

Tribute to Dale Green



Greetings Fellow WMC Members,

Our slate of officers for the 2018-2019 board of directors has been presented to the members (see Page 6 of last month's Rambler) and you, the members, will be voting on that proposed slate at the WMC Membership Meeting and Social which will be held the evening of February 15th at the REI Meeting Room at 3285 East 3300 South. Dave

Pacheco will also be on hand to receive the Alexis Kelner Conservation Award (see December's President message), presented by the WMC Board of Directors to honor an individual who contributed significantly to the preservation and conservation of Utah's public lands.

Other member business will be to vote on any new applications for Life Members. The board has reviewed and approved an application for Cheryl Soshnik, which now must be voted on by the members. As stipulated in the WMC By-Laws, Life Member candidates must maintain membership for 25 years, demonstrate a significant level of interest in club affairs, and document service to the Club equivalent to at least two years of service on the governing board. Cheryl certainly qualifies on all accounts!

We'll also briefly go over the club financials and 2018 projections, so members can see just how their

membership dues are thoughtfully put to use.

Robert Myers, the WMC Lodge Foundation President, will give club members an update on the lodge and three Lodge Foundation board vacancies. The Lodge is a very important part of the WMC history. Built in 1929 by many of the founding members of the WMC, the lodge was an overnight and weekend destination, when travel in and out of Big Cottonwood Canyon was significantly more difficult. Today, the WMC Lodge is listed on the National History Register of Historic Places. With WMC member support, the legacy of the Lodge continues.

How to apply:

Now: Get ready to submit your application

- Update your resume. It can be as long as necessary to show your work skills, outdoor experience, leadership, passion.
- Check contact information for your references
- Visit the <u>Forest Service Outreach Database</u> (https://fsoutreach.gdcii.com/Outreach) to see when vacancies will be open, and which jobs and https://www.fs.usda.gov/main/uwcnf/about-forest/districts) you want to apply to.
- Contact the local districts to ask about job details.

Mid-January: Submit your application during the one week its open!

- Search <u>USAjobs.gov</u> for keyword "Forestry" and your location (ex: "Salt Lake" or "Kamas") or get the actual announcement number from the "Outreach Database"
- Give yourself enough time, be complete!
- Answer the application questions honestly, but don't be too humble.

March: Let's Talk

- We'll be making calls to interview applicants and answer your questions
- You should get in touch with the district to let them know you're still interested.

May: Let's Go!




