

WMC Purpose (Article II of the WMC Constitution)





Trip Talks

Steam Mill Yurt Trip--Logan, UT January 7-10, 2000 By Carol Ann Langford This trip was an introduction to the back country and its moods for all the participants, particularly for the two novices (Carol Ann Langford and Dudley McIlhenny) who had never before spent a winter night in a yurt. When we left the trail head on Friday morning the weather forecast was relatively benign. We donned our skis/snowshoes about 10:30 and set out to climb/skin in with full loads and high expectations of spending all day Saturday exploring and playing on the nearby slopes. With the able assistance of trip leader Chris Winter, along with the help of his son David (the pack animal) and the navigational skill of Carrie Clark, we all arrived safely at the yurt in mid-afternoon when the sky began to cloud up.

The yurt itself was more comfortable than we anticipated and we settled in for a pleasant dinner and conversation. Unfortunately the talking soon was dwarfed by the lugubrious roar of the wind and we turned in early. Saturday found us in blizzard conditions (white-out) which lasted through Sunday, preventing us from leaving on schedule. David's cell phone was declared the device of the year as he relayed messages to various offices regarding our revised return timetable.

Fortunately we had more than enough extra food, allowing us to relax and lay around by the cozy fire while the wind howled. We set out early on Monday morning even though it was still blowing and snowing and returned safely to the trail head by noon. The biggest challenge then was to dig out our snowed-in vehicles to get to the road. Despite what the news reports said about the weather that weekend, a great time was had by all. Our survival skills certainly were sharpened!

Thanks to the teamwork on this trip, a potential catastrophe turned into a successful outing. Dudley kept us fed throughout the unexpected extra day with his bottomless supply of hot soup; Carol Ann kept up our spirits with her singing and

joking during our endless hours of claustrophobic "captivity"; David cheerfully carried heavy items from others' packs (including extra skis and boots!) when the traveler's became exhausted; Chris provided calm and consistent leadership; Carrie taught the gang how to use the porta-pottie efficiently and how to play "sets" to keep our minds off the blizzard outside. We are all grateful to have returned safely, even if it was a day late, and not to have been among the many who had to be rescued by back country patrols that weekend.

Lessons learned by the two neophytes:

- 1. For winter camping, the ability to use the groover without actually touching the seat is a skill worth acquiring.
- 2. This skill is more easily mastered by females.

- 3. In the back country, it is helpful to have one person under 35 for each person over 55.
- 4. Singing old camp songs loudly can drown out the most lugubrious wind sounds.
- 5. The pack/gear combination that seems just right in the summer somehow is considerably more heavy in the snow.
- 6. Starting the third night spent in the snow, the distance to the groover can be reduced by half.
- 7. The leadership of Chris and Carrie can turn bad weather into a good time.
