

MONUMENTAL DISGRACE



During a swift visit to Salt Lake City on December 4, 2017, President Donald Trump dramatically reduced the once 1.35 million acre Bears Ears National Monument to 202,000 acres. President Trump also slashed the Grand Staircase-Escalante national monument by about 50%.

Utah's elected officials, led by Orin Hatch reveled in the moment.

This unprecedented move has been met by lawsuits from, among others, Patagonia, the Tribal Coalition (Hopi, Zuni, Ute Mountain Ute, the Navajo Nation, Ute), the Sierra Club, the Natural Resources Defense Council and the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance. It will, most likely, be years before all is settled.

I will keep you all informed as things progress.

50 YEARS AGO IN THE RAMBLER: JANUARY 1968

<u>ALTA TO WHITE PINE CANYON VIA AMERICAN FORK TWINS</u> — An <u>advanced</u> ski tour. This tour has started from top of Germania lift in past years, but may start from top of the new Sugarloaf lift this time. Bring food, water, climbers, and touring equipment. Meet at mouth of Little Cottonwood Canyon at 8:00 am to spot cars. Register by 5:30 pm Sat. Jan 27. Leader: Bruce Christensen (...)

NOMINATION BANQUET — Through WMC member, Jim Lee, we have reserved the Fort Douglas Club for our nomination dinner. As those of you who have been there know, their food is excellent, and liquor by the drink, tax free, is available (\$.45 and .65). We will have a full-course dinner of prime rib (all inclusive \$3.25), followed by a brief welcome by the president, and nominations for new club officers. Dancing by record music will round out an entertaining evening. Happy hour starts at 6:30 pm; dinner will be served at 7:45 pm. Dress in your best clothes; and, for heaven's sake, girls and guys, come with or without dates — just come. We need everyone's suggestions for the best people to run our club next year. [...]

To reach the base of every shimmering glacier, you must climb a mountain of dirt. At top speed. Are the nerves in Tom's knee sleeping too? Attaching the crampons excuses a rest. Don't hurry.

Tom and Hafty are vanishing between the ice and the cloud. Dave is new to the route, and worried. "Hurry up, Leining, before we lose sight of them."

Calling to them to wait for us is futile. Now we start across the ice. The crampons are great, their teeth gripping the glacier, yet penetrating only halfway into the other boot when you stumble. The snow bridges are firm. How deep are the crevasses, anyway? [...]

The true summit is a large cornice on which none of us volunteers to plant the flag. The summit register, like that of Mt Balfour several days ago, consists of scraps of paper crammed in scraps of metal unlike a trophy cup. [...]



AVALANCHE LECTURE & BEACON PRACTICE

NOVEMBER 28 & DECEMBER 2, 2017

Utah Avalanche Center teamed with the Wasatch Mountain Club to support a basic understanding of avalanche awareness. Tuesday night a volunteer from UAC presented a video Know Before You Go and answered questions. Saturday, we were able to find enough snow to hide and find beacons. The UAC had three excellent volunteers that led groups with a beacon search and tips for beacon checks prior to an outing. The Wasatch Mountain Club had around 20 participants for both these events. We were able to raise money through these activities to donate to the Utah Avalanche Center.



Avalanche takeaways and tips:

- 1. Avalanche fatalities and injuries can be from being buried, secondary injuries, and hypothermia.
- 2. Cell phones, earbuds, and electronics DO cause beacon search interference.
- 3. Trees do not act as effective anchors for snow unless they are so tightly located you would not be able to ski between them. Avalanches CAN happen between trees.
- 4. Check beacons and avalanche gear at the car prior to an outing to ensure everyone has their beacon with plenty of battery juice, probe, and shovel.
- 5. Glasses can cause a glare on your beacon numbers during a search. Take them off if needed.
- 6. Probes should be removed from bags to save time during a search.
- 7. Beacons find the body vicinity. Probes are essential to find how deep under snow and exact location. Shovels are essential to retrieve the body.
- 8. Practice beacon search as methodical and consistent without the main focus being on time. Initially, focus on doing each step effectively and efficiently as in an emergency it should be automatic with no time to spare. As you continue to practice these steps then switch to focus on time.

Thanks for all those that participated, the donations, and the effort as a club to focus on safety.






A VISIT TO GOLD BUTTE NATIONAL MONUMENT

NOVEMBER 19, 2017

I had vacation that I needed to burn before the end of the year, so I took the week of Thanksgiving off. Bruce Christenson organized an open house at his place in St George starting the Thursday before Thanksgiving and finishing on Monday. I couldn't leave until Saturday, but Bruce was happy to let me crash for just a couple of nights. At dinner on Saturday, I mentioned that one of my goals for the week was to visit petroglyph sites in Gold Butte National Monument, which is famous for having the most amazing petroglyph panels in Nevada. Gold Butte National Monument may not be long for this world given the current administration's latest trends and I wanted to see the area before it becomes an open pit mine, or worse, vacation condos. There was a lot of interest in the petroglyphs, so I organized a trip there for Sunday.

Gold Butte NM is south of the notorious Bundy Ranch on the east side of the Overton Arm of Lake Mead. We drove down the "New



Gold Butte Road" which is allegedly paved but apparently hasn't been resurfaced in decades so it's almost a dirt road. At Whitney Pocket, we turned off on an even more rugged side road which leads to two really nice rock art sites: Falling Man and the Kohta Circus.

Falling Man is famous for its petroglyph of a falling man. Given where it's located, it may well be a memorial for a rock art pioneer who had a terminal accident. The area also has loads of other petroglyphs and pictographs -- I was amazed at all of the art, which is currently in



great shape. We visited the Falling Man itself as well as a couple of "newspaper rock" sites, one of which had 3 levels of really wonderful material. Many thanks to Bob Myers for finding the correct route up through an arch to the Falling Man glyph!

The Kohta Circus is allegedly the largest petroglyph panel in Nevada. It's called a "circus" because of the amazing number of animals on the panel. We saw

bighorns, deer, elk, moose, coyote, egrets, and lots of more mysterious figures. The last bit of the road was pretty bad, so I shuttled people to the trailhead in my high-clearance vehicle. It's a 40-minute hike to the panel from the trailhead along an old jeep road and then a sketchy trail but we didn't have any trouble finding the site. The slickrock domes and the enormous Joshua trees were interesting en route and the panel itself was overwhelming. We found petroglyphs just about everywhere -- it's a very special site. On the return hike, one of our group missed the last spur to the trailhead and walked all of the way down the wash to the bad road. It took us a while to figure out what had happened, but we rounded him up and got back home in fine shape. Fun trip to begin the New Year. Of course, we hope for plenty of snow before then, so bring snowshoes even if totals are on the meager side of the ledger. Bring microspikes, too. Join us for some winter wolf and wildlife watching, and other winter activities in Yellowstone Park. Yellowstone is a great place to visit in the winter. We could see wolves, foxes, coyotes, bighorn sheep and eagles; maybe some other critters, too. ---- Trip length: Leave Thursday afternoon; return home by Sunday night if you have to get back to work or whatever; stay until Monday or Tuesday if you have more time and would like to stick around. ---- We'll motel it in Gardiner, MT, and drive into the Park each day on the road between there and Cooke City, 4 miles east of the northeast entrance. It's the only road kept open in Yellowstone in the winter. We might see wolves anywhere along that road; the most likely place is usually Lamar Valley. We'll see other animals along the way, too. ---- Note that this is a WMC members only trip. If you are not a member, you can still come by joining the club first :-) ----- Some other noteworthy considerations: We'll get up very early each morning (about 5:00am) and the mornings could be very cold (zero or less). ----- Wolf Watching: The best way to find wolves is to drive the road. If you really, really want to see wolves, you need to be dedicated to doing that to the exclusion of everything else until we find some. What we do is find the biologists and follow them wherever they go until we find wolves. After that you can do whatever you want. Winter Activities: There are lots of opportunities for cross country skiing and snowshoeing, so bring your skis, snowshoes or whatever if you want to enjoy some time trekking around in Yellowstone's spectacular winter wonderland. ---- The drive to Gardiner in the winter is about 500 miles since we can't go through the Park to get there, so we will leave Thursday and drive about halfway that night. Plan to leave anytime in the afternoon, but no later than 5-6pm. ---- Robert

This is the 45th annual KPT. It is MSD, fast paced, can be up to 32 miles in length depending on turn around point, and gains about 4600 ft in elevation. There are lots of good options for a turn around points short of the peak. We all go in and out on the same trail. The tour is great from any of the turn around points. No beacons, shovels, or probes are required but good headlamps with ample batteries are mandatory as we start around 4:30 am and return after dark. It is a very long day. Bring plenty of water. Climbing skins are often helpful. Standard Nordic gear is best. Racing skis are a poor choice and not advised. Meeting at the Walmart parking lot on Parleys way on Friday at 5:00 PM is optional. Many also meet at JB's restaurant in Evanston but that is also optional. Checkout at the Henry's Fork trailhead before starting and check in at completion of the day is mandatory. Those attempting the peak should be at Gunsight Pass by about noon. Mandatory turn around time is 3PM no matter where you are on the route.
