and-glide motion, and does not seek heights from which to do turns on the descent.
 - Typical examples are Beaver Creek or Norway Flats.
- SKI-MTN is a rating for difficult trips that, in addition to ski gear and radio beacons, include boot climbing on exposed terrain and require self-arrest skills. The rating is determined by the most difficult technical requirement of the trip. For example Pink Pine is short, but it is quite steep, so it is rated MSD. Ratings are as follows:

Avalanche knowledge is a prerequisite for winter travel. A new rating category for AVALANCHE AWARENESS is included to help you assess the relative risk for each trip.

- A! trip crosses major avalanche path and/or multiple avalanche paths
- A trip crosses known avalanche path
- M trip involves minimal risk of avalanches.

Difficulty = (M) + (3K). M is the round trip miles including tenths, if any. K is the thousands of feet of altitude gain including tenths, if any. For example: Catherine Lake at 4.4 miles round trip and 1200 feet of altitude gain.

CARPOOL PARKING LOTS FOR SKIING AND SNOWSHOEING:

Butler Elementary School: Access the parking lot from 2700 East just south of 7000 South (Fort Union Blvd.). We do not have a guarantee that cars won't be towed from here in the event of snow.

FORT UNION COUNTY PARKING LOTS: The numbers are for the WMC. Don't expect to see any numbered signs; these are basically wide pullouts on the north side of Fort Union Blvd. County time restrictions are to be followed. NO PARKING FROM 10 p.m. TO 8 a.m.

Lot 1: 3220 East Fort Union Blvd. (7000 South). This lot will hold an estimated five cars.

Lot 2: 3360 East Fort Union Blvd. (7090 South). This lot will hold an estimated 10-15 cars.

Lot 3: 3420 East Fort Union Blvd. (7140 South). This lot will hold an estimated seven cars.

Lot 4: 3600 East Fort Union Blvd (7225 South). This lot will hold an estimated 10-15 cars.

Message from the Lodge Director:

LODGE CONSTRUCTION REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER:

As you may recall, the water and sewer lines were installed and excavation for the addition was completed in August. During September, the footings, then the foundation walls were poured and the plumbing that runs below ground was installed. The old water line from the stream was removed from the kitchen.

LODGE CONSTRUCTION REPORT FOR OCTOBER:

All of the lines were run to the kitchen. These include the cold and hot water lines, drain line and heating system supply and return lines. The supply bypass line was run along with these and continued around the kitchen to the old drain line on the east side. Remember to pour a little antifreeze in both drains before you leave the lodge if you use the sink. The foundation was back-filled and the monument rock is again secure. The below ground plumbing was finished, then the floor heating system was installed. This consisted of an insulating pad and several hundred feet of tubing snaking all over it. With this done, the concrete floor was poured. The last work was to cover the slab with plastic and straw to protect the slab from freezing until enough snow covers it.

While construction is on hold for the winter, the construction committee is still at work, getting ready for next year. Rob is gathering names of volunteers to be involved in some of the work, such as insulating, sheet rocking, painting and staining, which will help reduce the project cost. We can also supply some of the plumbing and electrical material to further reduce costs. I can get some material free from Wisconsin, but need to figure out a cheap way to get it here. Volunteers and transportation ideas will be greatly appreciated. It is surprising to look at the amount of time and effort the construction committee has contributed to this project so far. By my estimate, it is up to 500 hours and 40 trips to the lodge.

Message from the Winter Sports Director:

A little history: The modern telemark nordic technique was really rediscovered by American skiers after having been nearly forgotten, or at least relegated to the status of an antique, in the Scandinavian countries of its origin. This rediscovery reportedly started at Crested Butte, Colorado in the late 1970's (and continued by some of us at Steamboat Springs in the early 1980's) by a handful of ski bums bored with alpine skiing and looking for a new challenge. They used nordic crosscountry skis first, then hybrid gear with stiff, single leather boots and a light metal-edged ski with a slight sidecut of 10mm. This gear was used at the resorts and eventually into the backcountry.


Skiing in the backcountry is now going "full-circle" back towards Alpine skiing. The age of specialization has arrived. Big telemark gear with alpine-width skis and plastic boots is the skiing equivalent of a "sport-utility setup"—good in rugged

terrain, but not great on open country. Lighter and hybrid gear is being abandoned. Certainly, many people new to telemarking are skiing very well these days. Is the retail ski industry happy about this? Do they have something to do with this trend? Both cross-country and telemark skiing are great fun. However, the mainstream, backcountry telemark skier covers less distances in a day of touring as the press for the steep and deep is on. Big gear makes some terrain boring. Sound familiar?


For me, some of the greatest joys in skiing are found in the middle range of the spectrum between cross-country and telemark/alpine. Skis light enough to travel where few others venture in winter, but sturdy enough to break trail, and cut turns. So, what about simply skiing uphill, downhill, through meadows, and into bowls (e.g. Rabbit Ear's Pass, Colorado, Medicine Bow Range, Wyoming, or Erickson Basin, Utah)? Check out those skis swaps or garage sales, and armed with gear that emphasizes lightness over power, some skins and kickwax (God forbid!), a good bag of tricks, and a large sense of humor, can open up many more possibilities of distance and terrain. "Light backcountry" is an accessible, affordable way to get a lot of fun out of winter. This "retro" form of skiing demands all elements of nordic technique to be used, and crashes and laughter are common, but after all, why do we do this ski thing anyway?
