Of all the backcountry areas in the Wasatch Mountains, the Alta "slack-country" of the Grizzly Gulch is probably the most famous. It was once the site of an old mining village called Michigan City, where huge piles of mine tailings still remain. Grizzly Gulch is an open museum of the mining activity in Utah at the turn of this century. There are dozens of abandoned mines in the steep canyon, along with old boilers and pipes, and other relics of days gone by. Like most history lessons, this one contains a message for the present. Looking at the heaps of mine tailings that now fill Grizzly Gulch, one can't help but wonder what the once pristine canyon was like before man's arrival, and how many other of our beautiful areas are being destroyed, even now, by unregulated mining activity.





Safe Backcounty Ski Travel Techniques

One at a time. There always needs to be someone left in a safe spot to do the rescue. Never put everyone on the slope at once. With large groups, split them in half and stay in visual and voice contact.

Have an escape route planned. Always think avalanche. What will you do if you trigger an avalanche? Have a plan first.


Use slope cuts. Keep your speed up and cut across the starting zone, so that if you do trigger an avalanche, your momentum can carry you off the moving slab into safer terrain. You can do this on skis, snowboards or on snowmobiles.

Watch out for cornices. They always break farther back than you think. Always give them a wide berth. NEVER, NEVER walk out to the edge of a drop-off without first checking it out. Many people have needlessly died this way.


What are the alternatives? Use terrain to your advantage. Follow ridges, thick trees and slopes with safer consequences. You can almost always go back the way you came. The route got you there; it will most likely get you back as well.


If there's no other choice, go underground. You can almost always weather out a bad storm or bad avalanche conditions by digging a snow cave in a protected area. You may be uncomfortable but you will be alive. (From the Utah Avalanche Center web site: www.avalanche.org)












FAINT TRAILS IN THE WASATCH

72. Columbus Consolidated Mining Company, Part I

In the middle of the 1890 decade Alta was well on the way toward becoming a ghost town. The winter residents could almost be counted on the fingers of two hands. Then as the nineteenth century was drawing to a close, activities began to increase, promising a revival of the mining industry. One miner commented, "There are more persons in Alta at the present than there have been in four years, more mines operating and a greater number of prospects being inquired into than at any period since the palmy days of the old Emma and Flagstaff." One of the new people was 30 year old Tony Jacobson, a man who would have a profound impact upon early twentieth century mining in Little Cottonwood Canyon. He brought with him at least fifteen years of mining experience, first in Park City, then in western Utah and Nevada. But of equal importance, he had the benefit of the wisdom of his father, Anton Jacobson, who was an Alta miner as early as 1871. Anton's first claim was located in Grizzly Gulch and named after his wife, Matilda. That mine was later consolidated with the Davenport and worked with considerable success. He filed four more claims before leaving for other mining districts. Now, nearly a quarter century later, his son was in Alta, and from subsequent events it is apparent that this man had an idea about what was needed to successfully operate a mine here and a plan to accomplish that.

His first claims, filed in September 1899 and January 1900, were located in Grizzly Gulch. Then he moved farther down the canyon and took an option on a claim owned by the old-timer Fritz Rettich. It was known as the Columbus and had been developed with a tunnel about 150 feet long. Its location was near the north end of today's Gold Miners Daughter lodge. Almost immediately Jacobson filed claims for the Columbus No.2 lode on the north side of the Columbus claim, and the Columbus No.3 lode on the south. He worked these during the year 1901 and found the lodes so promising he recorded two more claims on the north: C.K. and C.K. No.2. On the basis of his four claims and the lease on the Columbus, he formed the Columbus Consolidated Mining Company in April of 1902. The incorporators, other than himself, were his younger brother, A. O. Jacobson, mining engineers Arthur E. Snow and Roland H. Strickland, and attorney Job P. Lyon. The last two men worked together in an informal association in mining ventures, Lyon as legal advisor and Strickland as engineer and promoter. Lyon may have helped with the incorporation process and both may have assisted in securing finances during the following year, but neither one remained with the company beyond its first year. Tony's brother would remain as a partner throughout Tony's life, then continued as one of Alta's major mining professionals.

With the company established, the year 1902 was one of great achievement and even greater promise. By midsummer as many as twenty miners were employed and a carload of ore was being shipped each week, enough to pay expenses while development work was blocking out tons of ore underground. The tunnel had been


extended to a length of about 600 feet, with numerous drifts and inclines run to follow ore bodies. The problem of ventilation, while never mentioned in news releases, appeared to be handled temporarily by using the draft from a stove. This is suggested by the tall smokestack seen in the accompanying photograph. A conically shaped stove was made of sheet metal, resting on the ground, and having a tight-fitting door, also of sheet metal. A 6-inch stove pipe, was connected to the top of the stove, extending twenty to twenty-five feet in the air to provide draft. Another pipe of similar diameter was attached to the stove near its base and run back into the tunnel, using as many lengths of pipe as might be necessary. Joints were sealed with tarred rags, the entire assembly made as air tight as possible, save the opening at the top of the chimney and the end of the pipe in the tunnel. When roaring fire inside, they became an air pump, drawing air in from the tunnel and out the chimney, air replaced by fresh air flowing in from the portal. This method was used at many mines over the years. It was reported the draft at the end of the pipe in the tunnel would be nearly strong enough to draw the flame from a candle. That this was a primitive method of ventilating a mine tunnel cannot be denied, but it was a temporary expedient. During the year a boiler and air compressor were ordered, installed and were operating in mid-December. Besides ventilating the tunnel, its compressed air ran air drills, supplementing the manual labor that had been in use.

The 1902 year ended with several other important events. In October the Columbus claim, the base of all the company's operations, was formally purchased from Fritz Rettich, and three additional claims, Columbus Numbers 4, 5 and 6 were added to its holdings. Possibly of greater importance was the addition of three new men to the company's directory, each a source of important development funds. C.K. McCornick, a son of long-time Salt Lake City banker, W. S. McCornick, and an investor in many western mining ventures, became vice president of the company. The other two men were from Michigan, the first of a number of investors from that

state to contribute to the company's finances.

With the infusion of capital, Tony Jacobson began implementing his vision of a successful mining operation. One of the key items was the provision of a concentrator. While some ore of shipping grade was taken out of the mine, most of the ore blocked out for future development was of a milling grade and had to be concentrated, or refined before it could be shipped profitably. The need for this had been cited even before the company was incorporated, and a small jigging plant was provided to treat some ore, but his view of a successful operation required a large plant, which in turn required a significant amount of power. The cost of purchasing and hauling coal up the canyon, which had been done for the small compressor plant, was considered excessive. The alternative was to use electrical power, generated by a hydroelectric plant on the Little Cottonwood stream. And so in June of 1903 he filed notice with the State engineer to appropriate water from the creek. Contracts for the construction of the power plant were awarded in August. In anticipation of its completion a large new building, 35' by 80', was constructed near the portal of the tunnel to be used as a compressor house, machine shop and blacksmith shop. Also during the last quarter of the year a boarding house was completed to house the miners.

During the 1903 year the company also added to its land holdings. The Columbus tunnel was getting its finest ore when it entered the Braine fissure, which was under the Braine claim, which in turn was completely enclosed by the Columbus No.2 claim. To prevent lengthy litigation, the company simply bought the Braine claim from its owner. This seemed to be a standard tactic for Tony Jacobson. His approach was to file claims located contiguous to one another, leaving no open space between them. Old nineteenth century claims, however, were generally long and narrow, oriented in various directions and rarely located side by side or end to end. No.3, C - Columbus No.2, D - C.K., and E -While Jacobson bought such claims of conflict, his contiguous claims took C.K. No.2. The Columbus claim, A, shown in care of the open spaces between the earlier ones. Old claims he bought included the Braine, Comet, Xantippe, Garfield, Enterprise and Michigan. As a result they simply disappeared. In later years when the Columbus modern highway and the Goldminers Consolidated properties were transferred to another mining company, it Daughter lodge. During 1903 the company also filed another claim of its own, Columbus No.7, and acquired five additional claims filed by William Dwyer, a long-time miner who was working with the Jacobson brothers almost since they came to Alta. The claims were the Dwyer and Dwyer Nos.1 to 4. While he filed them in his own name, he later transferred them to the Columbus Consolidated company. The portal of the Howland tunnel, which was discussed in a previous Faint Trails article, was on the Dwyer claim. Since that tunnel was heading toward the Braine fissure, Jacobson began doing exploration work in it. Realizing its potential value to the company's operations, he bought the property and rights of the Elizabeth Consolidated Gold & Silver Mining Company, which included the Elizabeth, Shasta, Trinity and Enterprise claims. While not specifically cited, it also included the Howland tunnel. Miners were put to work extending it to connect with the Columbus tunnel. While most of the company's buildings would remain at the Columbus portal, the Howland tunnel would soon become the center of the mining operations. There was much activity and expansion still ahead that will be discussed in the next episode.
