Trip Report: The Lily Lake ('Leap Year') Yurt Tour March 1- 3, 2008 by Mike Berry

The Lily Lake Yurt tour was a great success. The group met for lunch at the traditional location- the 927 Main Street Artisans Café in Evanston. The vibrant colors of Wyoming were again on display in the arts and crafts gallery. The trip register was signed after eating, and the group was on the road to the trailhead. The weather cooperated with warm and windy conditions on the drive and ski in to the yurt.

At the Winter Parking, a group was just returning from the new Boundary Creek Yurt. They reported that a number of ski tracks traversed the area into Boundary Creek. Sage was outfitted with a doggie backpack, and we were off to the races. It was warm enough (45 F) to ski the 2 miles to the East Fork Yurt without hat or gloves. The dog was able to sniff out the turn-off of to the yurt, but in our excitement to get there, we left Vince behind. He missed our turn and experienced an impromptu tour of lower East Fork trail. Fortunately, Michael had brought radios and we were able to make contact quickly.

Upon reaching the yurt, we found the East Fork site in its usual fine condition. The wind was blowing in a few snowflakes by 4 PM, but Mike, Constance, and Dave set out on a late afternoon tour that turned into a near blizzard by 5 PM. We decided to turn around on Deadman's Ridge about 1 mile away, and had a bit of trail breaking already at that point.

Back at the yurt, Mike and Dave provided a dinner of Jaipur vegetables with lentils/rice.

By Sunday morning the snowstorm had mostly passed. About 6 or 7 inches of fresh snow blanketed the area. Michael and Constance cooked a wonderful breakfast of made-to-order omelets. Mike had planned a full day exploratory trip to the new Yurt on Boundary Creek or Baker Lake at 10,400 ft. in a remote basin near the wilderness boundary. After loading daypacks at 9:30 am, the group set off with maps and GPS. We followed the

marked trail system on the way to visiting Lily Lake Yurt and Ridge Yurt. We reached the Ridge Yurt by 12 noon, and this became the turn-around point for several on the tour.



Mike, Dave, and Constance set out for the 'track' to Boundary Yurt, but the new snow had obliterated all but the faintest of tracks. However, blue markers pointed the way on the traverse into the drainage. Mike and Dave 'discovered' the Boundary Yurt situated on the east upslope of the drainage below some nice telemark slopes, and surprisingly close to (northwest of) what is most certainly 35 degree slope avalanche terrain. As no one was occupying the yurt when we arrived, we shoveled a bit, and used it as a warming hut for lunch and rest stop. The Boundary Creek yurt is the

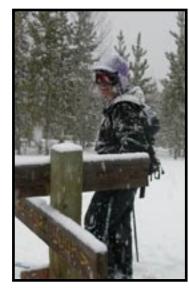
original 16 foot diameter yurt that has been relocated from the Bear Claw location. The yurt is equipped with bunks to accommodate 4 people, a wood burning stove, and a white gas cooking stove. The yurt is located above Boundary

Creek about 2 miles beyond Ridge Yurt at an elevation of 9,550.

Mike and Sage continued on up the beautiful basin to reach the 10,000 ft. contour on the east side of the drainage. Although still over 1 mile from Baker Lake, it was 3:30 pm and time to turn back. The total distance for this tour from the East Fork Yurt was 14 miles (RT), and approximately 1,500 ft. elevation gain. On the final night at the yurt, Vince and Linda prepared a tasty meal of vegetarian chili for all at 6:00 pm with hearty breads. Our overnight temperature plummeted to minus 11 F under starry skies and a waning moon.

The spring and summer service trips sponsored by the Utah Backcountry Volunteers are:

April 27-May 3 Lower Escalante River, May 11-17 Upper Escalante river, May 30-June 1 Millville Canyon (Wasatch Cache NF), June 15-21 Manti-La Sal NF/San Rafael Swell and June 29-July 5 Dark Canyon Wilderness.

Directions to Meeting Place

Mill Creek Canyon Park and Ride lot: Between 3800 S. and 3900 S. on Wasatch Blvd. (3555 E.), between the I-215 freeway and Wasatch Blvd along 3900 S. It is on the northwest corner of the intersection. You can ONLY enter it from the west-bound lanes of 3900 South. To get to the Mill Creek Canyon Road from the Park and Ride lot without making a U turn, go west (right) on 3900 South, proceed under the freeway, then turn north (right) at the next available street, which is Birch Dr.; proceed north to Upland Dr. (across from Skyline High School); go east (right) under the freeway and across Wasatch Blvd. to the Mill Creek Canyon Road (3800 South).

Skyline High School east parking lot: 3251 E. 3760 South (Upland Dr.). From the intersection of Wasatch Boulevard and the Mill Creek Canyon road (3800 South), go west under the I-215 freeway, then turn north (right) into the entrance opposite Birch Drive (3330 East).

Butler Elementary: 2700 E just south of 7000 S

Big Cottonwood Canyon Park and Ride lot: At the northeast corner of the Big Cottonwood Canyon Road and Wasatch Blvd. at the mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon.

Cottonwood Park and Ride lot: 6450 S. Wasatch Blvd. Go two lights east and south on 6200 S. from the I-215 overpass and turn east (left) onto Wasatch Blvd.; the lot is immediately on your left. Sometimes used as an overflow lot for access to Big Cottonwood Canyon.

Ft. Union Lot #4: 200 yards West of Big Cottonwood Canyon Park & Ride, near the Porcupine Pub & Grille (which is located at 3698 Ft. Union Blvd)

Little Cottonwood Canyon Park and Ride lot: 4323 E. Little Cottonwood Canyon Road. On the north side of the intersection of Little Cottonwood Canyon Road and Quarry Road at the mouth of Little Cottonwood Canyon.

Utah Travel Council parking lot: About 120 E. 300 North. Go east from the intersection of State St. and 300 North and turn south (right) into the first parking lot.

Parleys Way Kmart parking lot: 2705 Parleys Way. From Parleys Way, turn north into the parking lot; or from Foothill Drive, turn west on Stringham Ave. (2295 South) and then south into the lot.

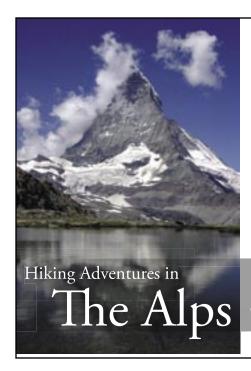
